## GOVERNMENT DEFEAT.

### Deakin Administration of Australia voted out—Labor Leader called to Premiership.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Nov. 11.—(Special)—Mr. Fisher, one of the Radical labor leaders of Australia, will form the new Australian Cabinet. The House defeated the Premier, Alfred Deakin on a division. The Laborites withdrew their support because the Government has not pushed Labor measures rapidly enough to suit them. This will be the second time the labor party has been in power in the Australian Federal parliament. J. C. Watson, another of the Labor leaders was premier for a short time in 1904.

## A POLITICAL DEADLOCK.

### Bond Government and Opposition in Newfoundland have each 18 Members in New Legislature.

ST. JOHN'S N. F., Nov. 11.—Complete returns from the general election of Nov. 2 show that Sir Robert Bond, the premier, and Sir Edward Morris, the leader of the opposition forces, will each have eighteen supporters in the legislature. Late yesterday the vote of the last district to be heard from, St. Barbe, was received, showing the election of Clapp, the Bond candidate, by 305 majority. The situation is the most unique in Newfoundland political records and may be settled only by the ordering of another general election, which will undoubtedly be done by the lieutenant governor if neither party is able to form a government, which will have the confidence of the legislature. In the third division of Harbor Grace, Hon. Mr. Dawe, minister of fisheries in the Bond cabinet, was elected on the face of the returns by only one majority. Next week a recount will be held before the supreme court. Should the recount show the defeat of Dawe, the opposition would have a two majority, but a speaker would have to be chosen, thus leaving a margin of one vote on the floor of the legislature, a majority too slight for any government to depend upon for any length of time. If the parties continue to stand 18 to 18, the election of a speaker by either side would give the opposition side a slight advantage on the floor, but as the parties now stand, there is no certainty that a speaker can be chosen, unless by mutual agreement. What the outcome of the deadlock will be is problematical.

## REMARKABLE CASE.

St. John Lady cured of Rare Disease by continual fasting.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 11.—(Special)—It is believed that the baffling disease known to medical science as acromegaly, will succumb to continued fasting.

Miss Jennie Godard of St. John, who suffered from this, her limbs being terribly swollen, went absolutely without food for forty-six days, taking nothing but cold water.

She is now perfectly well, and physicians believe the cure is permanent. There are no records in medicine of this disease being cured by other treatment.

## LIBERAL ELECTED.

Deferred Prince Albert Election Returns indicate Laurier Triumph.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 18.—(Special)—The returns from the Prince Albert deferred federal election indicate a victory for Mr. Ruttan, the Liberal candidate.

This gives Laurier nine of the ten Saskatchewan seats, and a majority of 50 in the House.

Three deferred elections are yet to be held in Yukon, Yale-Caribou and Comox-Allyn, B. C.

## SCARLET FEVER.

CHATHAM, Nov. 11.—The Board of Health took the decisive measure yesterday to cope with the scarlet fever epidemic. At eleven o'clock the public and convent schools were closed and 500 scholars who had kept up their attendance will be given two weeks holidays. Measures will also be taken to keep quarantined houses under guard and to allow no inmates to mix with other people. The free public library, amusement halls and all places of public gatherings except churches will be under the ban.

## BOWLERS FOR ST. JOHN.

The Queen Hotel alley's bowling team, composed of D. B. Winslow, Spencer Sterling, John Sullivan, F. P. Hatt and R. B. Vandine left this morning for St. John to take part in the international tournament which opened at Black's alleys last night. The first game was between the Marathons and Black's alleys' teams, the latter winning by 147 pins.

## BRAITHWAITE ENQUIRY.

### Further Evidence submitted at the Chatham Hearing

The Braithwaite case was continued Tuesday afternoon in the Chatham police court.

John Gilmore, sworn, said he belonged to Stanley, and was a guide in the Stanton party referred to by Carson. They all left Fredericton, September 2 and arrived at Governor Lake camp Sept. 7. The sportsmen were Messrs. Ungar, Stanton, Williams, and Dinlie. He guided Ungar, who on Sept. 13 or 14 shot a deer in his presence and also shot a moose when he (witness) was not present.

