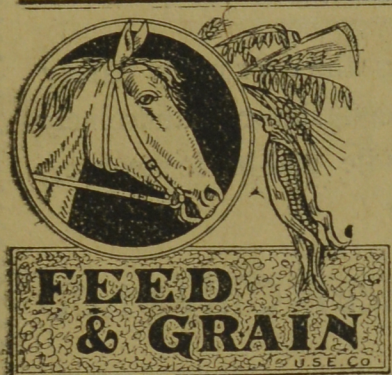

QUEBEC CELEBRATION

12,000 Troops Will Parade on Plains of Abraham—Only one Company From 71st Regiment.

OTTAWA, June 14—Military orders have been issued for the mobilization of some 12,000 of the Canadian militia at Quebec during the Tercentenary celebration under command of Brigadier General Otter. The troops will represent every branch of Canada forces, but will be confined to Eastern Canada with the exception of a contingent of 175 of all ranks and 70 horses to be selected from the several units in the three military districts from Winnipeg west.

The city corps selected to go to Quebec are the following:

From Toronto—Queen's Own Rifles, 48th Highlanders and 10th Royal Grenadiers.

From Montreal—Victoria Rifles, Royal Scots Highlanders and 65th Carliniers.

From Ottawa—The Governor General's Foot Guards and the 43rd Regiment.

From London—The 7th Fusiliers.

From Hamilton—The 13th Regiment and the 91st Highlanders.

From Kingston—14th Regiment.

From Windsor—The 21st Essex Fusiliers.

From Halifax—The 63rd Regiment and the 66th Fusiliers.

One company each, consisting of 43 all ranks, will be sent from the following:

1st Prince of Wales Fusiliers, Montreal.

15th Regiment, Belleville.

19th Regiment, St. Catharines.

22nd Regiment, Woodstock.

24th Regiment, Chatham.

25th Regiment, St. Thomas.

38th Dufferin Rifles, Brantford.

41st Regiment Brockville Rifles.

53rd Sherbrooke Regiment.

57th Peterboro Rangers.
84th St. Hyacinthe Regiment.
86th Three Rivers Regiment.

Each of the thirty-eight regiments will go 350 strong, including all ranks with the exception of the Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto which will be 400 strong. They are ordered to arrive Quebec on July 20th.

From each of the 52 rural corps of eastern Canada there will be one company consisting of 43 of all ranks.

Three corps will include the following Maritime Province regiments:

67th Carleton Light Infantry.
68th Kings County Regiment.
69th Annapolis and Digby Regiment.

71st York Regiment.

73rd, Chatham, N. B.

74th Brunswick Rangers.

75th, Lunenburg.

78th Colchester, Hants and Pictou Regiment.

82nd Charlottetown Regiment.

These companies will report at Quebec July 18th.

The garrison artillery from the city corps will be drawn from the following: 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 7th regiments, 53 all ranks; the Coburg Co., 27 men of all ranks, and the 6th regiment, 250 all ranks.

The permanent force will be represented by all branches of the service.

In view of the fact that all corps will be paid as usual for training at local headquarters or in camps of instruction there will be no additional pay issued to troops taking part in Quebec celebration. An allowance of \$2. per day will be made for horses, the celebration coming in harvest time, when horses are much in demand.

THE MOLLY CODDLE HOP

It's a Rush and Rumpus and had it's Origin in Cleveland, O.—Merry Widow Waltz Also Unpopular With Professors of the Light Fantastic.

CHICAGO, June 12—"Ware the molly among the college young people. It is a coddle two step!"

It will get you if, it can. The whole country will be in its horrible grasp by next autumn unless a single little band of heroes can stay its march. The heroes are the members of the American National Association of Masters of Dancing, who are now in convention in Chicago.

They come from every state and from Canada. The second day of their annual meeting opened up bright and cheerful—even the birds seemed to twitter in waltz time. Then, like handwriting on the wall, or the "no gangs—rain" card on the ball park, the dread shadow of the molly-coddle two-step loomed up. Immediately frantic steps were taken to repulse its rook and at a late hour the re-entrancements were progressing rapidly.

Cleveland O., is to blame for the molly coddle two-step and the contagion is spreading in a web of directions. This is a dissection of its frightful workings:

The young man grabs the young woman at a point abaft her collar bone. They do the "skyscraper clutch," elevating their interlaced digits toward the chandeliers. They two-step. They reverse.

They plunge, they bounce, they hop they dash, they rush—the young man directing the onslaught and his partner caunting victims.

That's how it's done in Cleveland, and they do say that it puts a copper on the dreamy waltz.

"The principal irritation of the molly-coddle two-step is that it is fostered by our best people," said C. Angell Bott, who illustrated the dance and made the other delegates beat it to the side lines. "The dance was originated by an exclusive society set, and it quickly found favor from these folk that we get our best patronage, and it is hard to combat it absolutely. Now everybody is taking it up."

The Merry-Widow waltz seems to be cork-tipped, for it bobs up in meeting at all times and without notice. The masters of the dance wish to repair a cracked impression that the W. W. has popularized the waltz during the past season. They declare it has done no such thing—neither has it put a crimp in the activities of the two-step.

"Most people who waltz to the Merry Widow do the two-step waltz," said one expert. "It is a slovenly figure and merely allows the performers to get around the hall in re-entrancements which is all they want, perhaps. Dancing to the Merry Widow as it is popularly done is like marching to a band and putting down your left foot when every one else is dropping his right foot."
