A SLANDER CAMPAIGN

With the bare suspicion that there may be a general election before the next session of parliament, the Tory newspapers and politicians have inaugurated a slander campaign which apparently knows no limits.

The Tory party has little to recommend it, either in men or policy and its members resort to abuse of opponents, misrepresentation of every administrative act of the government, open unblushing slanders of which decent men should be ashamed.

That was the plan of campaign during the recent session of parliament, but the muckrakers failed to make good their immoderate and insinuations.

There was not one of them with the courage to prefer specific charges, demand an investigation and stake his seat on the result.

The Tories from their leader down to the special muckraking brigade composed of such men as Geo. E. Foster, Geo. W. Fowler and Bennett fight like Indians from behind barricades, and dare not come out into the open to engage in an honorable contest.

They aim their poisoned shafts from safe retreats, and hope for results which will never be realized, from such a species of warfare, for the majority of the people believe in fair play even in political life.

We therefore warn our readers to beware of the unfounded accusations, the unwarranted charges of dishonesty and graft which the Tory newspapers are daily preferring against the government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier who has given Canada a clean and progressive administration for the past twelve years, whose personal and political record is far above reproach, and who will not tolerate in his associates dishonesty, or other disreputable methods in the government of the country.

The Slander Campaign is in full force, but the thinking men of Canada, the men who realize what leaps and bounds in development and prosperity this country has made under Liberal administration, will not be turned aside from their decision to continue Sir Wilfrid Laurier in power by the shrieking scandal mongers and the muckrakers of the Tory press.

MR. CARVELL, M. P.

The Liberals of Carleton County are not disheartened by their defeat in the provincial elections, and the nominating convention to be held on Saturday next promises to be one of the largest and most enthusiastic political gatherings ever seen in that constituency. No other name than that of Mr. F. B. Carvell is mentioned for the nomination and no member of the present parliament is more deserving of the approval of his constituents than that gentleman.

Mr. Carvell has taken a leading position in parliament both as a debater and a legislator, and his ability is recognized not only by his opponents, who have good reason to remember his forcible and eloquent utterances in the House.

Mr. Carvell is one of the aggressive, forceful and promising young Liberals of Canada, and has the energy and ability to render splendid service to his constituency, the province, and the country at large, and the electors of Carleton are not likely to make the mistake of defeating him at a time when his party and Canada needs in parliament a gentleman of his standing and stamp.

CURRENT COMMENT.

The horsemen are earnestly desiring good weather for the Fredericton race program of tomorrow and Thursday. The finest field of horses ever gathered here is stabled at the track, and excellent sport is anticipated.

The Toronto Globe publishes a snap shot of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Count de Montcalm and Mr. George Wolfe in earnest conversation at the Quebec celebration. The picture represents the two last named as on terms of pleasant intimacy in marked contrast to the meetings of their distinguished forebears on the Plains of Abraham in 1759.

One of the prominent residents of the town of Fernie destroyed by fire is Dr. Bonnell, a New Brunswicker, and married to a sister of Hon. H. A. McKeown, M. P. P., of St. John. Dr. Bonnell a few years ago was Mayor of Fernie, and his New Brunswicker friends are anxious to learn of his safety after passing through the awful experience of Saturday last.

The Indomitable with the Prince of Wales and party on board has arrived in England, having made the trip from Quebec at an average of 25 knots an hour. The prince has wired the governor general that the voyage was a most successful one, and Canadians will be pleased to hear that H. R. H. is once more safe in the bosoms of his family after his very cordial reception in Canada.

Mr. John Stanfield, the Conservative M. P. for Colchester, N. S., owed his election to his majorities at Acadia Mines and Truro, the country districts of the constituency giving Mr. Charles Hill, the Liberal candidate a substantial lead. The iron works at the Mines, however, are now unfortunately closed down with little likelihood of operations being resumed at an early day, and the 200 operatives who voted mostly for Mr. Stanfield are in other employ in all parts of Canada, and unless the Conservative party repatriate them the polling day, Mr. Stanfield's vote at the Mines, will be very materially reduced and his majority there blotted out.

THE VICTORIA HOSPITAL

Very Little Important Business Transacted at Monthly Board Meeting

The regular meeting of the Hospital Board was held yesterday with Vice-President Kitchen in the chair. The other gentlemen present were, Mr. Tennant, Mr. Randolph, Mr. Barry and Mr. Sterling. A large expenditure occurred during the month and the treasurer gave as the cause the purchase of the year's coal and some permanent expenditures.

Miss Graham of Gagetown was reported by the Secretary as having passed an excellent examination and is admitted as a probationer.

Miss H. G. Brown has passed her graduating examination in a most satisfactory manner and is now among the professionals.

From the matron's report it was shown that thirty-three patients had been treated for the month, three of these being typhoid—one from the city, one from Marysville and one from H. H. H. It was stated that the press item declaring that the ambulance was an hour reaching the circus ground the night Mr. Patterson was injured was incorrect, and that the contractor, Mr. Coles Kitchen was on the ground inside of twenty minutes.

A patient from Stanley or in that vicinity who was admitted a month ago with what was feared an incurable disease, is yielding very satisfactorily to the treatment given him.

Contributions from the Brunswick Street Baptist Church and the Methodist church taken on Hospital Sunday were reported and the secretary directed to acknowledge receipt of same.

Many other matters engaged the attention of the trustees after which the Board adjourned.

HORSE STEALING CASE.

Percy Brown, the young man arrested near Woodstock on a charge of horse stealing, was brought to the city last evening by Police Officer Floss and locked up in the police station. This morning he was taken to Oromocto and handed over to the custody of the St. John authorities. He was arraigned before Magistrate White of Oromocto and remanded to jail. Detective Killeen of St. John locked Brown over at the police station here last evening, and announced afterwards that he was a total stranger to him. Brown claims to belong to Oldtown, Me., and says that he has been in the province only three weeks.

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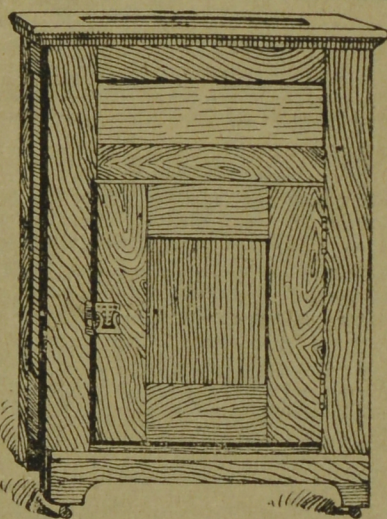

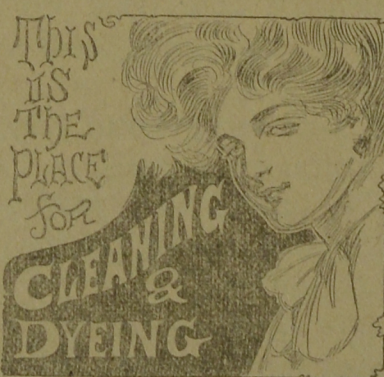
