THE UNIVERSITY

Very gratifying is the official announcement of Premier Robinson that the Act of the legislature passed at the last session, providing for the extension of the New Brunswick University's sphere of usefulness will be brought into operation by next July 1st, and that thereafter the \$5,000 added to the University's endowment by the legislature will then be available to the Senate for the establishment of the proposed department of Forestry, and possibly other chairs to maintain and increase the usefulness and efficiency of the provincial institution.

The additional subsidy of \$130,000 secured from the federal treasury by persistent efforts of the local government, and which the opposition sneered at and discouraged, has enabled the government to thus deal more generously with the University, as with the common schools of the province, increasing the teachers' salaries, and providing them with pensions for their old age.

With its arts and engineering departments well equipped, and a Forestry and other chairs to be added in the near future, with a young and energetic chancellor in Dr. Jones, and a competent staff of instructors, the old institution on College hill, with its more than a century of successful work, in affording higher education to the youth of this province, promises to occupy an increasingly important position among the Canadian Universities, and it is fortunate indeed in having in the present local government and legislature men who are fully impressed with the necessity of keeping the capstone of New Brunswick's educational system quite abreast of the times, ready to do the work for which it was intended.

PLAINS OF ABRAHAM

It must be a source of satisfaction to Earl Grey that the project inaugurated by him for preserving the battlefields of Canada as national parks is meeting with such hearty commendation from the people of Canada, and that there is a splendid prospect of his plans being realized.

Last week's meetings of His Excellency with the representatives of the various Canadian Clubs and the public gathering in Ottawa, addressed by Earl Grey, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Mr. R. L. Borden, M. P. and other prominent gentlemen gave a great impetus to the movement, which will now take practical shape in every part of the country.

Discussing the proposition of reclaiming the plains of Abraham at Quebec and erecting a colossal statue representing the Genius of Peace, the Toronto Globe observes:

"There should be no misunderstanding about the movement. Some may be disposed to regard it as a glorification for war and at variance with that opposition to militarism that has been steadily voiced in these columns. It would be a calamity if Canada ever should arrive at a time when her sons failed to resent aggression, or to defend to the last inch her soil and her institutions. If we were assured that the time had passed when nation shall make war upon nation it might be safe to cease cherishing the great deeds of our forefathers. But if this or succeeding generations are to be imbued with the spirit of that patriotism which impels men to proceed to any extremity in order to hand on unimpaired the integrity and autonomy of their country, then the historic places which remind us of the intrepidity and sacrifices of our fathers must be honored and preserved.

The hundreds of thousands of men who answered the call of Lincoln in the terrible sixties, and left their factories and shops and farms, could not have been assembled under the colors had not the very fibres of their flesh been imbued with the teaching that liberty and the Union were sacred things to be maintained at all hazards. Julia Ward Howe's hymn was no more than an idealized expression of the spirit that led them:

"In the beauty of the Blis Christ was born across the sea,
With a glory in His bosom that transfigures you and me.

As He died to make men holy, let us die to make them free,"

"Those of us who oppose militarism, would be sorry if our opposition could be interpreted as freeing men

from the obligation of resisting aggression, or oppression, or secession. "It is just because war and standing armies and the spirit of jingoism are hateful that we would like to make every citizen feel himself a soldier at the disposal of his country, should she need him. This can be done by making Canada a country worth fighting for, and imbuing our children with correct ideas of what patriotism is. In this view we would be doing something for which posterity would despise us if we allow the Plains of Abraham, where the greatest and most decisive event in our history took place, to lapse into the common or base uses of life and industry."

MR. LEMIEUX'S MISSION

The effort of the Tory party to minimize the result of Hon. Rudolphe Lemieux's recent mission to Japan in the interest of restricted Japanese immigration to Canada will not receive much sympathy either in Canada or the old country, which is watching the question with much interest.

The London Times, referring to Mr. Lemieux's negotiations, says:

"The attempt by a colonial statesman to see for himself all the difficulties and complications involved in foreign negotiations is the best possible object lesson as to the responsibilities which Britain has hitherto had to bear singlehanded. The more, therefore, such common action as Mr. Lemieux's and Sir Claude Macdonald's is initiated the more lively are we and the colonies to understand and sympathize with one another's point of view, and the nearer will we be brought to the real unity of purpose in all that may affect the whole, which is the basis of any empire worthy of the name." The Times warmly praises Mr. Lemieux, "who appears to have put the case with great tact before the Japanese government and made himself popular with all classes at Tokio, while the Canadian government have throughout all shown a statesmanlike and calm dignity which must very much enhance their claims to a larger share in the government of the empire. Altogether, this first essay at negotiating one of the most difficult questions of the day has been attended with honorable success, which is a good augury for future attempts of the kind."

