AN EFFECTIVE REPLY

Premier Robinson's reply to Mr. J. K. Fleming's criticism of the public accounts completely knocks the bottom out of the misrepresentations put forward by the Carleton M.P.P. who to gain a party advantage did not hesitate to deliberately misstate the figures of the expenditure for the past fiscal year.

For political purposes Mr. Fleming has made a bad mix of it, and his observations were so glaringly inaccurate that the public must draw conclusions not very flattering to the opposition critic.

The Tories have stopped at nothing to injure the government, but their statements are so extreme, that they are having quite the opposite effect from that intended, and Mr. Hazen and his friends are writing themselves down either wilfully malicious and untruthful or stupidly incompetent to intelligently discuss public affairs.

ST. JOHN PLEASED

The effect of having such an influential friend as Hon. Dr. Pugsley in the government at Ottawa is being much appreciated by the citizens of St. John, who have received the gratifying news that the government will at once undertake the construction of a new wharf on the west side of the harbor to provide increased terminal facilities for the winter port trade.

St. John has gone down deep into its own pocket to provide terminal facilities, doing what is really a national work, but the government's decision to construct the proposed wharf is evidence that Dr. Pugsley has successfully pressed on the premier and his colleagues the policy of recognizing St. John as a port of national importance, which must be properly equipped to meet the constantly growing export trade.

It was a happy day for St. John when it secured the services of Dr. Pugsley as its representative in parliament and in the government.

Mr. J. K. Fleming, M. P. P., makes a bad start for the New Year—publishing glaring mis-statements against the government.

Westmorland Liberals are getting busy, with a view to the local elections. The campaign will be opened at Port Elgin on Saturday, when a public meeting is to be addressed by Premier Robinson, the other local members and Hon. H. R. Emmerson. Mr. Devlin's Liberal majority in Nicolet in 1906 was 373, which Dr. Turcotte, elected in that constituency on Tuesday last, has increased to 500.

Things are coming the Liberal way all the time. Even Tory Toronto has elected a Liberal Mayor with an enormous plurality, defeating one of the leading Tories of the city, Dr. Nesbitt.

Acadia College authorities have raised \$100,000 for their Forward movement, and are in a position to claim the \$100,000 offered by Rockefeller, and \$30,000 from Carnegie.

The C. P. R. liner, Mount Royal, is twenty-six days out from Antwerp for Halifax and St. John, and there is fear that she has met with some mishap. Her usual time for the passage is twelve days. She has several hundred people on board and a valuable cargo.

The Chatham World pleads with Mr. Loggie, M. P., not to assist the government in the local elections. The World is evidently panic stricken at the certainty of success for the local ticket in Northumberland. If the Liberals of that constituency pull together as it is expected they will, they can give their local ticket 500 majority.

The Carleton Liberals meet in convention Saturday, to close up their ranks. Several gentlemen are mentioned for the local ticket in succession to Mr. McCain, who retired on account of ill health, prominent among them our esteemed, energetic and clever young friend, Mr. N. Foster Thorne, editor of the Sentinel, Dr. Curtis of Hartland, and Mr. J. J. Albert Hayden of Woodstock, any one of whom would make an excellent candidate. The Solicitor General expects to carry the whole ticket to victory.
