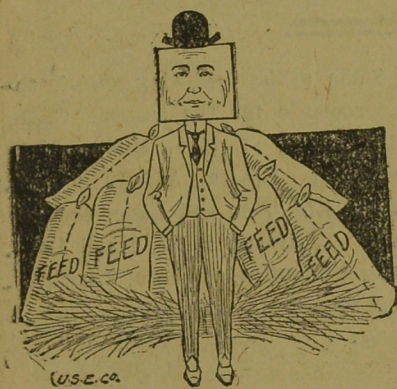

LOVE AFFAIRS OF GIRL FROM JAY'S.

Neph. w of Transvaal Judge Sued for Breach—Amusing Letters.

London Daily Mail: The love affairs of a saleswoman at Messrs. Jay's, in Regent street, and the nephew of a Transvaal judge were disclosed before Mr. Justice Grantham on Thursday, when Miss Violet Carr sued Mr. Herbert Watermeyer for damages for alleged breach of promise of marriage.

Mr. Marshall Hall, in opening, said the plaintiff was the daughter of an Army school master, a warrant officer, who after twenty-five years' service retired. She was the granddaughter of a barrister-at-law. Mr. Watermeyer was a wealthy man and the nephew of the well known Transvaal magistrate, Judge Watermeyer. In October, 1901, Miss Carr was introduced to Mr. Watermeyer. He met her with two other young ladies, and asked her permission to call upon her and take her out to supper and each of entertainment. Things went on down to June 1903, but something took place during that time.

LEGLED SECRET ENGAGEMENT.

Miss Carr happened to meet a friend of Mr. Watermeyer, and told this friend that she was very angry with Mr. Watermeyer, and desired this mutual friend to give defendant that message, because she had reason to think he was flirting with some other lady, and she resented it. Upon receipt of this message Mr. Watermeyer came to see her and implored forgiveness, going down on his knees and asking for this forgiveness. He said, "things be as they had been, and he would marry her on the death of his aunt, a lady eighty years of age. He said for the present the engagement must be kept an absolute secret. Following upon the compact for a secret engagement, Mr. Watermeyer said, "I shall not give you a ring, but I will give you a bracelet." He kept his promise and gave her a beautiful bracelet with the word "dearest" on it in pearls and turquoises, and the clasp made of two hearts entwined.

In a letter written about this time Mr. Dearest—The day has just begun

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live here when married." Addressing her little sister, he added, "and you must be one of our bridesmaids."

Another letter from Mr. Watermeyer was as follows:

Dearest—When I left you on Friday it was with many good intentions. I intended getting you a big box of chocolates. On Saturday morning I was unable to move, and had a fearful head.

He admitted writing to her, "You only want to get me on my knees again." Asked to explain what he said, "That is a metaphorical expression, meaning that she wanted to have me at her beck and call."

FOSTER'S FALLACIES EXPOSED.

Mr. Hugh Guthrie delivered a very comprehensive and carefully prepared speech on the budget, in which he answered most effectively the fallacies of Mr. Foster. He closely analyzed the figures of that gentleman and showed how he had twisted and turned them to bolster up his arguments. Mr. Guthrie showed how Mr. Foster had taken the lean years and compared them with the fat ones, to the disadvantage of the Liberal side of the question. Instead of coming right down to date he invariably stopped in his comparison when the figures were against his contention. Mr. Guthrie in many instances supplied the missing figures, which gave an entirely different complexion to Mr. Foster's argument. He proved the evident desire of Mr. Foster to mislead the electors by choosing just such figures as would fit the point he had in mind, utterly ignoring the fact that additional ones brought down to date would have proved the very contrary of his argument.

GOVERNMENT IS PROGRESSIVE

The Government is not doing things in a half-hearted way. After concluding a treaty with France, encouragement is given to a direct teamship line between France and Canada. It is confidently expected that the treaty will result in greatly increased business between the two countries, and to make this possible and easy teamship communication is being fostered. The Liberal Government is a government that does things thoroughly.

LAURIER WANTS CLEAN GOVERNMENT.

Sir Wilfred Laurier has always been in favor of clean administration. He never failed to respond to the demand of the Opposition for an enquiry when they put forward charges that could be understood. Therefore, he has granted a Royal Commission to investigate the alleged

wrongdoing on the part of officials of the Marine and Fisheries Department. Strange to say, Mr. Foster suggested that a Royal Commission be appointed, and no sooner as it done than Mr. Borden objected to it; he wanted a committee of the House. It is hard to please the opposition. They don't want investigations that are final; what they want is to keep things in a turmoil and educate the public to the idea that there is something wrong.

That the Opposition seeks to do is to engender suspicion, not find the guilty party, should there be such.

For the very palpable reason that all the guilty men found so far have been appointed by the Conservative administration. The time has come to dispense with the services of men who fail to understand their duty and who are not concerned when they ring discredit upon a Government in which they have no political sympathy.
