ON THE WAR PATH.

Liberals of Northumberland Meeting in Convention to Select Candidate.

Hon. John P. Burchill the Likely Man and
No Doubt of his Election.

SWIM'S BROTHER AMONG THE LIBERAL DELEGATES.

CHATHAM, N. B., Nov. 19.—(Special)—The Liberal convention will open here this afternoon at 3 o'clock and it is expected that every parish in the county will be represented.

Delegates are already arriving in town by train and boat, and by the time the convention opened the attendance will reach the one hundred mark. Among the delegates this morning were those from Blackville, Doaktown, and other points in the parish of Blissville. F. D. Swim's home parish. They laugh at Swim's chances and declare he will have hard work to get a majority in his own parish.

Henry Swim, the Conservative candidate's brother, is among the Liberal delegates. Referring to his brother's chances of election, he said: "Give us a good man and we will show him where he is."

Swim has no chance in Chatham,

or in the down river parishes, and if he has hard sledding in the upper river sections he will be snowed under.

In all probability the Liberals will choose Hon. John P. Burchill as their standard bearer.

Mr. and Mrs. Burchill are now travelling in the United States, but Mr. Burchill's friends are certain that if given the nomination of the united Liberal party he will accept and there is no doubt of his election.

The local Liberal Parish Association held a great meeting last evening in the Town hall. President J. D. B.F. McKenzie was in the chair, and the meeting unanimously adopted a resolution that Liberals should contest the local bye-election.

The party is in fine fettle, and they go into the fight with the determination to win.

W. S. Loggie, M.P., was present and gave a stirring speech.

EDITORIAL COMMENT.

The Northumberland Tories wouldn't let Hazen "finish his work" with Hutchison.

When rogues fall out honest men get their due. Looks like that in Northumberland does it not?

Hon. John Morrissey says the Tory candidate in Northumberland will have to swim without the aid of the chief commissioner.

Reputation seems to be popular in Northumberland. The Tory convention repudiated Hutchison and Hazen, and Morrissey repudiated Swim.

After all don't you suppose the fine Italian hand of Mr. Donald Morrison navigated the Tory convention's repudiation of Mr. Ernest Hutchison. Mr. Morrison has his razor out for Mr. Morrissey and all his works.

Sir MacKenzie Bowell discovered a Tory "nest of traitors" at Ottawa and Mr. Hazen apparently has discovered one in Northumberland. In the historic words of the late Mr. Tarte "they're fighting like blazes."

The local graft organ had not a word to say editorially last night on the political crisis in Northumberland. The Tory revolt against Mr. Hazen the nomination of Mr. Swim and the backdown of Mr.

Hutchison were too much for it.

Mr. Carvell, M. P., seems to have given the Hazen government a bad half hour at the Carleton Liberal convention. Broken pledges, absolute dishonesty in its promises to the people, the Hazen outfit was held up to scorn by the popular M. P.

The claim is made by Tory organs that Mr. Hazen has not had time to develop his policy. Yes but he had plenty of time to go around this country slandering his opponents in the federal campaign. Mr. Hazen was foolish enough to suppose that the Tory party was coming into power at Ottawa and that he was to be one of the new Tory Ministers there so he let the local government business rip for six weeks while he did his best to destroy Laurier.

The Prince Edward Island government had rather a narrow escape in Wednesday's elections. The returns show 16 Liberals and 14 Conservatives, and Premier Hazzard lost three of his ministers, the commissioner for agriculture, and two others without portfolio. When the government side of the new House elects its speaker, the administration will have a majority of only one on a division—rather too narrow a margin for comfort and satisfactory conduct of the public business.

UPHAM THE CHOICE.

Strong Candidate Will Carry the Liberal
Standard to Victory in Carleton
Local Bye Election.

MR. CARVELL'S SLASHING ATTACK ON THE HAZEN GOVERNMENT.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., Nov. 14.—

George W. Upham, lumberman and millman, of Woodstock, and one of the most popular men in the whole county, was unanimously nominated yesterday afternoon by the Liberals of Carleton assembled in Graham's opera-house. The gathering numbered close to 500 and was thoroughly representative. Never before have the Carleton Liberals been so enthusiastic or so hopeful. They have their opponents on the run and will put up a whirlwind fight during the rest of the month.

President Barter said it was a matter of great regret that advanced age and bad health forced him to resign his office. He called for nominations for a new president. The only name submitted was that of Warden Frank R. Shaw, who was accordingly elected. The retiring president was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for his long and zealous services, eulogistic addresses in support of the motion being made by F. B. Carvell, M. P., Hon. W. P. Jones and others.

The actual work of the day was then proceeded with, beginning with the appointment of a nominating committee.

UPHAM THE CHOICE

It took the committee but a few minutes to make a choice, only one ballot being necessary. George W. Upham receiving an overwhelming majority. The vote was immediately made unanimous, whereupon the committee through its chairman, Chas. E. Gallagher, submitted Mr. Upham's name for ratification.

The vast audience to a man rose to its feet and cheered for minutes. It was one of the greatest receptions a candidate ever got in this county.

When the applause had partially subsided, Mr. Upham came forward to speak. He said he had gone down last March fighting a good fight, but owing to the fact that the Liberals were then disunited, a great many having listened to the pleasing promises of the enemy, defeat was not to be wondered at. Now things are different. The Liberals are thoroughly united, triumphant, and confident. The Hazen government is discredited and even its strongest supporters are inclined to admit that it is one of the biggest disappointments the country has ever known. As for himself he would conduct the fairest and hardest fight of which he was capable and with the assistance of the party felt assured that the county would be redeemed.

CARVELL'S RINGING SPEECH

Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P., who followed, delivered a scathing criticism of the local administration, showing that the Hazen government had violated every pledge which it had made in opposition. They had given every assurance, he said, that they would repeal the old road law and hand over the management to the municipalities. Instead of doing this, they had retained the most vicious principle of provincial control of the boards and grants. All public works were to be put in public tender and given to the lowest bidder, but in every instance in Carleton county, the system of day's work had been employed to their that.
