NEW WHARVES.

Plans and specifications for a number of new wharves to be built by the Federal government in Queens and Sunbury Counties, have been received at the Fredericton post office where they may be seen by probable tenderers. New wharves are to be built at Scotchtown, McAllister's, Young's Cove, The Range, Iron Bound Cove, Barker's, Newcastle, Burton and Lower Jemseg. The wharves will be equipped with floats to be used in high or low water, and a small building will be erected on each for the use of passengers in wet weather.

KEEP THEM GOING

Reports From all Parts of the County Most Encouraging to Liberal Candidate

Every day the signs of a great Liberal victory in York are growing brighter, and already there is consternation in the Tory ranks. They are no longer going about boasting that Crockett will have a walk over, but have set themselves to work to try and stem the tide of public opinion which they know is running against him. In the up river parishes and also in the city there is a revulsion of feeling against Crockett, and it is rapidly spreading to other sections of the county. The people want a change, not of government, but in the representation of York, and they are going to have it.

"Brown is one of our own boys," remarked a resident of Bear Island, who was in the city recently, "and up our way we are going to stand by him irrespective of party. He knows our needs along the valley of the St. John as well as any other living man, and has the ability to lay our case before parliament."

A resident of the parish of Bright, who travels about and has considerable influence, told his friends in the city last week that he was going to vote for Brown in this election. He said that he had never previously cast a Liberal ballot, but he was going to do so this time, and he didn't care who knew it. He gave as his reason for the change that he had been grossly deceived by the local members for the county.

From all sections of the county come reports of dissensions in the Tory ranks over patronage matters. Appointments to office have been unsatisfactory, and the jealousies and heartburnings will find expression at the polls on the 26th. The young men of the county, many of whom supported McLeod and his ticket in the local election, are up in arms against the increased road tax, and

are beginning to realize that by voting for Brown they will square accounts with the men responsible for doubling their taxes.

In the city the tide is running strongly in Mr. Brown's favor, and the Liberals are working away with an enthusiasm unknown in previous elections. The most rabid Tory concedes that Brown will win out in the city, but they are hopeful of keeping down the majority. In this, however, they are going to be badly sold. The Liberal committee rooms were crowded last evening with enthusiastic workers, and reports of the most encouraging nature were submitted. It is worthy of note that some of the most active workers, who nightly assemble in the Liberal committee rooms, are men who voted the Conservative ticket in previous elections.

A most successful meeting in the interests of the Liberal candidate was held at Mouth of Penniac last evening. The speakers were Messrs. J. D. Phinney, K. C., and W. J. Osborne of this city. They made telling addresses in favor of the Laurier government, and were frequently applauded.

Messrs. N. S. Dow and Peter J. Hughes were the speakers at a meeting of the electors of Nasonworth last evening. Although this is Tory stronghold they succeeded in attracting a good sized audience and gave them some good sound Liberal doctrine. Mr. Dow ably discussed the government's agricultural policy, while Mr. Hughes dealt with "Turn on the Tap," Foster's record as frenzied financier with the funds of widows and orphans.

RALLY AT OROMOCTO.

The young men of the Liberal party in this city are not only carrying on a strenuous campaign at home, but have been able to do some effective missionary work in Sunbury and Queens. On Monday evening Messrs. R. W. McLellan and W. H. McGinn addressed a big meeting at Oromocto in Col. McLean's interests. They presented the principal issues of the campaign in a vigorous manner, and were frequently applauded. Mr. L. F. McLean was chairman of the meeting. The enthusiasm for Col. McLean in the vicinity of Oromocto is unbounded and he will take a vote in the parish of Burton that will astonish his opponents. It is freely predicted that Col. McLean will carry at least four of the seven parishes of the county.
