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THE STRAWBERRY CROP.

Owing to the continued dry weather the strawberry season is likely to be shorter this year than usual. The berries seem to be suffering from arrested development, although in the matter of price they seem to be holding their own fairly well. The price at present is ten cents per box, and there is not likely to be any further downward tendency. In the St. John market they are selling at five and six cents a box.

HAY CROP LIGHT.

Most of the farmers in this section are planning to begin haying the first of next week. The outlook for the hay crop a few weeks ago was exceedingly bright, but since that it has suffered greatly from the dry weather. Reports from all sections go to show that the upland hay is light, and will be less than an average crop.

MRS. COBURN'S DEATH.

Mrs. Coburn, widow of the late Mr. Tyler Coburn, died this morning at her home at Keswick Ridge, after a brief illness from heart trouble. She was seventy-one years of age, and is survived by a family of one daughter and three sons. The members of the family are Rev. Tyler Coburn of Winnipeg, Wilfred of Boston, Frederick and Effie at home. The funeral will take place on Sunday, with services by Rev. E. P. Calder. Undertaker John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.

PATTERSON IMPROVING

His Injuries Caused by Being Struck by a Circus Wagon

Mr. Clowes Patterson, who was injured on the circus grounds last Wednesday evening, is getting along nicely at the Victoria Hospital yesterday, when he explained to them how he sustained the injuries, which came so near costing him his life. He said that while taking a walk about the circus grounds he was struck on the side by one of the heavy wagons and knocked down. It is possible he said that he may have been pushed from behind by somebody but on that point he could not be certain. He had lost a pocket book containing \$20 but had no suspicion that it had been stolen by circus men, in fact he was not in a position to say that it had been stolen by anybody. He added that when he was knocked down by the wagon it might have fallen out of his pocket. He told the officers that his watch and \$4.40 in his trousers pockets had not been disturbed.

Mr. Patterson is a young man of a retiring disposition, and did not seem inclined to give out any more information in regard to his mishap than was necessary. Mr. Potter intimated that the circus people might be willing to pay his expenses at the hospital, but Patterson gave him to understand that he was not in need of such assistance. Chief Winter, who has been very active in investigating the case is satisfied that no crime has been committed. It was at the Chief's suggestion that Mr. Potter came to Fredericton to interview Patterson.

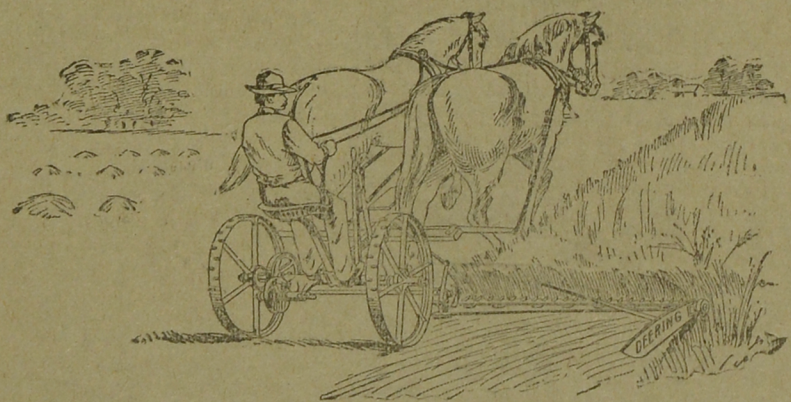
