Pigeons Superseded.

The Admiralty have decided to do away with the carrier pigeon service in the royal navy, and all the pigeon-lofts on the home stations are to be abolished. The loft at Malta is to be retained, however, and it has also been decided not to interfere with the volunteer carrier pigeon service. This decision is no doubt due to the wonderful progress which has been made with wireless telegraph. When the naval pigeon service was established, wireless telegraphy was unknown, where as now it is generally used for communications over a long distance, and is far more reliable than carriers. All the principal ships of His Majesty's fleet are now equipped, and round the coast are a series of wireless signal stations, manned by skilled operators. Signals are continually passing from the shore to men-at-war far away at sea. When the Montagu went ashore another ship steaming off the Lizard was "called up" by the Admiralty and directed to go to her aid, the telegrams are transmitted across the Bay of Biscay to Gibraltar.

Body of a Man Who Died From Intoxication Found at Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 18.—While out picking May flowers in Point Pleasant park, Saturday, Miss Page came across the dead body of an elderly man, who was later identified by the police as James Hearn, a seafaring man, belonging to Harbour Grace Newfoundland.

The man was found lying face downward, and Miss Page, thinking he was under the influence of liquor, and would smother if left in that position, notified a soldier on his way to one of the forts. On examination it was found that life was extinct.

Hearn had been drinking heavily during the past week, and it is thought that while under the influence of liquor he fell asleep and smothered.

Coffins Are Missing.

A strange event has startled the usually quiet little hamlet of Hall Green, near Birmingham, England. Twenty-six years ago a married couple named Turner purchased a small piece of ground in the parish churchyard for the purpose of a family burial place.

A short while afterward they had occasion to use the grave, a young son and daughter having died within a brief period of each other. The father himself died recently, and arrangements were made for the interment to take place.

While engaged in opening the grave, the gravediggers came across an inscription plate which had been on the little girl's coffin, but no trace of the coffin could be found. The other coffin, that was known to have contained the body of the boy, had also vanished.

The question that is now asked is, Where are the two coffins, for it is not at all likely that they would have decayed in such a comparatively short space of time.

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D., 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$ 35 00

The same for each successive evening performance, 30 00

The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery, 30 00

The same as above without scenery, 25 00

The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night, 27 00

The same without scenery per night, 23 00

For one week stand with scenery, 135 00

For the same without scenery 120 00

For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light) 15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery, 15 00

For the same without scenery 10 00

For each matinee, local talent only	7 50
For each political meeting	15 00
On the Sabbath for religious or temperance meetings, one meeting	10 00
For two meetings same person, same day	15 00
For rehearsals for afternoon	3 00
For rehearsals for evening	5 00
For each motion picture entertainment owned and operated by residents of the city, per night	20 00
The same for three to five consecutive nights, per night	18 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light)	10 00
