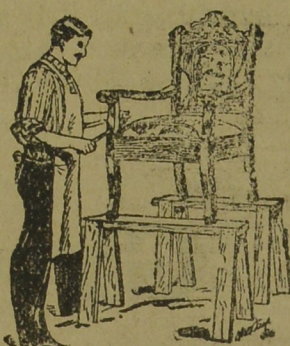

N. B. FRUIT GROWERS

Important Matters Discussed at the Annual Meeting--Officers and Prize Winners

At the meeting of the N. B. Fruit Growers' association Friday, Mr. S. B. Hatheway of Kingsclear, one of the brightest young farmers of York county, related his experience in orchard culture. He gave out much practical information, and was listened to with marked attention.

At the conclusion of Mr. Hatheway's remarks, there was an interesting discussion as to the five best varieties of apples suitable for New Brunswick.

Mr. Norman Hallett thought the Duchess of Oldenburg, Alexandria and Wealthy were the most profitable providing the farmer could ship them without hauling them five or six miles. He had found the Bethel a rapid growing healthy tree. The Ben Davis was all right, but did not live long enough.

Mr. Isaac W. Stevenson of Sheffield, said that his experience with the Ben Davis had not been very profitable. He had a good chance to ship apples by boat, and found a good market for them. The varieties he had found best were the Dudley Winter, the Duchess, Alexander, Wolf River, and Princess Louise. Mr. Stevenson spoke at some length in an able manner on the subject of fruit growing, greatly to the edification of his hearers.

Mr. T. A. Peters, secretary for agriculture, said that the varieties that he would select were Duchess, McIntosh Red, Fameuse, Dudley Winter, and either Alexander or Wolfe River. The Baxter was being dropped from the illustration orchards, and the Bethel substituted. As for McIntosh Red, he believed that it would bring \$2 a barrel more in the Fredericton market than any other variety.

Coun. Everett of Kingsclear, suggested Duchess, Fameuse, McIntosh Red, Alexander and Ben Davis.

Mr. J. W. Clark of Mungerville, pronounced the Duchess and Wealthy the two best varieties of apples he had to do with. He thought the Alexander, Fameuse and the Dudley Winter were good varieties.

Mr. Henry Wilmot of Belmont, pronounced the Bishop Pippin, Fameuse, Alexander, McIntosh Red and Duchess the best apples in his opinion.

Mr. Peters said that the late Mr. Sharp of Woodstock, claimed that he propagated the New Brunswick apple, and that it was a distinct species from the Duchess.

President Gilman pronounced the Duchess, Alexander and McIntosh Red to be the best varieties of apples in his experience. The Fameuse and Wealthy were also good varieties.

Mr. Norman Hallett said that he sold \$102 worth of apples last year of the Red Astrican variety from thirteen varieties.

Mr. Vroom of St. Stephen said the Red Astrican was the most profitable apple grown in his section.

Mr. S. B. Hatheway contended that the Maiden Blush was a distinct apple from the Red Astrican.

On motion of Mr. Peters, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the retiring president for his valuable services.

GOOD DISPLAY OF FRUIT.

The fruit display consisted of about twenty-five varieties of apples, and was a most creditable one, and was warmly praised by Dominion Fruit Inspector Vroom, who acted as judge. He awarded prizes for the best plates of named varieties as follows:

At the evening session G. H. Vroom, of Middleton (N.S.), delivered a practical address on general orchard practices, in the course of which he strongly urged New Brunswick farmers to engage more extensively in the culture of apples. In conclusion, he gave a short talk on the destructive power of the brown-tailed moth and warned the delegates to keep a sharp lookout for it.

Mr. Peters said that he was authorized by the commissioner of agriculture to offer a bounty of ten cents for every brown tail moth nest found in the province.

The fine collection of apples was distributed among the audience after which the meeting adjourned.
