Britain to Pension the Aged.

The distinctive feature of the annual budget presented to the British House of Commons by Premier Asquith is the provision for allowance from the national treasury of \$1.25 a week to persons over seventy years old and possessing incomes under \$130 a year. This would not go to those dependent classes already under the public care. Asquith estimates that on this plan the pensioners will not exceed 500,000 and that the total cost will not exceed \$30,000,000. Stringent conditions would be imposed for forfeiture and suspension, and the Premier added that if this scheme was socialism it was socialism of a kind that both parties accepted. It will not go into effect until Jan. 1 next.
