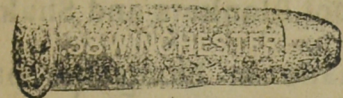

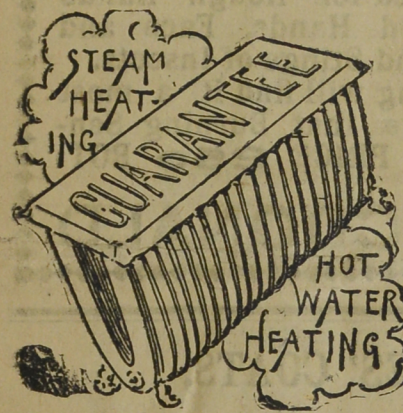

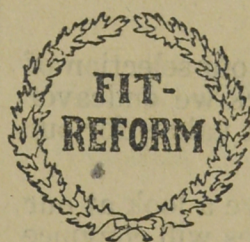

HIDING MONEY.

Queer Places In Which the Cubans Secreted Their Spare Cash.

Although there are now excellent savings banks in Cuba, for generations the people have been accustomed to secrete their cash. A traveler tells of one hiding place in a bird house in a tree. The Cuban's residence had been looted a number of times during various revolutions, but the raiders had never suspected the bird house in the tree. After the death of the head of the family the valuables were removed by the children and placed in the Havana bank. In another case the wall of a building was chosen. A man with considerable patience hollowed out one of the stones in this wall. Five days were consumed in chipping out the hollow. Within this hollow the little casket containing jewels and money was placed. Then a stone slab had to be cut to replace the front without showing any break. This required two days more. The piece of stone was slipped into place and sealed with cement. In order to remove the stone front tools were required each time. But this hiding place served for years and exists now.

One man thought he had found a most effective hiding place when he put a shelf up under the eaves of his house for holding the cash box. This place was chosen partly because of the existence of a small hornet's nest there. Robbers, as a rule, will not take much interest in searching a place in the vicinity of a nest of wasps or hornets. But the home of the insects grew, and after a few months the nest expanded to the box, and the owner could not get the box without danger of being stung. He was obliged to hire two bee experts to come with nets and ladders and remove the box. A wasp stung through one man's mitt just as he grasped the box, and the receptacle fell to the pavement below, and some small pearls were scattered about the place. Several hours were consumed in finding the lost valuables. The owner vowed that he would place his valuables in a depository in Havana thereafter.

Another odd place for hiding a bag of cash was in a hollowed table leg. Cuba is noted for its ponderous articles of furniture. There are table legs with ample surface for hollowing a secret chamber. Usually a tightly fitting door is made, and when this is closed the bag is well concealed. The hall light stands are not overlooked in some of the homes of the Spaniards and the Cubans. The natives of the country love to have plenty of hall light. These hall lights are often fixed to elaborate stands. One such stand proved to be a very effective hiding place for years until one night the house burned down and the money went with it.

EXTENSION TO CONGO.

Railway Plans Will Open Up More of Darkest Africa.

The negotiations between the British South Africa Co. and the Congo which have been in progress for some months with a view to the extension of the Northern Rhodesia railways to the Tanganyika mining area, are now practically completed. It only remains for the signatures of the contracting parties to be affixed to the agreement arrived at.

The effect of this arrangement will be not only the rapid development of the Katanga mines by a through railway route to the eastern and southern ports, but it will also ensure the supply from the Rhodesian coal area for the working of the Katanga mines and the further opening up of Northern Rhodesia. The agreement also ensures the construction of another section of the Cape to Cairo railway from its present terminus at Broken Hill to the Congo Free State, and for this purpose negotiations are in active progress with the Beit trustees and other groups for obtaining the necessary capital.

The whole of the next section northward of the Cape to Cairo Railway to the Congo having already been surveyed, it is expected that work will commence during the present dry season, and will be easily completed in a year, when there will be direct railway communication between Cape Town and the Congo.

Khedive's Wife Bought For £80.

Abbas II., Khedive of Egypt, who, at the moment of writing, is paying us another visit, is one of the most progressive and enlightened of foreign rulers. Passionately fond of travel, he goes about the world with his eyes open, and has introduced many excellent reforms into the country over which he rules. Unconventional to a degree, he has amused himself, and horrified his suite, by donning overalls and driving a railway-engine. The Khedive, by the way, unlike the Sultan, has no Imperial harem. His wife was a beautiful Circassian slave, bought by his mother, chiefly on account of her beauty, from a powerful Turkish Pasha for less than £80. The Mohammedan religion permits the Khedive four wives, but Abbas II., like his father, is content with one, and is passionately devoted to the beautiful Circassian, who has borne him five charming daughters and a promising son.

