CENTRAL RAILWAY

The Royal Commission on the Central railway will take a brief vacation until ten o'clock on the morning of Tuesday, July 21, when the commission will resume its sessions in St. John. During the ten days which elapse before the next session efforts will be made to have the various books and documents which have been submitted in evidence put into a more convenient form. Efforts will also be made to procure the remainder of the vouchers and check stubs mentioned on Thursday by Mr. Atkinson.

Hon. James Barnes was the only witness examined yesterday afternoon. Mr. Corbett being recalled for but a few questions. Mr. Powell's questions elicited from Mr. Barnes the information that he made nothing out of his contract to build the Chipman-Minto section of the Central railway. The commission's counsel made a determined effort to show that the accounts of the Barnes Construction company, which Mr. Barnes produced before the commission, made no record of certain moneys received by the government. Mr. Barnes, however, explained that the documents had been made up by Hammond J. Evans, accountant and in consequence of that fact, he himself was unable to clearly explain all the items shown in the accounts. He thought, however, that if Mr. Evans was produced as a witness the matter could be cleared up.

CRICKET MATCH.

The Fredericton Cricketers are to play a match with Marysville at that town on Monday. The latter have a couple of good bowlers in Thos. L. Fowler and Dormer, formerly of the R. C. R.

HAD GREAT SPORT.

Messrs Virgil P. Kline and Martin Snyder of Cleveland, Ohio, passed through the city yesterday on their way home from a ten days fishing trip to Cain's River, made in company with Mr. W. H. Allen, the well known guide of Penniac. They had capital sport catching trout, ranging in weight from one to three pounds, and enjoyed the outing very much. In one pool that Mr. Kline fished, he landed forty trout in little more than an hour and turned them back into the river again.

POLICE COMMISSION.

A special meeting of the city council called by three aldermen to deal with the report of the police commission will be held on Monday evening. There is much speculation as to what sort of a report the commission will submit to the council. It seems to be generally understood that a majority of the aldermen will not vote for five policemen so the commissioners will have to notify their report if they expect to get it ratified. It is rumored about the streets today that two aldermen who at the last meeting voted to sustain the commission, have since undergone a change of heart, and are likely to vote differently next time.

ORANG CELEBRATION.

The Orangemen of York county will join the members of Pickard Lodge of Marysville, in celebrating the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne in that town. The glorious 12th falls on Sunday this year, but the celebration has been planned for Monday. There will be a grand procession through the principal streets, to be followed by a picnic, at which athletic sports will be carried out. A large number of the Orangemen from this city will take part, and there will also be delegations from Blackville and points along the I. C. R. It is likely that Past Grand Masters McLeod and A. D. Thomas of this city will be the orators for the occasion.

QUEBEC CELEBRATION.

Mr. Fred B. Edgcombe, city ticket agent, has received a number of copies of the official program of the Quebec tercentenary celebration and will be pleased to hand them out to those interested.

HOME FROM CHICAGO.

Mrs. J. H. Barry and Mrs. (Dr.) Owens, of Milville, who have been in Chicago to see the former's sister, Mrs. P. J. Phelan, who is ill returned home at noon today. Mrs. Phelan's two youngest children accompanying them. Mrs. Phelan is still in quite a serious condition but is gradually improving.

FIRE AT DOUGLAS.

The dwelling house at Douglas, owned and occupied by Mr. Winslow Williams was completely destroyed by fire at noon on Wednesday. Some articles of furniture and clothing were saved. The fire is supposed to have caught from a spark falling on the roof. The loss is in the neighborhood of \$1,000 and is said to be partially covered by insurance.

MONSTER SALMON.

One of the largest salmon taken in the St. John river for years was caught at Bear Island a few nights ago by Mr. Alfred Rossborough of that place. It tipped the scales at forty-five pounds. On Wednesday night Mr. Basil Goodine caught one at Springhill, which weighed thirty-three pounds.
