THE CAPITALS PRAISED

Marathons Captain says the Team is the Best he ever Played Against

(St. John Times.)
"They have the best team I have ever played against," said Capt. Eddie Mooney, of the Marathons, who came in from Fredericton on the Montreal train today, where the Greeks were trimmed 12 to 0 by the Capitals of Fredericton last night.

Asked if he thought the Capitals would win from the Moncton Victorias the Star's trophy holders, Captain Mooney said "Yes, but, of course, last night they were playing on their own ice, and they have it down to a nicety. However, taken from the showing we have made against both, I believe that the Capitals are faster than Moncton. They play perfect combination, and their shooting is accurate and hard. Then, their defence is almost invincible; Morrison, Music and McDonald putting up sterling hockey. Jack D. is a splendid all round hockey man, and as good a forward as a defence man. Being asked if the Fredericton team played good clean hockey Captain Mooney said further: "They certainly did, the best of feeling prevailed and there was no rough work at all. In fact they are a fine lot of fellows."

The Greeks captain could not account for the defeat to any one department of the team. "They simply outplayed us," he said. "The game, however," he added, "was not as one sided as the score would indicate."

The Marysville Crescents go to Moncton tomorrow to play the Victorias of that city. The Capitals will play the Victorias at Moncton Thursday of this week. The St. John Marathons will play at Marysville on Wednesday night and on Friday night they play a return match with the Capitals at St. John. The Moncton Victorias play here on the 30th and at Marysville on the following evening.

ST. JOHN TELEGRAPHERS WON.

The pangs of defeat of two previous years were forgotten by the Telegraphers of St. John in the joy of victory when they defeated their old rivals of this city in an exciting game of hockey Saturday night by a score of 4-0, and every one of the party is wearing "the smile that won't come off."

Referee McKinnon blew his whistle at 9.15 and the puck started for St. John's goal, with Fenety pushing it in a manner that showed he intended to lose no time in scoring for his team. He failed to get past Emery at cover point, however, who gave the puck to Conway, the latter taking it the length of the rink and scoring the first goal for St. John in three minutes. Colborne scored the second goal after twelve minutes' play on a pass from a scrimmage behind the Fredericton goal. The rest of the half was full of individual rushes, but both sides did very little combination work, and the score stood 2-0 at the end of the first half.

The play centred in Fredericton's territory for the best part, and Goal Keeper Smith had some good opportunities to show he was the right man in the right place.

The second half was probably faster than the first, and both sides indulged in heavy checking and slashing, when either goal was in danger. Purcell and Oulton for St. John, showed up well, and scored the third and fourth goals respectively for St. John. St. John's defence was good, and Knapman had only a few shots to turn aside, and he handled these in his old time form. Conway and Emery both made good sprints up the ice, but McAdam, at point for Fredericton played a star game and saved his goal on numerous occasions. Payson and Colborne brought out rounds of applause from the spectators for their attempts to score. Gibbs and Moore made the best showing on the home team, but Laforest and Fenety were close seconds. Harrison showed poor form and was inclined to rough it. He was cautioned several times by the referee. The line-up:

SCOTT ACT VS. LICENSE

REV. MR. PAISLEY DEAD

Prominent Methodist Clergyman Expired Suddenly at St. John

SACKVILLE, N. B., January 20.—(Special.)—Rev. Chas. Paisley, M. A. of Mount Allison University and professor of the New Testament and church history, died very suddenly at 2 o'clock of heart failure. He was as well as usual yesterday, being able to attend church.

He was sixty-five years old. He leaves a wife, who was formerly Miss Louise Fratersawers, of Halifax, two daughters, Mrs. William Matson, of this place and Mrs. Chas. Johnson, of River Philip, N. S., and one son, Herbert F. S., editor of the Sackville Tribune. One sister, Miss Mary A. Paisley resides in Halifax and one brother, Thomas J., of Newton, Iowa.

The funeral will take place from the Methodist church here at 2.30 p. m. on Wednesday afternoon.

FRACTURED HIS SKULL

Longshoreman the Victim of a Fatal Accident at St. John Today