More Beautiful Than Gold.

Prof. Roberts-Austen of London, England, has succeeded in making out of gold and aluminum a compound metal, or alloy, that is said to be the most brilliant known. Its general hue is a splendid purple; but as it is turned in the light it reflects bright tints of ruby color. A little more than three-quarters—more accurately 75 per cent.—of the alloy is gold, the remainder being aluminum. Some of the expectations recently raised in regard to the possibility of substituting aluminum for steel and iron are not likely to be realized; but that wonderful metal is proving of great use in combination with others, and the discovery of Prof. Roberts-Austen has led to very beautiful effects in jewelry.

Mother-In-Law For Sale.

A mother-in-law has been put up for auction in the streets of Belfast by a well-known local man, named O'Hare. He cleared the house of furniture in spite of the protests of the mother-in-law, raised her on to a table, and offered her to the highest bidder, but there were no offers. She subsequently went to the police office and obtained a warrant for assault, but O'Hare had disappeared.

CANADA AS A NATION

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Points with Pride to the Part His Gov't has had in Bringing Peace and Prosperity to this Country.

QUEBEC, Oct. 10.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke yesterday afternoon that in South Cape Breton Alex. at Ste. Henedine, Dorchester county.

The reception he was given was but another link in the Premier's long chain of triumphs.

Although Ste. Henedine is a village of only 400 inhabitants, Sir Wilfrid was greeted by a crowd of at least 5,000, who were gathered from all the parishes, of Dorchester and the bordering parishes of Beauce. On the Liberal side, the campaign had been at a standstill for about a week, Mr. C. Dechene, the candidate nominated at the first convention, having resigned for business reasons.

After an address on behalf of the county had been delivered to Sir Wilfrid by Dr. Morisset, the Liberal Chief made a masterly address.

The Premier said that the Liberal irrespective of race or creed, and the party was for equal rights for all, first thing he did when carried into power was to promote the peace and amity of Canada. He then turned his energies to developing Canadian industries and commerce. His government had secured the denunciation of the Belgian and German treaties. In 1902 he kept Canada out of the turmoil of militarism and had begun to make Canada a real nation by guarding her fortress with Canadian garrisons.

"The Liberal party secured provincial autonomy," said he; "my government secured national autonomy. Canada is now a nation; blind is he who does not see her. Canada is now a most prosperous country, her trade has developed fabulously because our tariff is protecting both manufacturer and the consumer."

Quoting the charges of extravagance for the Liberal government to spend \$76,000,000 if there is still a surplus of \$19,000,000, where the Conservatives, after having spent \$36,000,000, and had a deficit. As to the charges of scandals preferred against the government, he said that the government employees had been the only ones accused, and the only conclusion to draw from those charges is that the Liberals were too lenient in 1896 in not discharging all the Conservatives employed in the civil service.

"I am not a Pharisee," said he, "I cannot thank God that he has made me a better man than the common people. I am a poor sinner, but I can say with pride that there has never been an accusation of cupidity preferred against me, and though my enemies are not very particular in selecting their weapons, they could not yet say that personal gain was my motive."

Sir Wilfrid claimed that actual prosperity of the country is due to the Liberal immigration policy. To those who thank the Almighty God for that prosperity he answered that no blame can be thrown on him if he was the means by which God wanted the Canadians to be prosperous as He wanted to use Conservatives when he wanted to chastise the country.

He finished by inviting the electors to vote for Mr. Roy.

LIBERAL MAJORITY 65

Montreal Herald, After Careful Survey of Field, Makes a Prediction.

(Montreal Herald.)

The Herald has applied to a prominent Liberal in each of the different provinces of Canada for a careful and impartial estimate of the probable number of Liberal members who will go to Ottawa from his province after the coming election.

We print these estimates today as an indication of the real belief of Liberals who are in touch with the situation, as to the result of the elections. There is much water to go under the bridge yet before the date of polling, but if no unforeseen contingency arises in either direction we believe that these will be found substantially correct.

In the case of British Columbia, the estimate of the man on the spot is very much more favorable than of observers on this side of the Rockies, who have been inclined to admit that British Columbia, while having no particular love for the Conservatives, would visit all its own particular grievances, real and imaginary, on the heads of the Federal Government and materially reduce its Liberal representation. The Herald's informant in this province telegraphs, "Five, with fair prospects for the remaining two." It is not impossible that he is better aware of the real value of the noisy exclusionist and "better-terms" agitation than outsiders can be.