He brought the deer to camp and the party ate of it three times. There was also other fresh meat in the camp previous to Sept. 15, but he could not swear it was deer meat. It might have been bear or porcupine. A moose head was brought into camp on the 15th which Williams claimed as his, but witness could not say who shot it. He did not report these violations of the law. To Mr. Gregory, witness said Braithwaite was away from this camp between Sept. 10 and 14, and to his belief Braithwaite had no knowledge of the violations. The party had licenses dated Sept. 15, issued by the Crown Lands Department. Two moose and one deer was all the game he knew of the party getting. Charles Love was the third witness called. He was ill at ease and so confused at Mr. Lawlor's questions that the magistrate asked him, sharply whether he had been drinking. Mr. Winslow, however, gave Love a strong temperance character and his confusion was plainly due to the fact that it was, as he stated, "his maiden effort" in the police court. In the course of his testimony he brought in as evidence that no breaking of the law had occurred, that the solicitor general was with the party during August. Mr. Lawlor raised a general laugh by jocularly observing "If Harry McLeod was with him it makes it worse."

Harvey Scott was next called and in reply to Mr. Lawlor said his occupation this fall "was hauling sports for Mr. Braithwaite." His evidence had little bearing on the case. Mr. Lawlor then said two of the witnesses he subpoenaed had not shown up because, as they stated over the phone they had been told by somebody that the case was not coming on. They would come in last night's train, and he asked for an adjournment until today at ten o'clock. The magistrate granted this and the case was adjourned.

CHATHAM, N. B., Nov. 11.—(Special)—The Braithwaite case was continued this morning when the witnesses Lorenzo Munn and Allan McKiel who had been detained in Boiestown by a report that the case was postponed, went on the stand. Munn swore that on Sept. 8th or 9th there was fresh meat in camp which to the best of his knowledge and belief was deer or caribou meat. McKiel thought that the meat they had was bear meat with the exception of a deer brought in by Gilmore. They called this meat and the other deer meat, he said. The case will probably be finished this afternoon.

## FATAL EXPLOSION.

Five Men Killed and Six Seriously Injured.

TORONTO, Nov. 11.—Five men were killed or drowned and six badly burned by an explosion of the boiler of the steamer Temiskaming on Lake Temiskaming between five and six o'clock last evening.

The boat was approaching Temiskaming landing from New Liskeard with passengers aboard when the explosion took place, wrecking the steamer and throwing the passengers and crew into a terrible panic.

Five men instant death while many were injured. A special train started from Mattawa with doctors to bring the injured to that place. The dead are McBride Hunter from the United States, J. Menard and Bourgonham, firemen, two unknown and one still living who will likely die.

MATTAWA, Ont., Nov. 11.—Lake Temiskaming has had its tragedy grim and terrible, and the good sisters of St. Joseph hospital, Mattawa, are today tenderly caring for the victims with scalded bodies.

The steamer Temiskaming, which left Haileybury at eight o'clock Tuesday morning, now lies a dismantled wreck on the lake shore, four miles from Temiskaming.

The first intimation that the tragedy had occurred came in a telegram to Mattawa about six o'clock, that the steamer had blown up.

Five doctors and three nurses from North Bay hurried to Mattawa in response to a call for aid. The boiler exploded, killing five and injuring several, some of whom may die.

The casualty list includes McBride, a hunter from the United States, missing; J. Menard, fireman, dead, and Fireman Bourgonham, dead; McBride is supposed to be drowned. Two men, names unknown, will die, and at least six others are badly burned.

## HAZEN'S AXE.

CAMPBELLTON, Nov. 11.—A well founded rumor is being circulated around town today to the effect that Donald McBeath, the popular government sealer, is the latest victim of the Hazen machine. Mr. McBeath has never taken an active part in politics, and on what grounds his dismissal is based is yet to be learned. The people hereabouts are up in arms at the injustice.
