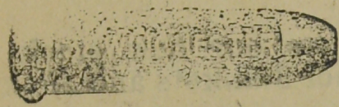

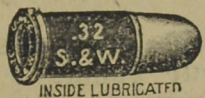

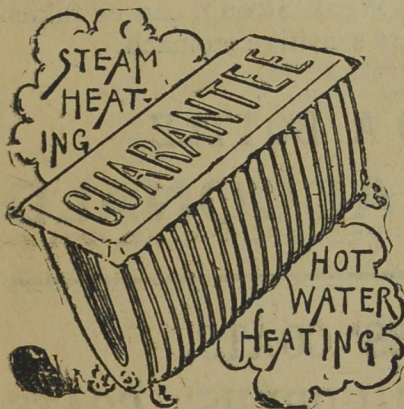

LAURIER'S GREAT PERFORMANCES

Far Outweigh Borden's Promises and Tory Petty Scandal

A marvelous change has come over Ontario the past ten days. The people have been privileged to hear the two great leaders, and what each has to offer. Sir Wilfrid Laurier can point with satisfaction to the record of his Government for twelve years—Greater trade made possible by a fair and equitable tariff—British preference encouraging trade relations with the mother country—The land given to the settler who is making such good use of it, that 120,000,000 acres of crops is the result, and there is a frenzied call for cars to bring the crops to market—Agricultural pursuits encouraged and markets provided by reason of cold storage facilities—The St. Lawrence channel made a safe highway by day and night as the result of deepening the channel, and installing aids to navigation—This alone has affected a saving of \$500,000 a year in marine insurance rates—Grain which formerly was carried to Boston and New York, now finds an outlet at Montreal, greatly to the consternation of the American shipping interests, who openly allege that their government has been beaten out in this regard by the Dominion authorities—The establishment of necessary public works—The increase of revenue—The accumulation of surpluses—Lowering the rate on postal matter—One cent drop rate for city letters—Rural mail delivery—and a surplus of over a million in the Post Office administration.

These are some of the things accomplished for the people. The building of the Grand Trunk Pacific goes on apace—660 miles of steel laid west of Winnipeg—50 miles laid east of Winnipeg—100 miles west of Quebec—200 from Fort William branch to the main line—300 miles of grading done in addition—This is one of the works Sir Wilfrid has in hand, and which he should be allowed to finish.

A railway to Hudson Bay, which will supply another outlet for the grain and cattle of the Northwest. A survey is now being made of the proposed line—Completion of the Trent Valley Canal—Construction of Georgian Bay Canal—A further strengthening of the bonds which bind the empire together, this is work Laurier has yet to finish, and he reasonably asks that he be allowed to do so.

WHAT BORDEN OFFERS.

What has Mr. Borden to offer? Nothing but scandal. To assist him in this campaign he imported Mr. Roblin of Manitoba, whose record for giving land to the speculator is well known. This person made false statements with regard to the Crow's Nest Pass deal, and by the editor of the Toronto News was proven a slanderer and a liar. He could no longer appear on a public platform in Ontario and has returned in disgrace to his own province.

Mr. Borden also imported Mr. Bowser, a man who told profane stories

on the platform at Massey Hall. This man is the attorney-general of British Columbia. To show the manner of man he is, outside his profanity, at the time he was denouncing the Liberal Government as the chief offender in the Japanese immigration there was in the till of Mr. Bowser's firm the money he received for endeavoring to bring in Japanese in violation of the convention between Japan and Canada. It was this Mr. Bowser's firm who drew the contract between Gotah, the Japanese agent and the C. P. R. representative to bring in laborers to British Columbia by the back door, via Honolulu.

The campaign of Mr. Borden, backed up by such men, has not impressed the Ontario electorate. The people looked for something to place alongside the deeds of Sir Wilfrid, and nothing was offered but slander and scandal, without a scintilla of evidence in support of the allegations made.

Mr. Borden has not convinced the people of Ontario that there is any occasion for a change. No charge has ever been made against the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier or any member of it. The total criticism amounts to \$1 in every \$8,000. It is not even put forward that this dollar was corruptly spent, but that it was excessively spent which is a matter of opinion.

This one-sided presentation of a scandal does not influence men who know both sides. He does not deny or palliate, the acts of the Conservative government, which gave 60,000,000 acres of the best land in the country to speculators; neither does he refer to the fact that the present Government has not given one acre to a railway corporation since coming into power.

