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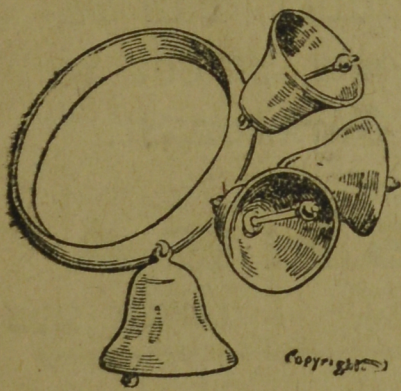
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THE BISHOP INJURED.

His Lordship Suffered Painful Wound in His Head on His Trip to England.

ST. JOHN, N. B., (Special)—Word has been received here that Bishop Richardson of Fredericton, met with a painful accident on board the steamer Champlain, during the voyage to Liverpool.

While entertaining children, he jumped down the lower steps of the stairway, and being a tall man, his head came into violent contact with the upper casing of the door, and he fell unconscious at the feet of the captain and the ship's doctor, who were standing nearby.

Several stitches were necessary to close the wound, and the Bishop suffered considerably from what was a rather serious injury.

NO SURRENDER.

Tory Caucus Decides to Keep up Obstruction of Public Business and Government Will Not Capitulate

OTTAWA, May 19.—(Special)—A Conservative caucus held this morning resulted in a decision of the opposition members to fall into line behind the Roblin-Rogers standard, and join the No Surrender Lodge.

The condition on which they will let the business in parliament proceed is the complete capitulation of the government to their election bill demand.

If the government attempts to get supply, the opposition will block the attempt by again bringing up the Ames Timber Limit charges.

The government, of course, has no intention of capitulating to such a

factions opposition, and present conditions point to a long and bitter fight.

A significant side light on the present situation is the arrival of D. D. Mann, in the capital, simultaneously with Premier Roblin, and Hon. Robt. Rogers.

The influence of the Canadian Northern magnates, with the Manitoba ministry, is well known, and rumor connects Mr. Mann's visit with the attempt now being made to embarrass the government and force a dissolution, failing the granting of certain desired concessions.

STEAMSHIP WRECK.

Plant Liner Ashore on Nova Scotia Coast and May be a Total Loss.

HALIFAX, May 19.—(Special)—The Plant Line steamer, W. A. Perry, Capt. Hawse, went ashore at McMillan's Point, near Port Hastings, this morning, and may be a total wreck.

The steamer left here about noon yesterday on her first trip this season, to Hawkesbury and Charlotte-town. She apparently reached Hawkesbury safely, landing her cargo and passengers there. She was due there at midnight, and it is thought she arrived there on time, and sailed at three o'clock for Charlottetown.

It was about five o'clock this morning when the manager of the line received a telegram to the effect

that she was ashore on McMillan Point, near Port Hastings, having struck in thick fog, and that all hands, passengers and crew were landed safely.

Later information is to the effect that the ship is in bad condition, with her bottom seriously damaged, and that there were no immediate prospects of getting her off. She is full of water. Purser, stewards and part of the crew have left for Halifax.

She is a steel ship, built in 1897, was worth about \$140,000, and was covered by insurance.

She had a large amount of cargo and several passengers for Charlottetown.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Police Magistrate of Sackville Passed Away Unexpectedly.

SACKVILLE, May 19.—(Special)—The death took place this morning of Police Magistrate, Walter Cahill.

Though his death came suddenly, Mr. Cahill having been at his office yesterday afternoon, he has been in failing health for some time. He was 78 years old, a justice of the peace for 40 years, and police magistrate of Sackville ever since its incorporation.

Mr. Cahill, was twice married, his second wife, formerly Miss Elder of Hantport, survives him, and also two daughters, Mrs. Theodore H. Belyea of St. John, and Miss Harriett Cahill of Sackville. C. W. Cahill of Sackville, is a son of the deceased.

SWEPT OVER FALLS.

