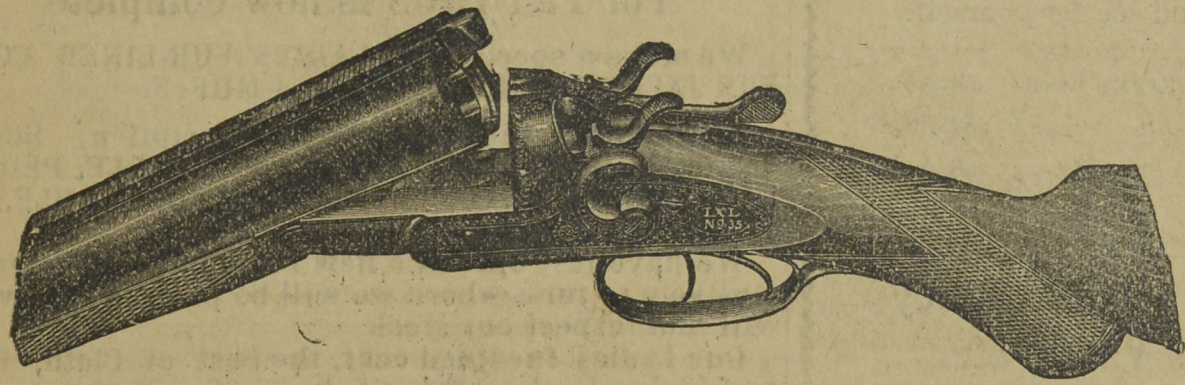
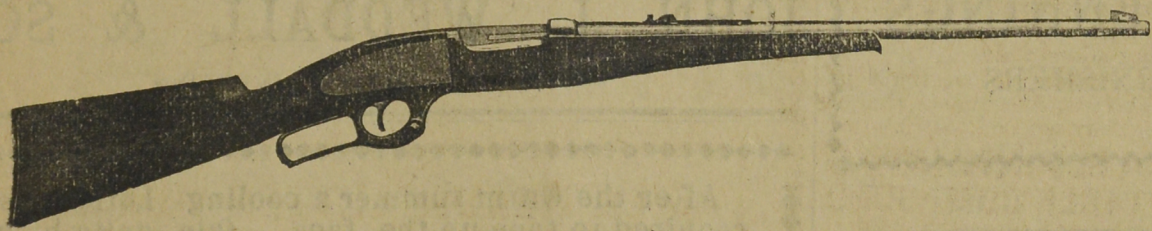

STEEL SHIP LAUNCHED.

Splendid Schooner Leaves Ways at New Glasgow—All Home Made.

The whole population of the Maritime Provinces have been aroused with a new interest by the launching of a short time ago of the first steel sailing vessel built in the provinces down by the sea. They see in the occasion a revival of the shipbuilding industry of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The launching was witnessed by a large crowd, who assembled on the bridge, on the adjacent streets, on the river bank, and in the historic yard from which scores of vessels have been launched in the brave days of old, when the wooden ships of Pictou County were seen on every sea. Among those present were Lieutenant-Governor Fraser, Premier Murray and many leading men from various parts of the county.

The new schooner is a handsome vessel, and J. C. Macgregor, who has been the moving spirit in her construction, was congratulated on all sides upon the splendid showing that had been made by New Glasgow workmen. It was also a matter for congratulation that the vessel was "home-made" in practically every part. The large quantity of steel used in the building was almost altogether the produce of the Nova Scotia Steel Co. They supplied everything that was within their capacity. All the rivets, some 40,000, came from the Starr Manufacturing Co., Dartmouth. The canvas came from Yarmouth; the rope from the Rope Works in Dartmouth; the blocks, from Parrsboro. The spars, made of Oregon pine from Oregon. All the rest of the wood, except a little teak, which is required in all steel ships, is the product of Pictou County.

The schooner was built by the I. Matheson Co., iron founders, for J. W. Carmichael & Co. Mr. James C. Macgregor is practically the head of both of those concerns, as well as a director of the Nova Scotia Steel Co. The schooner is intended for the coastal lumber trade between Canadian ports and the United States in summer, and in winter time she will carry pine from the pulp ports to the West Indies.

WONDERFUL RECORD

Post Office Most Successfully Administered by the Laurier Government—Postage Reduced all Around—Revenue Increased.

To the business men of Canada quite understand the wonderful record of the Canadian Post office under Liberal administration?

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, the post master general put the facts in most concise form at the great Niagara Falls meeting.

The last year of Conservative administrations produced a deficit of \$780,997. There has been no deficit since 1903, and last year the surplus was \$1,000,000.

How has this been secured? By so reducing the rates of postage as to popularize the service in every branch. Here are the rates of postage on various classes of mail matter under Conservative and Liberal rule:

Letters to Great Britain and the empire generally—Conservative, 5

cents; Liberal, 2 cents.

Letters to Canadian points—Conservative, 3 cents; Liberal, 2 cents.

Letters to United States—Conservative, 2 cents.

Drop-letters for city delivery—Conservative, 2 cents; Liberal, 1 cent.

Postage on newspapers—Conservative, 3 cents; Liberal, 2 cents.

Papers sent to Great Britain by the public—Conservative, 8 cents per pound; Liberal, 4 cents.

Papers sent to Great Britain by publishers—Conservative, 8 cents per pound; Liberal, one-quarter of a cent per point.

Behind all this comes the introduction of free rural mail delivery.

That is the wonderful story of the Canadian Post Office under Liberal rule. Does it look as if graft had any place there?

Ceylon's Land-Leech

It is nearly always the case that exceedingly beautiful countries are overrun by different kinds of pests. Beautiful Ceylon has mosquitoes, said to be the most adroit and audacious in the world, and snakes, and a thousand more plagues of poor human beings, but the worst of them all is a species of leech. The Ceylon land-leech is a thin creature about two inches long, and very nimble and flexible; it will crawl up a man's leg, and traveling underneath the clothing, will climb as high as the throat.
