

VERY COSTLY LEADER.

Suggestion that Country Might Very Well Abolish Mr Borden's Salary

Halifax Chronicle: Mr. R. L. Borden, M. P., who is doing bidding of the Robble-Rogers outfit in Manitoba in obstructing the passage of the election reform bill and holding up the public business, is in receipt of a public salary of Seven Thousand Dollars as leader of the Opposition. In addition, he gets a sessional indemnity of \$2,500, making a total of Nine Thousand Five Hundred Dollars, that goes into the pockets of Mr. Borden from the Dominion Treasury. A good deal bigger men than Mr. Borden ever will be are serving their country usefully at a much smaller salary. This handsome salary, equivalent to about twenty-seven dollars per day, is paid to Mr. Borden by the government. It is paid to him as leader of the opposition. Mr. Borden has ceased to be leader of the opposition. He is now leader of the obstructionists. While the Canadian people may tolerate hiring a leader

to oppose, they are not going to stand for hiring a leader to obstruct. The government, we beg to suggest, might find a way to bring the belligerent ally of Mr. "Bob" Rogers to his senses, by cutting off Mr. Borden's seven thousand salary. If he is determined to hold up the business of parliament and deprive the men who are employed in the civil service of their salaries, let him do his fighting at his own expense. He is a wealthy man. Why should the taxpayers of Canada be called upon to provide so generously from the public chest for a politician who not only has no claim upon their generosity, but has so little regard for the public welfare that he is abusing his parliamentary privileges in a blindly partisan fight against a measure of justice and fair play. Mr. Borden has peremptorily rejected the admittedly fair proposal of the Prime Minister. He deserves no further consideration at the hands of Liberals. Cut him off the pay roll!

SEARCH FOR VICTIMS.

Work Continues on the Laporte Murder Farm.

Laporte, Ind., May 16.—The Guinness death farm yesterday gave up more corroborative evidence as to the extent of the tragedies there.

Two more watches were found in the debris of the ruined house, and these taken in connection with nine previously discovered, show that at least one more person met death on the place. The bodies of nine male victims have been unearthed but ten men's watches have been discovered. Sheriff Snitzer announced after the finding of yesterday that he will resume digging operations with the hope of uncovering additional skeletons.

A number of globules of metal found in the mining operations are being examined by experts to see whether they are bits of gold used by dentists for fillings or crowns of teeth.

The discovery of the supposed missing left hand of the body of Mrs. Guinness, with two rings that make its identification still more conclusive, leaves little room for doubt that the proprietress of the murder farm paid for her crime in her own house of death. The initials engraved inside the things show conclusively that they belonged to Mrs. Guinness.

The attorneys for Lamphere are said to be looking for David Havens, who, it is supposed, aided in uncovering the bodies of the persons whom Lamphere is accused of murdering.

The attorneys claim that Havens has declared that when the bodies were found in the cellar of the Guinness home on April 28 they were lying on the floor, and that there

was no debris under them. They assert that testimony to this effect at the trial will do much to clear their client of the charges against him, arguing that the circumstances show that the bodies had been placed in the cellar previous to the beginning of the fire which destroyed the farmhouse.
