A WOMAN SUICIDE

Former St. John Resident Sent a Bullet Through Her Brain While Visiting Her Sister

Despondent through the loss of her position as a seamstress in one of New York's big dressmaking establishments, Mrs. Eliza Faurote committed suicide by shooting herself through the body sometime during Tuesday night, at the home of her sister, Mrs. LeBaron Flewelling, near St. John, whom she had been visiting for the past few weeks.

Although she had given indications of being melancholy at different times during her stay, on the night of the tragedy Mrs. Faurote seemed cheerful, having spent a couple of hours in pleasant intercourse with the family before retiring.

The strange part of the affair is that the inmates of the household heard no noise, although two shots had been fired from the pistol, one of which had penetrated the wall of her bedroom. The revolver, which was a 23 long, fully loaded, with the exception of two chambers. Apparently the despairing woman had tried the weapon before firing the fatal shot.

The revolver was still clutched in her hand, when her sister, alarmed

because she had not risen at her usual eight yesterday morning to a hour, went to the room at half-past eight.

Naturally the sight was an unaccountable one, and Dr. Gray of Fairville, who had been attending Mrs. Faurote, was at once sent for. He said that death must have been instantaneous. The bullet hole was in the right temple.

Dr. McFarlane, the coroner for that district, was telephoned for, and visited the scene of the tragedy about eleven o'clock. After making a careful inquiry he decided that an inquest was unnecessary, and gave a permit for burial.

Mrs. Faurote who was a handsome and well-preserved woman of forty-seven, was a daughter of the late William Olive of Carleton. She went to New York about twenty-seven years ago, where she was married. She did not live with her husband, but supported herself with her needle.

Owing to the recent financial depression having extended to the business in which she was engaged, she decided to pay a visit to her sister, Mrs. Flewelling, of the Manawagonish Road, St. John county, and came there about six weeks ago, giving up her rooms in New York and storing her furniture.

The parents of the deceased are both dead, and her only sister is Mrs. LeBaron Flewelling, at whose home the tragedy occurred. Three brothers, Henry, Charles, and Oliver, reside in New York.

BARRIE, Ont., Jan. 2.—The south-bound G. T. R. passenger train from Penetang took a triple somersault down a 35-foot embankment, six miles north of Barrie, at 7.30 yesterday morning. Strange as it may seem, the train landed right side up at the bottom, and all the passengers and the crew escaped without even a broken bone. There is a still grade at the point where the accident happened, and the train slowly climbed this, when from some unknown reason the tender, express combination, baggage and second-class coach left the rails and plunged into the ditch below. Only the locomotive remained on the track. A stove in the second class car set fire to the coach, and in a few minutes after the passengers had been removed three cars were completely destroyed.

Marrying Age in England.

For the last five years there is a marked hesitancy on the part of bachelors to assume matrimonial responsibilities, and the age at which both spinsters and bachelors meet at the altar grows greater at every decade. A century ago, eighteen was considered the normal age of the bride. Many thousands of marriages took place at sixteen. If at twenty-five a woman was still unmarried, her chances were considered very remote; at twenty-eight she was placed on the celibates' shelf, and at thirty took to wearing the lace cap of middle age. To-day, the average age of brides in England is twenty-five years and five months. Out of 1,000 brides only 147 are minors. The tendency to later marriages is marked among the young men in the Kingdom. The average age of a bridegroom is now twenty-seven years. More marry at forty than ever before; one bachelor put off matrimony until he was past a hundred; and the half of postponement is growing so strongly upon the sex that thousands go to their graves, alas, without ever having married at all! Out of every 1,000 husbands forty-four only are minors, half as many as there were forty years ago.—Strand Magazine.

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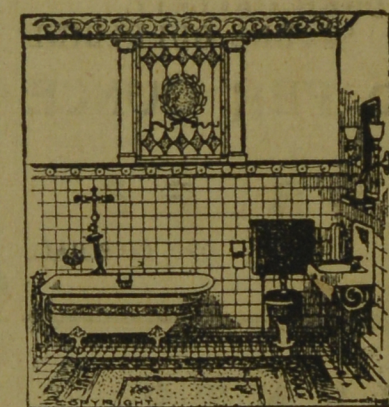
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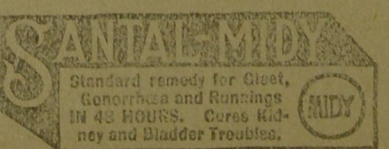
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
