HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.

Mr. David Tapley nearly Killed by a Runaway Horse.

A horse belonging to Manager Massey of the Bank of Montreal, ran away and made things lively this morning and came very near causing the death of Mr. David Tapley, who is employed as teamster by Mr. D. J. Shea. The animal, hitched to a sleigh, had been left standing near the bank of Montreal, and taking fright started down Queen street, at a break neck pace. At the York street corner it took to the sidewalk, and in its mad flight down town, seemed to touch only the high places.

Mr. Tapley was emerging from the Barker house alley with a horse and sled, and was unconscious of the approach of the runaway, until it banged into him full force. He was knocked from his seat on the sled, and the horse and sleigh passed right over him. He was partially stunned by the shock, and on being assisted into Chestnut's drug store, it was found that several teeth had been knocked out, and he had received ugly cuts about the head and face. He was removed to his home in a coach, and his injuries were attended by Dr. Mullin.

The runaway horse, after inflicting considerable damage on the sleigh, was captured in front of the store of M. Pickler and Co. Some plumbing fixtures and iron pipe were knocked from Mr. Shea's sled, but the rig suffered no damage.

Dr. G. J. McNally and family left last evening for St. John, en route to their new home at Berwick, N. S.

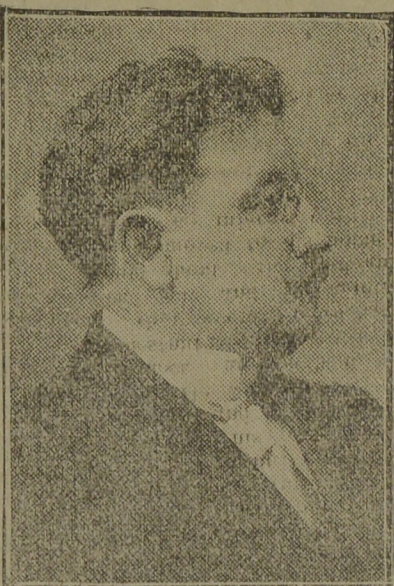
Mr. and Mrs. Earl Barker of Somerville, Mass., are spending a few days with friends in the city.
