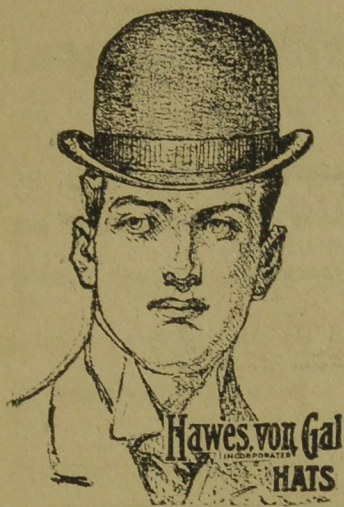

LAPORTE MURDERESS.

Further Details of Early Life of Mrs. Belle
Guinness Discovered.

Her Parents Were Wealthy and Her Early Days Were
Spent in Luxury

CHRISTIANIA, May 18.—In addition to the fact that Mrs. Belle Guinness, the central figure in the Laporte, Ind., murder mystery, was the daughter of Petters Paulsen, a travelling conjuror and magician and in Norway, the Associated Press has gathered here and at Trondhjem many additional details of her family history.

Her mother was regarded as a respectable woman. Her father was a Swede of gypsy origin. He was a clever illusionist and attracted large rather than select audiences. Belle used to travel with his company everywhere in the country and was especially well known to Christiania during the epoch when the yearly fair existed.

An old artist friend of Paulsen was found here today. His name is Julius Basteel. He says he knew Paulsen at Karlstad, Sweden, in 1868, when Paulsen was from thirty to thirty-four years of age. Basteel says he was wonderfully clever and the world's best imitator of birds. He made much money from his exhibitions. His daughter, who was about six or eight years of age, accompanied him. He is described as having been a brutal man and lavish with his money.

Belle Paulsen was confirmed at Christiania and South Norway, in 1875. Her family at that time lived luxuriously. The girl's confirmation dress was ordered from Paris. Shortly afterward Paulsen retired from business and invested his savings in a glassware business. His daughter remained at Christiania. Basteel says, and in 1880 or 1889 married an engineer. Basteel has not seen her since.

Old Paulsen is said to have died last year at Nasvik, from the effects of falling down a flight of stairs. It is reported that the daughter before leaving Norway was a participant in a suit in the divorce court and that the case never has been finished.

CROWN LAND DEPARTMENT.

In the balance sheet of the province there is a liability of \$2,656.23 for sundry accounts. On going into the matter with Mr. Flewelling, the deputy surveyor general, we found that a similar system existed in his department to the one in the Public Works department, so far as the signing of checks is concerned, but Mr. Flewelling has no special account in the Bank for his department. He uses his own private bank account, lodging the money coming into his department to the credit of this account, and during the year he pays the accounts by cheques through this private account. This is far from satisfactory, as it not only means a loss to the province of interest on a credit bank balance, but there is bound to be large credit balances at times in this department, but it is not a healthy way to work a department, and must keep from the auditor general certain figures and facts which should be fully disclosed to him at the time of his audit.

We suggest to you that the bank account for this department should be worked and handled through the receiver general's office, and all the cheques countersigned, and that all over-expenditures should be properly applied for and dealt with in your yearly report, the original correspondence in connection with same be filed for audit and published in your yearly report book.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Dr. Inch signs the cheques for this department, and we went over the bank account and found everything in order. We think, however, that a countersigning could be carried out in this department without any inconvenience.

PROVINCIAL SECRETARY'S OFFICE.

This office, in our opinion, should be the receiving office for all receipts in connection with all the departments. It is here that the general cash book of the province should be kept, and any books in the departments should be minor books to the ones kept in the provincial office, in fact, the departments' books, while keeping a correct return of all transactions for the department, should have as a check the books in the provincial secretary's office.

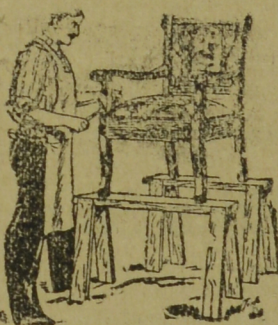

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D. 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$35 00

The same for each successive evening performance, 30 00

The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery 30 00

The same as above without scenery 25 00

The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night 27 00

The same without scenery per night 23 00

For one week stand with scenery 135 00

For the same without scenery 120 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for

light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery 15 00

For the same without scenery 10 00

For each matinee, local talent only 7 50

For each political meeting 15 00

On the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting 10 00

For two meetings same person, same day 15 00

For rehearsals for afternoon 3 00

For rehearsals for evening 5 00

For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night 20 00

The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night 18 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 10 00
