DRAWING TO A CLOSE

Quebec Tercentenary will Soon Pass into History--Earl Gray's Dinner a Notable Function

QUEBEC, July 27.—(Special)—The rush is over. Quebec, though far from normal, is gradually assuming an attitude of comparative calm. The festivities are by no means done, many interesting events yet remain to be chronicled, but the suffocating crush of the past week is gone.

The Prince is now familiar in the streets. Yesterday he motored to Montmorency falls with a small party, and passed almost unnoticed through the city. This morning, accompanied by the governor general and a small staff, he paid an entirely informal and private visit to the old French Canadian village of St. Joachim, and was the guest of the monks of Quebec seminary at the Chateau Bellevue petit cap. The Prince returned in an automobile, and arrived in town in time to witness the regatta from the quarterdeck of H. M. S. Arrogant.

While H. R. H. was enjoying the hospitality of the Seminary fathers, another function was taking place over the river at Levis. There the city hall was packed, doing honor to the present holder of the title of Marquis de Levis Mirepoix and the Comte de Champlain.

ST. JOHN RACE MEETING

Terrace Queen Downed Simassie in the Great Free for all Event

ST. JOHN, July 25.—Nova Scotia horses swept the field at Moosepath races on Saturday before one of the largest crowds which ever attended races in St. John. The Springhill horses, Dessie Patchen and Estill Boy won in the 2.30 and 2.17 respectively after exciting heats and in the free-for-all the speedy Terrace Queen downed Simassie in a four heat race. There were five hours of racing on Saturday without a hitch and the weather conditions being perfect, the day was a memorable one in the annals of horse racing in St. John.

Not one of the races went in straight heats and though no records were broken the time in the 2.20 pace was remarkably good for that event. Thomas Hayes made a bid for the first place in the 2.30 with his handsome roan Quincy A., and won the first two heats handily, making sure of second money, but Dessie Patchen proved too strong.

Laura Merrill, the Fairfield mare, looked dangerous in the 2.17 and made close finishes, though capturing but one first. Brownette and Estill Boy were evenly matched in this race and it took six heats to decide and even then the deciding heat looked to the uninitiated like a tie race.

Terrace Queen lost but one heat in the free-for-all and was plainly the faster horse, though Boutillier drove to win.

The grand stand was not large enough to hold the crowd which attended the races, and the track on both sides for some distance with teams and people. Betting was heavy and the book-makers who were backing the American horses dropped considerable money. There was perfect order and the Gentlemen's Driving Club are to be congratulated on the success of the meet.

SOLDIER BOYS' RETURN

Gallant Seventy-firsters Home from the Ancient Capital.

The composite company of the 71st Regiment, and the band of the corps returned at 11.30 o'clock on Saturday night from Quebec, where they took part in the great tercentenary celebration. They left Quebec on Friday night, and made the trip home by the Temiscouata and Canadian Pacific railways. The boys enjoyed their brief sojourn at the ancient capital very much, and rejoice that they were privileged to take part in such a great and memorable celebration. They speak of the tercentenary as a grand affair, the like of which no person living in Canada today will be likely to witness again. The whole program, they say, was carried on without a hitch, and the spectacle was one never to be forgotten by those who witnessed it.

The 71st boys were domiciled under canvas at Point Levis, opposite Quebec, and were transported to and from the city in sews. The company, and also the band took part in the great parade through the streets, and also participated in the great review on the Plains of Abraham before the Prince of Wales, Lord Roberts and other notables.

The boys say that the culinary arrangements of the camp at Point Levis were not the very best, and that they had difficulty at times in getting enough to eat. In this respect, however, they consider that they fared much better than thousands of civilians who attended the celebration, and therefore have no complaint to make.

The fine band of the 71st, under the leadership of Bandmaster White, made a fine showing at the celebration, and the members came in for many compliments on their work. In the grand review on the Plains of Abraham, they played the regimental march for the maritime regiment in the march past. Before leaving for home the band played a program near the railway station in the lower town, and came in for a great ovation from the spectators.

THE STOCK MARKET

Dollars Were Heavy Today but Prices Changed But Little

NEW YORK, July 27.—The Stock Market opened irregular. Prices of stocks did not move decidedly in either directions at the opening. Small gains and losses being equally divided and many stocks starting unchanged from Saturday's close. Dealings were on a large scale.

TOURIST TRAVEL LIGHT.

Although St. John seems to be enjoying a big influx of tourists this season, thus far the number taking the trip to Fredericton is smaller than usual. Steamboat accommodation on the river this season is far superior to that of last year, the city has splendid hotels, and it is therefore rather difficult to understand why it is that tourists fight shy of Fredericton. A St. John man, who was recently asked to explain the matter, expressed the opinion that there was "together too much 'dry town' talk" in the newspapers concerning Fredericton, he said, "that tourists travelling about the country in hot weather usually avoid the dry places if it is possible for them to do so." Tourist traffic to Fredericton has certainly been light during the month of July, but the outlook for August is more hopeful, as several large parties are already booked.
