Australian Government to take up Canada's Proposal for Preference

OTTAWA, July 10.—(Special) — According to a report received by the trade and commerce department from D. H. Ross, Canadian trade commissioner in Australia, the Commonwealth government will this summer take up the question of a reciprocal trade agreement with Canada.

In his report to the department Mr. Ross says that in an interview with Premier Deakin last month, with reference to the proposals submitted on behalf of the Canadian government for a reciprocal tariff, the latter stated that as the new Australian general and British prefer-

tial tariff had only been finally dealt with, on May 29th last, his government had been unable to consider the Canadian proposal.

Premier Deakin, says Mr. Ross, again expressed his personal sympathy towards the improvement of trade relations with Canada, and intimated that during the parliamentary recess, the question would be carefully gone into with a view to having the matter dealt with at the next session of the Australian parliament, which will probably commence early in October.

A Correspondent Who Discusses the Beer and Other Live Questions

To the Editor of the Herald: Sir,—The Herald reports that the police magistrate has decided that in future he will hold the sale of lager beer to be a violation of the Scott Act.

This rather belated decision is presumably correct, and may possibly have the effect of preventing the general sale in the city and county of a beverage which, judging from its effects, is quite as much an intoxicant as some of the so-called spirituous liquor, and, it is said, more dangerous to the young and inexperienced.

No more change of names, such as Ready's, Jones's, Schenk, Boch, etc., will justify the sale, all of these being undoubtedly of the same character, and said to contain more than the average percentage of alcohol. It is to be hoped that the Scott Act committee and the police will see that the law is properly enforced. In this connection it may not be wrong to ask what has become of the Scott Act committee, and their promise to enforce the law, since the re-adoption of the Act on April 30th.

I am informed that not a single complaint for selling intoxicating liquor has been laid before the police magistrate since that date, although it is quite apparent that violations have been taking place every day in every hotel and bar-room in the city. And what too, about the complaints at the instance of the police force, which used to come regularly and result in regular convictions and fines? Not one has been reported since the 30th of April.

Have the policemen received instructions to shut their eyes more closely and give the illegal vendors an opportunity to sell, without penalty? What does the new police commission purpose doing in the matter?

JUMPED INTO NIAGARA.

Unknown Man Leaped From Lower Arch Bridge.

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. July 9.—About seven o'clock tonight an unknown, well dressed, bearded man apparently about fifty-six or sixty, committed suicide by jumping off the centre of the lower steel arch bridge. Officer Kelly of the Ontario police had been observing his actions, and, thinking them suspicious, was walking towards him with the intention of interrogating him when he made the fatal leap, which was clearly premeditated. One man made an attempt to rescue him just as he was going over the railing, but the effort came too late to have him.

READY TO RECEIVE CROOKS.

AUGMENTED POLICE AND DETECTIVE FORCE WILL MAKE SHORT WORK OF VIOLATING THIEVES.

Quebec July 10.—Everything goes to show that there will be an immense flocking of "crooks" thugs and blacklegs of international repute to this city during the Tercentenary.

This is an inviolable accompaniment of conventions and large gatherings such as will be seen here at the end of this month. The authorities here are well prepared to deal with the criminal fraternity. All persons of suspicious appearance or known to have criminal records will be unceremoniously run into jail on sight, only to be released at the conclusion of the festivities.

The local police organization is strengthened by detachments of the best men from other Canadian cities and from the Dominion Police—men who know most of the international crooks by sight. Headquarters here are being kept informed from Montreal and all the border cities of any gentlemen of bad repute who are found to be heading this way. Many such have already been arrested in Montreal.

In spite of the activity of the police, visitors to the Tercentenary will do well to keep a very careful eye on their watches and purses, and not to carry more jewelry in public than is absolutely necessary. All the better class hotels are installing special police protection on their own account, to look after the interests of their guests.

The town will be swarming with private detectives as well as the officers of the regular police. The Dominion itself has engaged a large force for the protection of the Prince of Wales and other distinguished guests.
