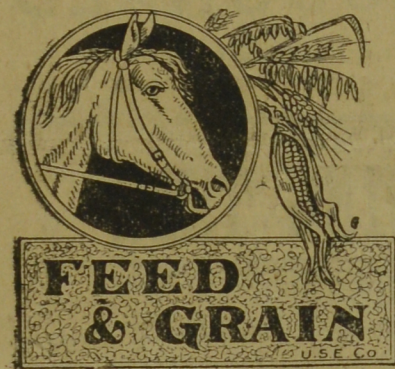

THE LEGISLATURE.

Dr. Pugsley Owes the Province Nothing, but It is Indebted to Him Over \$3,000.

Highway Bill Again Held up—Monday's Light Business.

The House met Monday at 3 p.m. The act to amend the Probate Courts act was read a third time. Several bills passed their second reading. The report of the standing committee was presented by Hon. Mr. McLeod, recommending a number of private bills.

In answer to Mr. Sproul's inquiry regarding the circumstances connected with Hon. William Pugsley's overdraft of \$4,331.64, Hon. Mr. Fleming said the overdraft of the amount stated as it appeared on Oct. 31st, 1907, was not an advance for overdraft for that particular amount. It was a balance of overdrawn account, running several years and amounting to different sums at different times. He then submitted the account of Hon. Wm. Pugsley with the province from Jan. 1907 to the time that the advance was repaid in full. The overdraft was repaid by cheque dated 27th Feb., 1908, and it passed to the credit of the province 9th March following.

Mr. Munroe enquired if the government had been informed as to irregularities in the polling booth at Arthurette in the county of Victoria, and as to whether or not the sitting member for Victoria, Mr. Tweeddale, was present at the poll in question. Hon. Mr. McLeod presented a petition from the town of Marysville for amendments to its Incorporation act, and introduced acts to authorize the city of Fredericton to establish a gold medal for the University of New Brunswick, to aid the Hartt Boot & Shoe company, Ltd., and to issue debentures.

INTERPROVINCIAL BRIDGE.

Mr. LaBillois, in making his motion for a return of all correspondence between the Dominion government, the Quebec government and the government of New Brunswick, in regard to the Inter-provincial Highway bridge at Metapedia, said he felt it his duty to bring this matter before the government and the legislature. The Intercolonial railway had decided some time ago to replace their present bridge at Metapedia by a modern structure, and it was thought by the federal and local members of Bonaventure and Restigouche that the old structure might be used as a highway bridge. A meeting was held at which the Dominion, Quebec and New Brunswick governments were represented with their engineers. And it was found that the present piers were long enough to carry two bridges. An understanding was then arrived at, to endeavor to get the three governments to come to some arrangement whereby the old super-structure and the present piers could be utilized for a highway bridge. Afterwards there was a dispute among the people interested in the locality as to the best location for a bridge.

Mr. LaBillois then read the report of the Dominion engineer, which stated that the bridge could and should be built upon the present bridge piers at an estimated cost of \$40,635. Continuing he said that Hon. Mr. Pugsley had suggested that if New Brunswick and Quebec would each give \$5,000, the Dominion would make up the balance. The late government had passed an order-in-

council to give the \$5,000. This order was not on file through some misunderstanding, but he could assure the House that it had been passed, and he read a copy. He asked the government to favorably consider the matter as it was a public work very necessary to the business interests of all the people in the upper part of Restigouche county.

Mr. Currie, in seconding the motion warmly endorsed all Mr. LaBillois had said.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey said the papers asked for would be brought down.

Hon. Mr. Hazen said under the rules of the House the time for introducing private bills had elapsed. He moved that the time be extended for one week, and urged all the members to get their proposed legislation in within that time.

Hon. Mr. Fleming replying to Mr. McKown's question in the latter's absence read by Mr. LaBillois, as to a bill for professional services rendered by the government by Hon. Dr. Pugsley, the total amount being \$2,600. He then gave item.

In answer to Mr. Currie's question as to the amount at credit of the Road Tax Fund in Restigouche, Hon. Mr. Morrissey said that the Secretary-Treasurer for Restigouche reported to the Department of Public Works, April 2nd, 1908, that he had on hand on March 1st, last \$1295.09, to the credit of the Road Tax Fund.

FOREST PROTECTION.

The House went into committee on the bill to amend the Act respecting the protection of the woods from fires.

Hon. Mr. Grier said that the object of the bill was to provide a penalty for tearing or otherwise destroying the notices posted up in different parts of the Crown Lands for the protection of those forests. At present it was found that a good deal of damage was done in this way for which no punishment was provided and it was therefore proposed to make it an offence to destroy any such notices under a penalty of not less than fifty dollars.

Mr. LaBillois, whilst approving of the object of the bill he thought the minimum penalty was rather high and that it might work an injustice to any person mistaking the notice for one of the other numerous kinds of private notices posted up. He thought a penalty of ten dollars would be ample.

Mr. Grimmer said it was quite impossible for anyone to make a mistake and it was most important that the notices should be kept up at any cost.

Mr. Currie wanted to know what would happen in case a man could not afford to pay a fifty dollar fine? It might be that a notice might be torn down or destroyed by accident.

Hon. Mr. Hazen said that a man would have to go to prison for such period as the magistrate should consider the case deserved. If it could be proved that the offence was an accident, the magistrate would take that into consideration.

The bill was agreed to. The bills to amend the Consolidated Statutes 1903, relating to the Law Library and respective Notaries Public were also agreed to.

COFFIN UNDER HIS COUCH.

Ohio Man Has Also Made all Arrangements for His Funeral.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, May 9.—It is not every one who cares to have his coffin kept in the house where he is living, and, in fact, there are but few who could be brought to even consider such a thing. For a husband and wife to have coffins for themselves, which they keep in their own home ready to receive them when the last summons comes, seems extraordinary. That they should keep the coffins under their beds and sleep over them every night seems almost beyond reason.

Yet Charles C. Breuer and his wife Mrs. George Lee Breuer, residents of Cincinnati's fashionable suburb, Clifton, and reputed to be worth \$1,000,000, are doing all these things and think nothing of it.

COST \$500 EACH.

Months ago Mr. Breuer, fearing that death might overtake him and his wife without proper preparations having been made for it, gave the to a well known Cincinnati undertaker and had handsome coffins made. The caskets are of heavy solid mahogany, lined with copper throughout and especially prepared for hermetical sealing.

These two caskets, although plain in appearance, are said to have cost in the neighborhood of \$500 each. It required a great deal of labor and expense to manufacture them.

Besides having the coffins made,

NO SECRET ABOUT IT. Mr. Breuer makes no pretense of secrecy about his funeral arrangements, although he says himself he does not expect to die for a few years yet.

"Why shouldn't I be prepared," said he. "I am living well now and want to be assured that I'll be buried right when I am dead. I don't care about all the fuss generally made at funerals. What I want most is to be well housed under six feet of earth, and not put away in a flimsy coffin that returns to dust in a few months time."

"If some of my enemies should dig me up thirty or forty years after I am dead, they'll find me just as they did in life—with the same look of determination on my face. They're trying to rob me of everything I've got, but they won't rob me of a decent burial."
