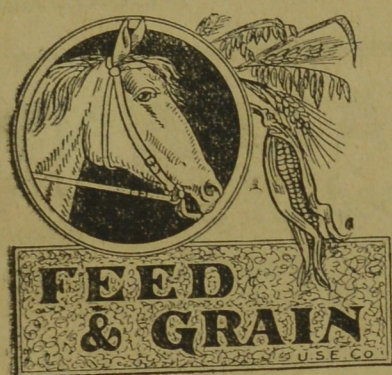

ONTARIO A DUMPING GROUND.

Indiscriminate Immigration Strongly Condemned in Official Report.

The thirty-eighth annual report of the inspector of prisons and public charities, given to the Legislature recently, is almost entirely devoted to accounts, but a preliminary statement by Dr. Bruce Smith fills eight or nine pages. There are in Ontario 65 hospitals, 35 refuges, 31 orphanages, 3 homes for incurables, 2 convalescent homes, 2 Magdalen asylums and 23 county houses of refuge.

In the hospitals 45,551 patients were treated in the year ending Sept. 30, 1907. Among these there were 2,799 deaths, a percentage of 6.14. The amounts received from all sources were \$1,210,836, and the total expenditures were \$1,415,148. The average daily cost of patients was \$1.16, which compares very favorably with United States figures.

The report has a special reference

to the class of one hundred women, many under 16 years of age, who are to be found in refuges and homes, nursing their offspring. They could not be certified insane and sent to asylums and yet were unable to protect themselves. A special institution is suggested for their care.

"The debasing and demoralizing influence of an unrestrained and feeble-minded woman in a community," says the report, "is beyond the comprehension of the uninitiated."

The undesirable immigrant class is also the subject of comment, and very strong language is used. "More than ever before Ontario has been made during the past year, the dumping ground of a most undesirable class." "The system of the Dominion Government of bonusing agents to send out in an apparently indiscriminate manner a class of people totally unfit to provide for themselves is deplorable."

REWARDS FOR CORPSES.

Horrible Scenes Along The Yangtse Kiang River.

VICTORIA, B. C., May 16—Further advices of the disaster at Hankow in which 10,000 Chinese were drowned have been received here by mail. The lack of warning was due to the absence of an official to whom the warning telegram was sent and the river craft were overwhelmed. Shanghai newspapers have lengthy accounts of terrible scenes witnessed along the river banks. Hundreds of bodies were being recovered, rewards being paid by the officials for each corpse brought ashore. The papers are full of notes like these:

"At the Lung Wung Miao a large junk was ready to start with thirty people on board when she was sunk and the whole of them drowned. At the Ta Ma Tou there were fifty rice boats and all went under. Of their crews only thirteen men escaped. A Mandarin boat with the Mandarin and his family on board was carried into the middle of the Yangtse, where the waves ran mountain high, and nothing has been seen of the Mandarin or the boat since. Five great junks have been recovered intact and notice given for the owners to come and claim them but no one has turned up. A fleet of boats laden with cash intended for the purchase of tea up country put into the Han that night fearing a storm. Nothing remains of them. The value of the coin on board was upwards of \$150,000.

COL. TAYLOR SAID TO HANE RESIGNED.

Commandant o, R. M. C. at Kingston Has Difference With Building Contractors.

KINGSTON, Ont., May 15—Col. Taylor, commandant of the Royal Military College is reported to have forwarded his resignation to the Minister of Militia at Ottawa, as a result of the dispute between the college authorities and Sullivan & Langdon, contractors who are erecting an addition to the college buildings.

When the workmen employed on the new building went to work Tuesday they found that the building used as an office and storeroom had been broken open, and the tools, furniture and plans, thrown out.

Recently one of the college authorities wrote a letter to the contractors, asking for the dismissal of a carter, who, he alleged, had insulted a non-com officer's wife. He threatened that if his requests were not complied with, he would deny the contractors a certain wharf which he had loaned them to pile bricks on.

The carter accused of insulting the officer's wife, denied that he had exchanged any words with her. His helper, however, had spoken with the woman, but denied that he had used insulting language. The contractors refused to dismiss the man. Mr. Sullivan, the senior member of the firm has made a complaint to the authorities at Ottawa and talks of bringing an action against the parties responsible for throwing his property out of the building.

Surgeon's Plaster.
