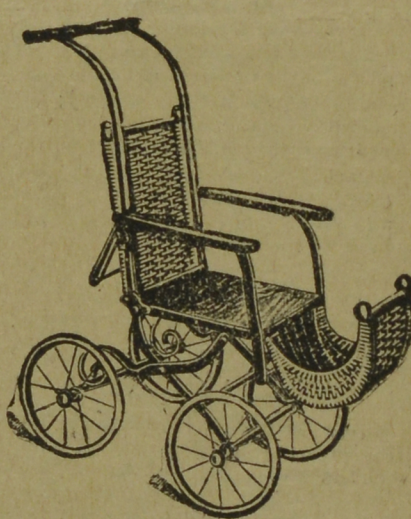

Dear Sir—I am glad to receive a letter from you. I cannot tell what all the cedars in your locality. Were there, in the early part of last winter, in your locality, sudden and unusual changes in the weather—alternate thaws and hard frosts? Or have you had excessive drought this summer? Is your drainage too effective?

Thuja occidentalis is but little

or general, who takes an active interest in the work of the local improvement Association, troubled with insect pests—perhaps as little as any of our trees, and any pest of the kind, capable of doing much damage, would have shown itself—would have come under your observation.

I should be inclined to ascribe the decay of your cedar hedges to atmospheric changes, lack of moisture, or something in the nature of the soil; but possibly it may be due to some unknown blight, such as that affecting the pines in the United States. DESTRUCTION OF CEDARS

A Letter From Gov. T. W. Fyles, an Authority on Forestry

It is noted that the cedar hedges of Fredericton this season are in a bad condition, and are apparently dying. What is producing the destruction. To get some information on the sub-
