A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago

Messrs. D. W. Hoegg & Co., are already making preparations for resuming their canning operations here this summer.

James Gorman of Cork Settlement, was attacked with a fainting spell this afternoon, near the city hall. He was taken into the drug store of Davis, Staples & Co., where he was attended by Dr. Coulthard.

Mr. William Stairs, of Upper Queensbury, had his residence entirely destroyed by fire last Thursday night. The fire caught from a defective flue. Mr. Stairs is deserving the practical sympathy of his neighbors.

DONATION.

There was a very pleasant gathering of the friends of the Rev. H. J. Clark, Methodist minister of the Kingsclear circuit, at Benjamin Long's, Long's Creek, a few evenings ago, for the purpose of expressing their feelings of gratitude in a somewhat tangible way to the Rev. gentleman, who has been laboring among the people for nearly three years. After partaking of a splendid repast prepared by the ladies, the meeting was called to order by Mr. Joseph Holyoke, who was elected chairman; Dr. J. C. Mott was appointed secretary; Mr. G. Dykeman, assistant secretary. In a short time the sum of \$63 in cash was on the table. This donation was handed over to the Rev. gentleman, who expressed his gratitude for the kindness and liberality of the friends present. He also made reference to the uninterrupted friendship that existed between himself and other denominations. The Rev. Calvin Currie, Baptist, was then called upon and gave a short address, after which Messrs. L. Estabrooks and W. S. Smart (superintendent of the Hibbard antimony mine) and some others, gave brief addresses.

CANADIAN CLUB.

From the Edinburgh Scotsman of the 11th inst., we learn that on the day previous a meeting of Canadian students was held in the University Hotel, Chambers street, for the purpose of forming a club. Mr. Pickard presided. Mr. Jack, who acted as interim secretary, submitted a report, which mentioned that there were twenty-one Canadian students on the register of Edinburgh University, while others were attending Minto House, and the new College. The number of Canadian students in Edinburgh would probably be between thirty and forty. It was proposed that a club should be formed, under the name of the "Edinburgh Canadian Students' Club," and this was agreed to unanimously. Dr. Webster was unanimously elected as hon. president, Mr. Jordan as president, and Mr. Jack as secretary and treasurer. Four gentlemen were elected as members of committee, including Messrs. Jack, who is none other than Mr. W. B. Jack, son of the president of the University, and Mr. Murray McLaren, son of Dr. McLaren of St. John. Mr. Pickard, who is mentioned as presiding over the meeting, is Mr. H. B. BAND CONCERT.

The concert given last night in the city hall by the Fredericton Brass band, was a real musical treat and enjoyed by a large and highly respectable audience. The band's repertoire of several pieces was as it always is, a feature of the evening, and it is the general opinion that they never played with greater taste or effect than last night.

The opening selection "Solitude" won everybody; the selections from "Martha" were warmly received, and "Pleasant Memories," which introduced the songs and ballads of the long ago, and the closing piece "The Rifle Galop," a military composition, were rendered in exquisite style.

Prof. Cadwallader's orchestra, composed of the Prof. and Messrs. Williamson, Smith, Winters, Perkins and C. H. Hawthorn, now a permanent and much appreciated institution, gave two selections from "La Favorita" and the "Pirates of Penzance," winning much approval. Miss James, who sang at the last concert of the band, met with a very hearty reception on her reappearance, and her contributions to the program last night were highly appreciated. She gave two solos with harp accompaniment, "Josephine to Napoleon," and "Strangers yet," both in excellent taste, and received well deserved accolades.

Mr. C. H. Hatt was in good voice last night, and sang the "Vagabond" in dashing style, for which he was encored. His duet with Miss James was one of the gems of the evening. Their voices blended finely, and were well balanced. Mr. Hatt also appeared in a quartette with Miss James, and the Messrs. Richards, which was well rendered.

Mr. W. A. Adams sang a character song with his usual dash. Mr. Graevell gave a solo, "The Sea King," and Messrs. Adams, Nesbitt, McAdam and Graevell, completed the program with a quartette, "Sunrise."

The accompaniments were played by Prof. Cadwallader. As a whole the concert was a great success.

FREDERICTON WATER WORKS.

An interesting discussion took place Monday forenoon in the Corporations committee of the legislature, regarding the erection of water works in Fredericton.

There were two bills before the committee, one by the city council to authorize them to proceed with the work and the other advocated by a number of persons who asked that the power to do the work be given to a private company. It was admitted on all sides that a water system was essential to Fredericton. Those representing the company did not ask for incorporation if a provision was put in the other bill binding the council to proceed with the work before August 1st, otherwise the power shall pass to the company, who were willing if incorporated, to begin laying the pipes within three weeks. Time was given for the contending parties to meet and arrange a compromise bill.

The question of sewerage came up incidentally, and it was held without a proper water supply an efficient sewerage system was impossible, and several members of the committee expressed decided opinions that some action should be taken at once to improve the sanitary condition of the city. Neither of the bills has yet been discussed by the House.

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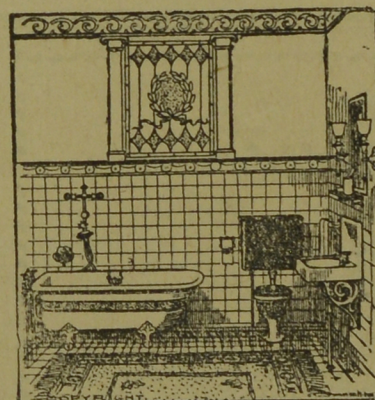
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