MONTREAL, May 19.—A terrible accident happened Saturday afternoon at Shawinigan Falls, when James Ryan, superintendent of Shawinigan Water and Electric Company of Boston, and Joe Racine, a laborer were swept over the falls, falling 130 feet in their descent.

Hundreds of spectators were lined on either side of the falls and were powerless to render assistance.

GRIST FOR THE DIVORCE MILL.

Pronounced Moncton and St. Stephen People to Ventilate Marital Infelicities

Four divorce cases, involving some of the best known people in the province, have been entered for trial at the regular term of the divorce court, which opens in this city on July 7.

Judge Gregory presiding. On that date judgment will be delivered in three other cases, which were tried at the February term of the court. Following is the list of the new cases:

Dr. William A. Ferguson vs. Bertha Ferguson.

Madeline Douglas Edith Clarke vs. Robert Clarke.

Beniah Longfellow Harris vs. Edward Alfred Harris.

Madeline Whitlock vs. Julius T. Whitlock.

Dr. Ferguson, plaintiff in first case is a prominent physician, practising in the city of Moncton. His wife is a daughter of the late Edward Sinclair of Newcastle, and a sister of Mrs. John McKane of that place, obtained a divorce from her husband some time ago in California, and has since married again. She is now a resident of Illinois. An absolute divorce is asked for on the ground of adultery.

The plaintiff in the Clarke case was formerly Miss Gault, niece of the late Sir A. T. Gault, are resides in Moncton, where her husband is agent of the Bank of Montreal. She is asking for a legal separation.

In the Harris case the plaintiff is a daughter of Mr. Peter S. Archibald, one of the commissioners of the Central railway, and the defendant is a son of the late Mr. Christopher Harris of Moncton. The couple attained some notoriety over a shooting scrape, which occurred in the west some years ago, and have not since lived very happily together.

Dr. MacRae and W. A. Ewing, who appeared for the parties in the Simonds case, stated that they had agreed on an even division of the property for their clients, and His Honor promised to bear that in mind in delivering judgment. Dr. MacRae stated that the defendant's income was \$800, instead of \$900, the figures he had given at the trial.

Mr. Harris J. G. Fenety, the new registrar of the divorce court, went on duty this morning for the first time.

MR. PINDER WAS CRITICAL.

Objects to Government Officials Charging for Extra Services

The public accounts committee of the legislature met this morning after a brief respite, and got through with quite a large amount of business. The members in attendance were Chairman Pinder, and Messrs. LaBillico, Bourque, Tweeddale, Smith and Woods.

Chairman Pinder wanted to know why R. W. L. Tibbitts should receive \$4 for a certified copy of the game act.

Dr. Bourque said it looked to him as if officials had to be paid extra for what work they did.

Chairman Pinder said it was most ridiculous that officials should charge the province for certifying to an act. He did not think that they should be allowed to charge private individuals for certifying to copies of acts.

The expenditure on immigration, amounting to \$13,674 was examined in detail. It was shown that Dr. Hannay received \$971.40 for preparing and printing a year book, and \$350 for 5,000 maps. There was a grant of \$500 made for expenses and advertising.

The auditor general was called, and explained an item of \$3,382.59, an account of the judicature act. It was shown that there was an additional expenditure of \$2,000, which brought the observation from Mr. Pinder that the lawyers seemed to have a wonderful pull.

A copy of the N. B. hand book was produced by the auditor general, and examined by the members of the committee.

Mr. Smith claimed that the books had cost over \$1 each, and he thought it was a little too steep. He added that it would be the duty of the new government to inaugurate reforms in this connection.

There was some discussion over Dr. Fisher's charges in connection with smallpox outbreaks.

The auditor general explained that he was allowed \$10 per day for expenses while absent from home on duty. The allowance was formerly \$20 per day.

The item for public printing, amounting to \$13,697.84 was allowed to pass with very little discussion.

In the amount paid to revisors it was shown that \$35.0 was paid to York, the largest item in the list. Westmorland came next, with \$176.
