THE COLDEST ON RECORD.

Spring Blizzard Sweeps Over the British Isles--Worst for Twenty Years.

London Daily Mail--Not within the memory of man has so fierce a blizzard swept the British Isles as that which prevailed for thirty six hours on Thursday and Friday. Weather such as was experienced on those two days is not seen once in 200 years in this country.

Snow whitened the country during the early part of Easter week and the ground being covered only to the depth of only an inch or two. But on Thursday heavy falls occurred and by Friday morning the land was covered with a white mantle to the depth of twelve inches in some places.

The following table shows the depth of snow in various places:
Scotland, from 6 to 12 inches.
England, N. from 5 to 8 inches.
Ireland, S. from 2 to 4 inches.
Ireland, N. from 3 to 8 inches.
England, E. from 6 to 12 inches.
England, W. 3 to 5 inches.
England, S. 1 to 9 inches.
Wales, from 2 to 6 inches.

The blizzard caused a remarkable lowering of the temperature for this time of the year (mid-spring) in the north of England as much as 26 degrees of frost was recorded, and generally the temperature was the lowest ever recorded in these islands at so late a date in the year.

The damage to fruit trees all over the country is extensive, and it is feared the blizzard will result in the destruction of small crops, especially of certain kinds of pears and of damsons and cherries. Large flocks of lambs have been lost in the snow.

It is feared that considerable damage has been caused to the fruit plantations in the Vale of Evesham, where the trees are in full bloom. Growers state that at least one third of the early coloured plums, such as Monarchs, Prolifics and Chars have been destroyed. Egg plums and Victorias are said not to have suffered, but currants and gooseberries are much damaged, particularly black currants. Apples have escaped, but asparagus has been put back.

In the Tiverton district all the plum and pear blossoms have been ruined and vegetation has been blighted to such an extent that hay is again having to be taken into the fields for the cows.

In West Somerset the pears and plums which were in full bloom, and especially and there will be consequently be only small crops of these fruits. Millions of flowering bulbs have been destroyed in the St. Albans district while early plums thick with blossoms, have perished.

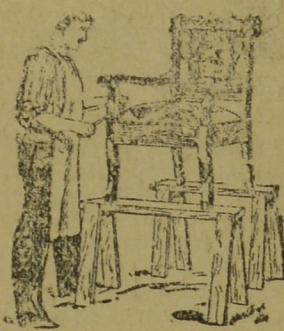
