The Provincial Teacher's Institute opened in the Normal school building at 2.30 p.m. yesterday, Dr. Rand in the chair. There is a good attendance, and the session promises to be more than usually interesting.

Mr. W. H. Smithson, of the P. O. service, Ottawa, lady and daughter, have been here since Saturday, and were greeted by many old friends. They left this afternoon for St. John en route to Digby for a vacation.

We are glad to learn that Mr. Walter McFarlane has made arrangements for the rebuilding of his hames factory at St. Mary's, and as preparatory he has already contracted for a thirty horse power engine at the New Brunswick foundry. The new erection will be of brick.

Mr. Justice Steadman presided at the Victoria Co. court last week in Judge Stevens' absence, and before being discharged the grand jury presented His Honor with a carefully prepared and flattering address, which also contained pleasing and eulogistic reference to Judge Stevens, who is now visiting his native country, Scotland. The address was replied to at some length in the amiable, happy and unassuming manner peculiar to Judge Steadman, who in the course of his speech paid a high tribute to the excellent qualities and sterling probity of the absent Judge.

On Monday Mr. John O'Toole began the erection of a foundry on the vacant lot fronting on Queen street, above Westmorland, and known as the Tower property. The foundry building will be of wood, 40x15 feet and one storey, and will be completed ready for operations in about a month. Mr. O'Toole contemplates building a machine shop and warehouse in connection, extending from the foundry to Queen street. He has the reputation of being one of the best moulders in the province, and been employed for a long time in the New Brunswick foundry.

On Thursday afternoon was held the annual examination of the Collegiate school, and among the visitors were, Dr. Harrison, Dr. Bailey, and Prof. Rivet of the University, Mr. Sampson, secretary of the School Board, and a number of former pupils of the school. A very efficient examination of the classes was made by Principal Parkin and his staff, and the work done was thorough and interesting. The prizes were presented as follows: Wm. A sad death occurred Sunday afternoon, when John Barker, aged nine years, son of John Barker, laborer, corner of Northumberland and Brunswick streets, was drowned in the river, just below government house.

With a number of other boys he was playing on the bank, and in attempting to push off some logs, a pole which he had in his hands, slipped, precipitating him into the water, where it was about five feet deep. His comrades made attempts to rescue him and a woodboat man came to their assistance, but too late to save the little fellow's life. His body was recovered at 4 p.m. Coroner T. Clowes, Brown, M. D., held an inquest on the remains, the jury consisting of Geo. A. Cliff, John Palmer, Joseph Vandine, Jos. C. Risteen, Wm. Boone, Matthew Tennant and John Harvey. After viewing the body and hearing the evidence of two of the boys who witnessed the affair, the jury returned a verdict of "accidental drowning."

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

Fredericton Exhibition Building Burned.

The city of Fredericton suffered a severe and much lamented loss by the complete destruction by fire of the exhibition building and the sheds and stables adjoining, at an early hour yesterday morning.

The fire which originated from incendiarianism broke out at a quarter past one, and before a general alarm could be sounded, the entire building was wrapped in flames, and the adjoining sheds were catching. The progress of the flames was most appalling, and there was no hope of saving the building from the first.

The firemen responded to the alarm promptly, and gave their attention to the sheds and houses in the vicinity. The former were, however, reduced to ashes, but the latter suffered very slightly.

The exhibition building and sheds were erected during the summer of 1878 by the joint action of the citizens, city council and local government, and cost \$13,000, \$4,000 of which was given by the city, \$9,000 by the government, while the citizens contributed some \$3,000 towards the erection of the sheds. It was admirably suited to the purposes of exhibitions, has been utilized in many ways, and its destruction is to be very deeply regretted apart from the financial loss.

The city's stock was insured for \$3,000—\$1,000 in the Western, \$1,000 in the Citizens, Richards & Son agents, and \$1,000 in the North British and Mercantile, J. L. Inches agent, and this is the only margin left to commence the erection of a new building if such a movement should be suggested.
