THE McLELLAN CUP

Fredericton Club Sending Two Strong Kinks to Fight for the Trophy. Schedule of Games

The first match of the season for the McLellan cup will be played at St. John next Tuesday between two rinks each of the Fredericton and Thistle clubs.

The trophy, which is open to competition among all the clubs of the Maritime Provinces, is now held by the Thistles, who captured it from Truro last season, and successfully defended it against Chatham, New Glasgow, St. Stephen and Moncton. Fredericton challenged for the cup last year, but the season closed before the game could be pulled off, and so the local men are getting the first opportunity of the present season.

The Fredericton skips, James Tibbitts and Thomas L. Fowler, were elected last year, and they have chosen the following rinks for Tuesday's match, subject to change, however, as some of the players named may not be able to go:

The match will create a great deal of interest, and if the Fredericton club wins, it will defend possession of the trophy on its own ice, against the clubs that have filed challenges for the present season.

In connection with the trophy the trustees to whose care it has been committed, Mr. Frank Dexter of Truro, and Mr. J. S. Gregory of St. John, have issued the following:

"The request made by the challenging clubs that an effort be made this year to play all games challenged for the McLellan cup during the present curling season has had our careful consideration and meets with our approval.

In order to carry out this idea we do hereby name and appoint Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week as the days on which matches for this cup are to be played, and these days are to be known to the curlers of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick as McLellan Cup days. This plan will permit clubs challenging for or defending the cup to make their arrangements accordingly.

The trustees have already ruled that in case of a tie the cup shall remain in the custody of the club holding it at the time the match is played.

No postponement of any match game will be recognized by the trustees except for reasons covered by Section nine (9) of the original rules for play adopted at Truro on January 23rd, 1906.

In case ice is unfit for play as provided by section 9, a game scheduled for Tuesday may be played (if agreeable to both challenging and defending clubs) on the following day instead of waiting for Thursday, in which case the game scheduled for that Thursday will be played on the Tuesday following, each game scheduled for later dates advancing one date. In case ice is unfit for play, the game scheduled for Thursday may be played (if agreeable to both challenging and defending clubs) on the following day or Saturday, in which case, however, the game scheduled for the following Tuesday is to be played as scheduled, otherwise the Thursday game unable to be played on account of unfit ice is to be played on the following Tuesday, and each game scheduled for later dates advances one date.

We publish herewith a schedule of challenges in the order as filed with the secretary of the Thistle club of St. John (the club now holding the cup) on or before December 16th, 1907.

SHOT BRIDEGROOM

Father of Bride Fired the Fatal Bullet

DILLON, Montana, Jan. 3.—An attempt to suddenly alter wedding plans resulted last evening in the death of the prospective bridegroom at the hands of his fiancée's father. The man slain was E. A. Lawrence, of Butte, Montana, who was to have married the sixteen-year-old daughter of Fred. Baker.

A few minutes before the hour set for the wedding, Baker and Lawrence had some trivial difference, whereupon Lawrence told Justice of the Peace Rich, who was to tie the knot, that the wedding would not take place at the home of the bride, but at the home of Mrs. Frank Lawyer, her cousin. Lawrence turned to re-enter the Baker home, and was instantly shot dead by Baker.

DRESSING FOR DINNER.

A Habit to Be Cultivated by All Classes of Persons.