He repeats the time worn tale of land deals in Halifax and Moncton, although the land in each case was bought upon the valuation of a Conservative, and in the case of Moncton by a Conservative candidate at this election. The explanation in both cases has been clear and ample, but Mr. Borden finds it convenient to disregard this. How can he expect the people who ask for bread to be satisfied with a stone?

STATESMEN VS. POLITICIANS.

In the one case there is the picture of a well-trying statesman giving an account of his stewardship, with the consciousness of having done well and faithfully by the people who trusted him, and on the other the spectacle of an opportunist politician surrounded by discredited men appealing to the baser elements, and offering nothing acceptable to a people who realize from day to day that they live in a country made prosperous and dignified by the work of a great and patriotic statesman.

SPLENDID RECORD.

The Laurier government has a splendid record. It does not appear that the people desire any change. Nothing could be improved, no person advantaged (except the needy politicians.) There will always be under a democratic form of government, party lines drawn, but the conduct of affairs will never be taken from one party and entrusted to another without good and sufficient cause. There is every evidence that the people desire no change at this time, and until something is formulated by the Conservatives to take the place of the enlightened administration, now in charge of public affairs, it may confidently be anticipated that Canada will continue her progress, for the people have an abiding faith, both in the possibilities of the Dominion, and in Sir Wilfrid Laurier, that he will continue to administer public affairs equitably, wisely and honestly, following upon the record of the past twelve years, the best twelve years that Canada ever experienced. October 26th will see Sir Wilfrid Laurier Canada's greatest statesman, returned to power that he may finish the work the people entrusted to him in 1904.

LAURIER ACCLAIMED

Great Reception to Premier at Ormstown-- Ashamed of Tory Slander Campaign

ORMSTOWN, Que., Oct. 15—Yesterday's demonstration here made it quite plain that Sir Wilfrid Laurier still retains his hold upon the affections of the Scottish Liberals of Huntingdon County, as well as the French Canadians of Beauharnois and Chateauguay. In fact, although the meeting was attended as an English speaking demonstration, so many came in from the latter counties that the speeches were delivered in both French and English.

There were fully 5,000 people gathered in the little town when the special bearing Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and a number of enthusiasts from Montreal and intervening stations, arrived. The premier was accompanied by Hon. Messrs. Fisher and Brodeur and a tremendous cheer went up as he emerged from the car.

Sir Wilfrid was greeted by the mayor and town council, and presented with a civic address of welcome, to which he briefly responded, expressing his pleasure at this, his first visit to the district.

A big procession was formed, with a squadron of the sixth Hussars, a number of mounted yeomanry, two bands and a long line of citizens. At the town hall, Sir Wilfrid was entertained to luncheon, after which the procession resumed its way to a field by the Presbyterian church, where a stand had been erected and fully 5,000 people from the three counties were gathered.

A novel feature of the meeting was the attendance of the children of the French and English academies, the first of whom sang "O, Canada" after which both joined in singing a French translation of "God Save the King."

Boquets were presented the premier by little girls from each of the three counties, with two little maids in attendance, and Sir Wilfrid gallantly saluted all five.

While the premier was in a very happy vein he was unusually severe in his references to the Conservative scandal mongering campaign.

"It is with shame and disgust," he said, "that I find the issue we are to fight upon is this petty scandal cry of the Conservative leaders. I disdain to discuss these issues. My soul is turned towards greater events and questions, and it is the future of the country that I lay before you. For myself, I say that I have never used banals and a long line of citizens. At my office for my personal benefit." (Cheers.)

KISSED WIFE IN PUBLIC.

Connecticut Man Arrested Under Old Blue Law.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15—A dispatch to the Times from Waterbury, Conn., says:—

Dennis Burns of Bridgeport and his wife made themselves objectionable on a trolley car running from Bridgeport to Waterbury late last night. Because the man insisted on hugging and kissing the woman gratuitously, to the disgust of the passengers, he was stopped at Naugatuck and arrested under an old blue law which says a man may not kiss even his wife in such a public and ostentatious manner.

Judge Hangerford did not care to entertain the charge of wife kissing on Sunday, and Burns was fined for disorderly conduct enough to make a total, with costs, of nearly \$20.

Burns justified his conduct by the statement, "I love my wife dearly and have a right to kiss her, law or no law."
