BASEBALL BRIEFS.

Pitcher Tom Hughes, last year with Montreal, now with Newark, is a very slow pitcher at any time, but with men on bases he is the limit. One of Big McConnell's wild pitches in Monday's game at Providence split catcher Archer's finger, he retired in the third inning in favor of Ryan. Boston Globe—Thoney is the only other regular of the Sox to keep up to the 300 mark, the drop last week among the others having been notable. Thoney's fall of three points was the smallest of the group, the others ranging up to 78 points for Lord. McConnell, Thoney, Wagner and Burdick were the gainers on the fielding side.

One Trus Cobb is endeavoring to show reason for his holding out for a big stipend. He sure is the real goos. Friday he hit around four runs, and was tagged out at the plate by inches when he tried to score a run for himself by wallowing the ball to the fence. Detroit beat Chicago 4 to 2. Cobb doing all the hitting which drove in the quartette of runs. They can't clamp the lid on that 20 year old kid.

Manager Chance of Chicago is a bit worried about his failure to hit the ball in his old stride. None of the Cubs is hitting up to his best form, but Chance in particular, has been slow in starting to connect. Evers explains the slump by saying the team always was backward about batting in the spring. He seems to think that with regular practice during the month of May the blunders will be produced as steadily as in the past.

Hughie Jennings says that any talk of disunion in his team is foolish. They are as united and as eager to win as any band of ball players that ever trod a diamond. They are just disorganized and are now making desperate efforts under Jennings to get themselves together. Can they do it? Jennings faces a harder task than he did last year. This year the team went into the field over-confident and had that firm belief in their own superiority shattered. The strength is there, but the team work isn't yet. ST. JOHN'S BANK DEFICIT.

Shareholders Will Be Called On For Large Sum.

MONTREAL, May 11.—It now transpires that the affairs of the defunct St. John's Bank are not as good as at first thought. The shareholders will be called upon to make good their losses, as there is no surplus, and about \$200,000 will be required to wipe out the liabilities. President Roy himself states that so far as he can see the bank will not be able to collect over 60 per cent of the outstanding accounts. This will mean that the double liability clause will go into effect and what money is lacking to pay the depositors will come out of the funds of the shareholders. It appears that the surplus over the above liabilities of \$353,000, according to the last Government returns, has no existence in fact, and in place of this there is an actual deficit. The deficit according to the authorities who have been going over the books of the bank, will amount to \$200,000 or more.

The Roy family are the possessors of 1,715 shares of the stock, of which 60 per cent is paid up. This will mean that Hon. Mr. Roy and his immediate family will, if they are financially able, be called upon under the double liability act, to pay up a great proportion of the double liability of \$1,100,000. Mr. Roy states however that he has been a serious loser, and that he is by no means financially in a position to meet the deficit should it be found necessary to ask it.

The Banque St. Jean had a paid-up capital of \$210,000 and deposits according to the last statement of \$351,000.

Last Home of Elder Duck.
At present there is but one breeding place of the elder duck in the United States. That is Old Man's Island, situated in the town of Cutler, in Maine. It is one and one-half miles east of the Cross Island life saving station and was leased by the state with the understanding that it was to be used for the protection, propagation and preservation of all wild birds. The state, through the efforts of the Audubon society, is trying to preserve three species of wild fowl—the elder duck, the puffin and the laughing gull—from extermination in Maine. Their eggs are large and very palatable and highly prized by fishermen for food.—Kennebec Journal.

propose that newspapers in the future be printed in white on black paper instead of in black on white paper, thus bringing about a saving of millions of dollars annually in pulp wood, assisting in the preservation of forests and reducing the price of news paper to about one-half of the present price. Black paper can be made of old newspapers and almost any fibrous stock, while white paper requires spruce and hemlock wood. Wisconsin paper manufacturers will try to interest eastern manufacturers, and, if possible, bring about concerted action with the publishers of the country.

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:
Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:
1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D., 1888, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:
18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale.

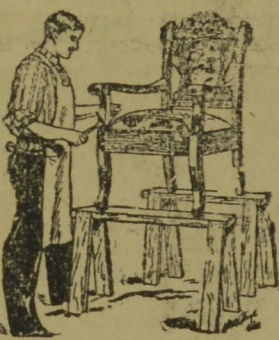
