VICTORY FOR PUGSLEY.

Mr. James Robinson, Ex-Conservative M. P., Predicts Government Will Carry 10 Seats in New Brunswick.

(Winnipeg Free Press.)

James Robinson of Miramichi, N. B., former member of the Dominion House, is a guest at the Royal Alexandra, and leaves with a party of friends for Regina tonight, to attend the election of western lands, which is to take place there from Oct. 12 to 17.

Mr. Robinson, when asked by a reporter in respect to the coming election in New Brunswick, replied that he felt sure that the Hon. Wm. Pugsley would carry the province for the Laurier government, probably with ten Liberals to three Conservatives.

When asked how he accounted for Premier Hazen carrying the provincial election, Mr. Robinson replied that Premier Hazen did not appeal to the people on party lines.

Mr. Robinson, who has been a life-long Conservative, sat two terms in the House of Commons as member for Northumberland. He was the nominee of the Conservative party at the last Dominion election, and was defeated at the polls by W. S. Loggie, the Liberal standard bearer. It was generally expected that Mr. Robinson would again be the Conservative nominee in Northumberland, but Mr. Morrison canvassed the constituency pretty thoroughly and succeeded in gaining a majority of votes over Mr. Robinson at the Conservative convention.

Mr. Robinson knows the general situation in New Brunswick as few men do and although an out and out Conservative, realizes that his party is doomed to a bitter defeat in this province.

DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.

The Earl of Clanwilliam, whose arrival in this city was noted in these columns yesterday, left this morning for the Tobique, to spend a few weeks hunting big game. The Earl has spent six weeks canoeing on the Tobique, Nepisiguit and Upsalquitch rivers, and had a very enjoyable outing. He found the water so low in some of the streams that the canoe had to be dragged for miles, and quite frequently the guides had to dig out a channel. The Earl had some good fishing and bird shooting, but did not try for big game. The Earl holds the rank of captain in the Royal Horse Guards, and served with distinction through the South African war. He is not a man who puts on any lugs, in fact he has more the appearance of a westerner than he has of a British nobleman.

JEWESSES IN ENGLAND.

Are Foremost In Every Intellectual and Artistic Pursuit.

It is interesting to note that Jewish women in England have been among the foremost in every intellectual and artistic pursuit, while in domestic life they have always been recognized as pre-eminent. Many great London hostesses, many talented wives of English statesmen, are Jewesses, and in philanthropy their work is very valuable. "The Jewess of stage and literature and life," says a writer in *The Lady's Realm*, "has always commanded honor, esteem, admiration. Intellect she has, and spirit, and as for chic, says Zangwill, your Yiddish girl possesses it in a degree which among Christians is the birthright of a few actresses and music hall artists—themselves probably of Semitic origin. And more than probably in the case of Madame Rachel, who began by selling oranges and singing at cafes, and ended by being feted right royally even at the Imperial Palace of St. Petersburg; and also in the case of Sarah Bernhardt, for her stage brilliancy is probably due to the half that is Hebrew. Turning to Jewesses in our midst, the public does not often number among its favorites such a group of relatives as Miss Julia Neilson, Miss Hilda Hanbury (sister of the late Lily Hanbury), Eileen Kerin and Nora Kerin, the last named, who studied at Paris and Queen's College, Harley street, declaring to the writer that they were all stage-struck whilst still in the nursery, where they acted their own tiny plays. Not to mention Miss Marie Dainton and Ada Reeve, Mrs. Lewis Waller and Mrs. Clement Scott, sisters, are Jewesses. Miss Irene Vanbrugh and Violet Vanbrugh admit a Jewish strain, though far off; Mrs. Brown-Potter is the granddaughter of a Spanish Jewess. And here one may say a word of the Jewess of the stage that her influence on it is wholly good, for, like Caesar's wife, a Jewess must be above reproach.

"But if one were asked to name the virtue pre-eminently which Jew and Jewess exercise in their relation toward the world, it would be philanthropy or benevolence. Montefiore and Mocatta have been and are names almost synonymous with those words, and we know what the late Mrs. Sam Lewis did with her millions, remembering even the telegraph boys, newspaper lads, and policemen at the dangerous crossing. Happily, Mrs. Bischoffsheim, la grande dame of philanthropy, is still with us, though her husband, who has given an excellent street ambulance system, did not long survive their golden wedding, which they celebrated by the distribution of £10,000 to Gentile and Jewish charities."

ARISTOCRATIC NUNS.

British Peerage Has Several Fair and Noble Recluses.

The Duke of Norfolk has two sisters who are nuns; Lady Minna Howard belongs to the Carmelite Order and Lady Etheldreda is a Sister of Charity. Lady Edith Fielding, sister to Lord Denbigh, is another Sister of Charity, and spends her days at a convent in Kiou-Kiang, which is in China, as its name indicates. Lady Cristina Bandini, daughter of our Scotch-Italian peer, Lord Newburgh, is a nun in a French convent; and Lady Leopoldina Keppel in a nun of the Sacred Heart, in spite of the fact

that she is sister of a Protestant peer, Lord Albemarle.

Then, Miss Mary and Miss Edith Clifford, sister of Lord Clifford of Chudleigh, are both nuns, as are Miss Cicely Arundell, sister to Lord Arundell, and Miss Leonie Dormer, sister to Lord Dormer. Lord French, who lives in Johannesburg, has two sisters who are nuns; three Misses Petre, sisters of Lord Petre, are nuns; Lord Herries has no fewer than four sister who live in convents; and, as for Lord Trimlestown, an Irish peer and eighteenth baron, history seems uncertain as to whether four or five of his sisters are nuns, as several of these ladies have not been raised to the rank of baron's daughters. In by-gone days there were four sisters of a one-time Lord Camoys who had taken the veil, but most of these ladies are now no more.

A Laughing Philosopher.

The Earl of Sandwich, whose great-nephew has been sponsored by the German Emperor, was once described as a "laughing philosopher." He is a man of parts, a musician, an architect, a connoisseur in art, and a great traveler. He has never married, but shows a marked liking for children, and keeps about a hundred, mostly the sons of soldiers, in a house on his estate, called St. Edward's Home. At the time of the Boer War he turned his country place, Hinchbrook, into a convalescent hospital for wounded officers. The humorous side of his nature is sometimes shown in curious fashion. For instance, during the bicycle craze, he used to walk about the streets of Huntingdon on a bicycle bell, which he rang incessantly in order to warn unwary pedestrians of their possible danger. For his charitable deeds he has received from King Edward the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

The State and the Crystal Palace.

A movement has been organized to obtain state aid for the Crystal Palace. The Lord Mayor has taken the matter in hand, and a public meeting is to be held to consider the project. It is stated that an initial grant of £100,000 and an annual subsidy of £12,000 would be required. The Crystal Palace, which has labored under financial difficulties for some years, is considered to be a national institution, and Lord Brassey, among others, favors a Government grant.

London on Canvas.

By permission of Archbishop Bourne, Mr. Louis Weirter, R.B.A., has converted the top of the lofty campanile of Westminster Cathedral into a sort of studio, from which he is painting an immense picture of London, measuring 20 feet by 12 feet, as seen from that lofty view-point.
