CURRENT COMMENT.

Hon. J. Cunard Barrie, whose death is announced at Dalhousie, was several years a member of the New Brunswick legislature, first in the assembly and afterwards in the legislative council, where he occupied a seat when that body was abolished in 1892. He was a barrister by profession and very highly esteemed.

General regret will be felt at the death of Mr. Daniel Lucy, one of Fredericton's aged and highly respected citizens. The deceased gentleman was for many years a leading business man, and held a high and honorable record in all his relations of life. He took an active interest in public affairs, and personally was most agreeable.

A brilliant young Nova Scotian, Mr. Ross Hill, has just been inducted into the presidency of Missouri University, which has 3000 students, and an annual income of \$600,000. President Hill is a native of Economy, Colchester Co., and a brother of Mr. Chas. Hill, the Liberal candidate in the last two federal elections in Colchester, and of Mr. W. Davidson Hill, M. P. P. for that county, and is only 38 years old.

The Conservatives of Carleton, doubtless in a spirit of revenge have filed a petition against the election of Mr. George W. Upham, to the legislature. They are very sore at their recent defeats, but no doubt if the protest ever reaches trial and results in the annulling of the election, the sturdy Liberal electors of the county will see to it that Mr. Upham is returned by a largely increased majority. Carleton is in rebellion against the local government and all things Tory.

Mr. Hazen must be deeply disappointed with the results of the Central Railway enquiry, the principal object of which was to bring discredit on Hon. Dr. Pugsley, of whom the local premier is insanely jealous. Nothing that has developed reflects the slightest discredit on the Minister of Public Works, who voluntarily took the witness stand and made explanations that will satisfy every reasonable man that so far as Dr. Pugsley was concerned, the business of the Central railway was honestly and honorably conducted.

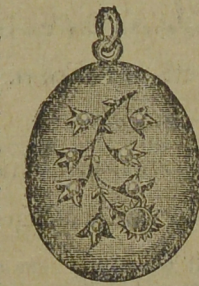