The Times adds: "The responsible Canadian press, though fully convinced of the dangers of unlimited immigration, has shown a laudable reserve and a willingness to enter into the other side of the question."

CURRENT COMMENT

Halifax Chronicle: Mr. John Stanfield's preliminary objections to the petition through which it is sought to investigate the methods of his campaign in Colchester, were obviously not conspicuously impressive, not to say "unshrinkable." The court dismissed them peremptorily, the whole proceedings occupying not more than an hour. But it only goes to show that even this "purity in politics" business has its drawbacks."

DIED AT WORCESTER

Mrs. A. W. Duff, formerly of Kingsclear called away Unexpectedly

Police Magistrate Marsh is in receipt of a telegram from Worcester, Mass., conveying the sad news of the death at that place yesterday, of his niece, Mrs. I. S. Duff, wife of Prof. A. W. Duff, of the staff of the Worcester Polytechnical Institute, formerly of the U. N. B. Mrs. Duff was formerly Miss McIntosh, daughter of the late Mr. James McIntosh of Kingsclear. She was a bright and lovable young woman, with hosts of friends in this locality, who will be shocked to hear of her untimely death. No particulars were given in regard to her death, and it is presumed that it must have been quite sudden.

The deceased graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1894, and was married soon afterwards, residing first at Pardee, Ind., and afterwards at Worcester. She was about forty years of age, and leaves a husband and one daughter. She is also survived by her mother, three sisters and four brothers, viz: John of Kingsclear; Joseph in Montana; Arthur in St. John; Burton, employed by the C. P. R. in the West; Miss Martha McIntosh of New York; Miss Mary McIntosh of Cambridge, and Miss Bessie at home.

The body will be brought to this city for interment, arriving by the noon train on Wednesday. Interment will be made in the Rural Cemetery, Rev. Willard Macdonald officiating.

LICENSE VS. SCOTT ACT

To the Editor of The Herald:

To the editor of the Herald: I was glad to see the letter of A. B. in your columns this evening in regard to the "Canada Temperance Act." No person who is familiar with the conditions prevailing in Fredericton during the past ten years can deny that this Act has been a total failure for it has driven many persons to drink spirits who under other circumstances would have been content with ale and beer, and certainly if men should drink it is much better that they should indulge in the less dangerous and less potent liquor. In St. John the working men under the License system all drink ale which they can obtain at a cheap rate, but in Fredericton as ale cannot be obtained at a cheap rate in consequence of its bulk, men drink whiskey, which costs them twice as much as ale does in St. John. This itself ought to be a strong argument in favor of license. Of course there are people who think that ale ought not to be drunk and no beer however weak, but these do not form a majority of our population. They ought to be content to let others enjoy the same liberties which they claim for themselves and not seek to pass sumptuary laws which cannot be enforced, but while I have the highest respect for the temperance people of this county, I think many of them have been of late going on a wrong tack in their effort to put an end to drinking. Let them try a License Law for a couple of years I feel certain they will be unwilling to go back to the Canada Temperance Act.

TRUTH.

No person shall sell liquor unless licensed.

An inspector shall be appointed by the lieutenant governor who shall inspect all premises seeking a license. (Sec. 5 & 6.) And unless said inspector reports that the premises are satisfactory, and that he knows the applicant to be of good character and repute, a license shall not be granted to him (Sec. 11).

No liquor shall be sold on licensed premises from 10 at night until 6 each morning, and from 7 on Saturday night until 6 Monday morning, (Sec. 48) under a penalty of \$50 for first offence, \$100 for second offence and \$200 and forfeiture of license for third offence. If the sale is on Sunday between 6 in the morning and 12 at night the license is immediately forfeited upon any conviction. If a light is seen burning on the premises during prohibited hours, this shall be sufficient proof of a sale to warrant a conviction. If any person licensed to sell liquor permits drunkenness or disorderly conduct to take place on his premises, or supplies liquor to any drunken person or suffers persons of bad character to meet upon his premises, he is liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$50.

Any person holding a license who sells liquor to a person under 21 years of age, is liable to a fine of from \$10 to \$20.

Any person interested may apply to the police magistrate for an order forbidding the sale of liquor to any person who wastes his means or endangers the happiness of his family by drinking liquor, and any person then supplying to or procuring liquor for such drunkard shall be liable to a fine of from \$25 to \$50. (Sec. 109)

Any person may inform a policeman to investigate and prosecute. (Sec. 113).
