LIB. CANDIDATE IN YORK

MR. NELSON W. BROWN

TONIGHT'S MEETING

Nelson W. Brown and Hance J. Logan, M.P., are men well worth hearing from the platform, and when they come to Fredericton to discuss the issues of this campaign, they are sure to be greeted with a large and attentive audience.

These gentlemen will be at the Opera house this evening, and will have something interesting to say both for Liberals and Conservatives.

Mr. Brown seeks to represent this constituency in parliament. He did not put himself forward for the position in the field at the unanimous demand of his party, and he speaks tonight to the electors of Fredericton to advocate the cause of the Liberal government, for which he stands. Mr. Brown is a York county man right through—a son of the soil—a gentleman who grew up in York, and was educated here, and who is well qualified to represent this constituency in parliament. He is a fluent speaker, with a good grasp of public questions, and the Fredericton public will hear him tonight with supreme interest.

Mr. Logan is an old parliamentary hand, a politician who has enjoyed the confidence of Cumberland, one of the largest and most intelligent constituencies in Canada, for twelve years, and few men are better equipped for discussing public questions than he.

When the late Hon. A. G. Blair needed men on the stump in Sunbury-Queens in 1896, Mr. Logan was among the first to come to his assistance, and the Liberals were most grateful to Mr. Logan for the substantial aid he was able to render Mr. Blair in his first contest for parliament.

There will be live times at the Opera house this evening, and electors who want a good seat had better be early on hand.

THE EXHIBITION GRANT

The Dominion grant of \$50,000 for an exhibition is available next year for New Brunswick, and Fredericton, Chatham and St. John have made application for the money.

They cannot all get it, but we in Fredericton think we have the best claim.

Next year Fredericton is to hold its regular biennial exhibition, St. John having its turn this year, and on that ground our claims are superior to St. John's, while Chatham can scarcely be considered in the competition from its location, and for other reasons.

The matter of securing this \$50,000 Dominion grant is of supreme interest to this city and county.

Every man who does business in Fredericton is anxious that the grant shall be secured, and every man knows that one way that will help this city to realize its ambition in this respect is to elect Mr. Brown to parliament.

All governments favor those whose support the former can claim. It is the human way, and is as true of governments as of individuals.

The election of Mr. O. S. Crockett in York at this time will be taken as an indication at Ottawa that Fredericton and York do not care a button about securing the exhibition grant.

Let us tell the government that we want that \$50,000—want it to make our exhibition of 1909 a great success—want it to improve agricultural and industrial conditions in this constituency—want it for the improvement of trade, and the way we can best impress on the government our desire in the matter is to send Mr. Brown to parliament, where he will be in a position to back up our application for that \$50,000.

Electors of York vote this time for this constituency's best interests—marking your ballots for Mr. Brown.

DESPICABLE TACTICS.

For a man who has a pleasant exterior Mr. Hazen exhibits a malevolence towards Dr. Pugsley that is amazing. There does not seem any extreme to which Mr. Hazen is not prepared to go to strike a blow at the Minister of Public Works, but he has been overreaching himself, and the blows that are aimed at Dr. Pugsley will, in the end, bring about the political extinction of his slanderer.

Ever since Mr. Hazen came into possession of the local government, his whole effort has been to decry and discredit and destroy the Minister of Public Works. For that Mr. Hazen has lived and acted, but he is further than ever from the goal of his ambition.

Mr. Hazen is insanely jealous of Dr. Pugsley's great success, professionally and politically.

Mr. Hazen is not a great lawyer like Dr. Pugsley, and nobody ever accused the local premier of having any great degree of political acumen or statesmanship qualities.

Mr. Hazen is only a cheap kind of politician, with a ready flow of language and of only a moderate ability otherwise.

He is puffed up with vanity and temporary success has filled his brain with wild visions of still greater triumphs, not likely to be achieved.

Mr. Hazen was in parliament for some years and was a great failure. He was no good for his constituency, he was blamed for helping to drive away one of its important industries and he left no mark in legislation.

He has had an opportunity to show his ability in the local arena, and his record is one of broken pledges, of promises unfulfilled, of small narrow partizan acts, to vent his spite on his opponents, and of an unreasonable desire and effort to destroy Dr. Pugsley.

Mr. Hazen's latest effort, dealing in the lying affidavits of Mayes and Baxter, has brought on him the condemnation of every fair minded man. He soiled his hands when he touched that business, and it will react on him throughout his public career which, however, is not likely to extend beyond the next local election.

MR. LEMONT'S CHANGE.

Our venerable and respected friend, Mr. William Lemont, who is being passed off as "a life long Liberal," that has now turned to the Conservatives, will not make that claim for himself.

Mr. Lemont supported the Conservative party for years, he voted and worked for the late Mr. Temple in every election he ran, and as late as 1896, he was a Tory supporting Mr. Foster in this constituency.

It is true that Mr. Lemont supported the late Hon. A. G. Blair in local politics, for Mr. Lemont had an ambition to be a member of the Legislative Council, but right down to 1896, Mr. Lemont was a straight and enthusiastic Tory, and you will not deny it, will you Mr. Lemont?

There may be other reasons for Mr. Lemont's recent change of front, other than those he is said to state.

Mr. Lemont has a son, who is a civil engineer, but is not employed on the Transcontinental railway. Mr. Lemont, jr., is a son-in-law of our distinguished friend, Mr. James K. Pinder, so that people who are looking for motives for Mr. William Lemont changing his politics twice within a few years, are naturally putting two and two together.

The Tories are welcome to all the capital they can make out of Mr. Lemont's second change.

BUSY AT HOME

Mr. O. S. Crockett was billed to speak this week in Northumberland, but he didn't dare leave York. Oh yes, Mr. Crockett at the opening of the campaign wasn't going to bother much about York—it was easy goods for him, and he would assist other Tory candidates.

To what extent has he done this—just one speech in Sunbury, and that under protest. Mr. Crockett is more than busy in York. He and his fellow muckrakers are visiting every back settlement in the constituency, pouring out their tale of slander and woe, and they are seriously alarmed at the inroads Mr. Brown is making on the Tory party.

Mr. Morrison is said to have stated at Blackville that Mr. Crockett could not keep his engagement there because he was speaking that evening at a joint meeting with Mr. Brown, which was a tale manufactured to order, and entirely incorrect.

Mr. Crockett is trying to save his own skin, and he will not leave York to stump for anybody. Watch him hustle till the last day of the contest.

Tory candidates in other constituencies needn't expect any help from Mr. Crockett. He's too busy at home trying to save his living—\$2,500 a year is at stake, and it will be disastrous for Mr. Crockett if he loses it.

WANT MORE GRAFF?

The St. John Standard calls attention to the amount of money the McAvitys have received from the present government, but says nothing about the hundreds of thousands of dollars Mr. W. H. Thorne and his newspaper raked in from the Tory government from 1878 to 1896.

It was a great harvest for Mr. Thorne and his newspaper, and even then he couldn't keep the latter's head above water.

The Standard itself has been largely established by the means of Mr. Thorne, who has imported his man Friday from Ottawa to slander the Liberals, and to assist in putting a Tory government in power that Mr. Thorne may sell more hardware to the government and that his newspaper may receive more printing contracts.
