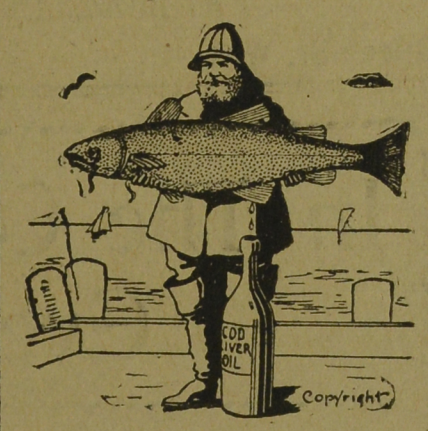

ADVOCATES SCOTT ACT

This Correspondent thinks it would be Effective if Properly Enforced

To the Editor of the Herald:
Sir,—The interest that has been aroused through the effort to secure the suspension of the Canada Temperance Act in Fredericton, is a very satisfactory feature. Better that there should be sharply expressed differences of opinion and debate and even excitement than the indifference that has so long prevailed here as to the enforcement of the law.

There can be no doubt that up to the present a large majority of respectable voters has been in favor of the law and its enforcement. It is not now the fact, the sooner it is known the better. This city of churches and provincial educational institutions should not continue to pose under false colors in such an important matter. Let the people of the province know that Fredericton favors a liquor license law, if that is the fact. If such a result should follow because of the non-enforcement of the Scott Act, the officials and the city council must bear the odium. The responsibility does not rest upon the individual citizen, who personally has nothing more to do with the enforcement of this law than he has with that of any other Dominion, provincial or civic enactment.

The same means that secure the enforcement of the act in the county, which meets with approval in high church and social circles, can secure its enforcement in the city.

If a Scott Act inspector is necessary and good for the country districts and is measurably successful in preventing the sale in respectable country hotels, why cannot the same means be used to prevent the sale in the low bar rooms and grogeries of the city?

Why should respectable people, because they live in the city, be compelled to tolerate such a discreditable and dangerous trade, while their country friends are protected?

If the police magistrate and his staff of policemen under him, cannot enforce the law, then let there be an official who will see that it is duly enforced, and thus relieve this respectable community, with its decent citizenship, from the odium that now rests upon it.

If an efficient city inspector is appointed, and does his duty, the police magistrate would have to do his, and would for a time, at least, be kept busy in the city's interests.

She had heard that her intended husband got drunk on Friday and had refused to marry her so she ran away. She had \$52, and said she was going back to Austria.

Today Banko Caviar, her affianced husband, endeavored to have her arrested to obtain the price of the license, wedding ring and trousseau, but was prevented by her friends. She bought her ticket today for Galicia, Austria, where her parents live, leaving on the noon train.

EXPENSIVE UNTHAN

British Columbia Government has Spent \$30,000 trying to Run Down a Murderer

VANCOUVER, B. C., January 23.—(Special).—One of the most costly and laborious man-hunts that ever took place in Northern British Columbia is that now in progress after an Indian, Simon Gun-A-Noot, who a year ago last July shot Alexander McIntosh and Max Leclaire and fled to the hills in Bear Lake country.

It is said that the chase is the longest ever maintained by any provincial government. Four parties sought the fugitive, but in vain and the expenditure in money has been over \$30,000.

So far the only result of the hunt has been the capture of the Indian who has been trading furs which Gun-A-Noot and his party have taken during his absence.

Try to Do This.

Take a light chair and place it with its back to the wall. The next incident in this elaborate ritual is the robing of the child in gorgeous garments, after which it is carried three times round the church, the god-fathers of the imperial infant walking by its side in stately procession.

1.—Term 21 years at rental named, with right of renewal for second term at such rental and upon such conditions as the Governor in Council may then determine.

2.—Occupation and use to be bona fide for an industry that will yield a reasonably steady traffic for the railway, the character and prospective outflow of which industry, to be designated in tender and the operation of which to be commenced within one year from date of Lessee acquiring property.
