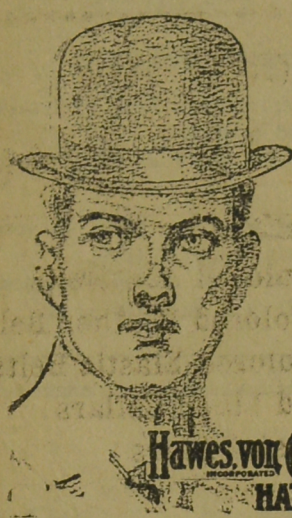

A STRIKING CONTRAST.

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir:—There is no comparison what ever between the cases of the letters published by the Scott Act Committee and the letters by the Licensing Committee!

The above statement, taken from the letter of Licensing Committee a few days ago, is worthy of our emphatic endorsement, and as we do not often get such an opportunity, we hasten to endorse it. The statement is also worthy of the serious consideration of every elector of this city, and when we reflect that what is true of the letters of the two Committees, is equally true of the parties for which those Committees stand, that serious consideration will doubtless be given. On the one hand (and we are pleased to note that Licensing Committee put the good cause first) is the party whose object is to fill the churches and Sunday schools; to support such institutions as the Y. M. C. A., to assist by every possible means the poor and destitute, to protect and help the mothers, wives and children whose sons, husbands and fathers are unable (in nine cases out of ten because of drunkenness) to provide for them, to build up happy homes, and to labor without ceasing for the upbuilding of the social, moral and spiritual welfare of the community.

On the other hand is the saloon, an institution that cannot claim any higher ground for its existence than that of being a necessary evil, and that is not allowed to do unrestricted business in any civilized country on earth. The only object of the saloon is to make money, and the effect of the saloon is to empty the churches and Sunday schools, to fill the poor houses and prisons, to destroy the Y. M. C. A., to increase poverty and destitution; to break the hearts and starve the bodies of our mothers, wives and children and to degrade and ruin our sons, husbands and fathers.

There is another difference between

the parties, namely, the Scott Act party appeals to the electors squarely to vote for what they believe to be the best interests of the community, while the Saloon party like wolves in sheep's clothing (against whom Humanity has been divinely armed) are seeking by every crafty and insidious device within their power to persuade the electors that the legalizing of their business would decrease the sale of liquor.

The voters of Fredericton will in his election occupy a position different from that of any other election in this province under similar circumstances. This because, in addition to the first and all-important duty of protecting our own homes, wives and children, we cannot escape the responsibility that rests upon us of guarding to the best of our ability, the lives of others committed to our care. Every year we have in Fredericton from five to six hundred young men and women from different parts of the province getting their education. These young people are in most cases the pride of their own homes, (outside the effect on themselves) joy and happiness or sorrow and misery to thousands of the citizens of our province. For thirty years this current of young life has been flowing through our city unobstructed by a single licensed saloon and we trust and believe that the voters will not change this condition. We beg to remind the people of the fact that we are fighting in the open, and resting our case on the strong ground of the home against the saloon, are doing our own writing and expressing our honest convictions. The saloon party are using every possible means to conceal their motives and to confuse the issue, and in order to get their views before the public have selected a gentleman who writes to suit his employers and who would be perfectly willing to answer his own letters if we paid him for so doing.

THE QUADRANT.

How the Idea of the Device Came to Thomas Godfrey.

Concerning Thomas Godfrey, a famous American mathematician, there is an interesting account in the "Literary History of Philadelphia."

Thomas Godfrey was a glazier. He seemed to be one of the most singular phenomena that ever appeared in the learned world.

One day while at work at his trade a young girl came to a pump and filled a pail with water, which was left upon the sidewalk. The sun's rays were reflected from Godfrey's glass to the pail of water and then to his eye, thus completing a triangle. This is said to have suggested to the glazier's mind the idea which in 1730 became the basis for the double reflecting sea quadrant.

Prior to this time English mariners had been using Davis' bow to ascertain their latitude at sea, but it could not be adjusted in a storm. Godfrey gave the subject careful study, taught himself Latin in order to read Newton's "Principia" and endeavored to have the value of his invention recognized in England. While thus engaged he determined to have the device tested on a ship bound for the West Indies. In Jamaica the quadrant was exhibited, or presented, to an English sea captain. The important discovery came into the possession of Hadley, a mathematical instrument maker in London, whose name it usually bears in spite of the long exertions of influential Americans of the eighteenth century to have Godfrey's claims established and honored.

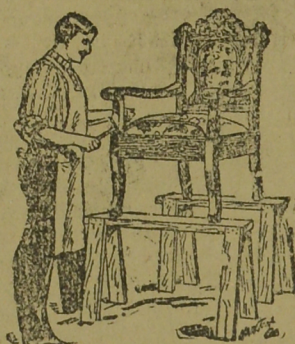
