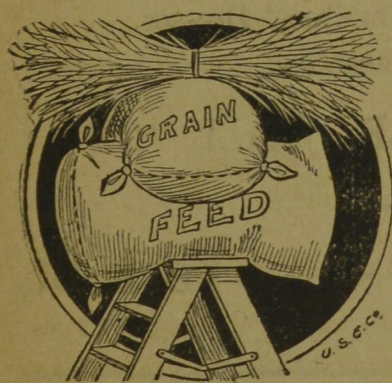

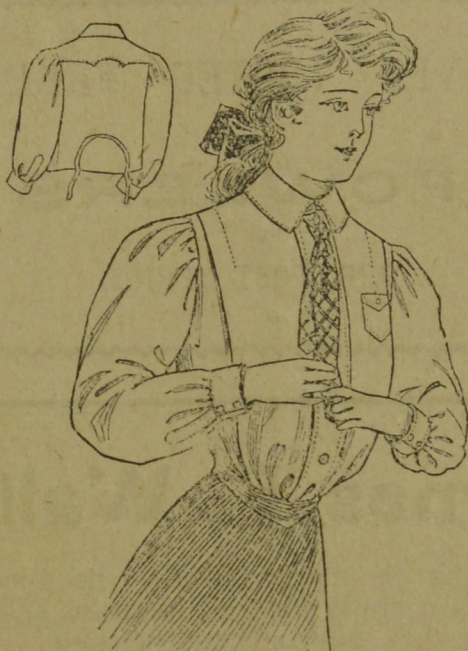

MISSES' SHIRT-BLOUSE.

Parris Pattern, No. 1504.

All seams allowed.

This smart looking shirt-waist is in Peter Pan style but with the regulation shirt sleeves. It will be developed in fancy flannels and silks and all sorts of novelty shirtings, but must be strictly tailored. An oddly shaped yoke-facing is applied on the back, which is otherwise plain. The fronts are closed through a wide box plait at the centre and a tuck is made quite close to the sleeve from the shoulder nearly to the bust, giving desirable breadth. A pointed patch pocket with turnover pointed lap is stitched on the left front, a button and button hole securing the lap. The pattern is in 3 sizes—13 to 17 years. For a Miss of 15 years, the blouse requires 4½ yards of material 20 inches wide, 2½ yards 36 inches wide, or 2½ yards 42 inches wide.

AN EFFECTIVE DEFENCE

Premier and Surveyor General Effectively Reply to Opposition Slanders

One of the most rousing Liberal meetings of the campaign in Westmorland took place Tuesday evening at Bonnell's Corner, Moncton Parish, where the hall was crowded by an enthusiastic gathering who heard stirring speeches by Premier Robinson and Hon. F. J. Sweeney.

HON. F. J. SWEENEY.

The Surveyor General was first introduced and given a rousing reception. He thanked the electors for their attendance and for the support and votes they had given the Premier and votes they had given the Premier himself and colleagues at the last local election, and said they come again to them asking for support. He also thanked the ladies for their presence. Hon. Mr. Sweeney said it was the first opportunity he had had of speaking to these people and thanking them. The fact that the Liberal ticket had been fully supported was evidence of their broad views and intelligent consideration of public affairs. He then took up some of the charges being hurled by the opposition at the Government, and answered them to the entire satisfaction of the large gathering. He outlined the early history of the Central Railway, who it was projected by, and the condition of the road before the Government took it over, the money the Government had put in it in an effort to assist in the development of the coal fields, and pointed out that the first vote of money towards the assistance of the Central Railway Mr. Hazen himself voted for it, though now he is condemning the money spent in the purchase of the Central Railway. He referred to the fact that the government took the road over, repaired it, put it in first class shape. Today the road was paying; today the coal fields are being developed; today our own people are being employed in taking up the coal; our own people are getting returns from the sale of the coal; employees of the road are given employment in hauling out the coal; lumbermen are being benefitted by the demand for lumber used in the mines; farmers are being benefitted by the better demand for farm products; the country has been opened up by the road. Then again the fishing resorts have been made more accessible to sportsmen and tourists, and in every way great development and progress is taking place at Chipman and Minto. Besides that, the road touching the G. T. P. at Chipman is being largely used by the contractors of the transcontinental line, and it is likely to become an even more valuable asset because it will become an outlet for the winter port of St. John for the western trade which must come over the G. T. P. Notwithstanding the cry of the Opposition, the road today is worth much more than the amount of money put into it by the people of New Brunswick, and today is paying its way. Last year thirty-five thousand tons of coal were raised upon which the Government was paid a royalty of ten cents a ton. From present indications it would look as if this year the product would exceed 100,000 tons. The people own the road. They have assisted every other branch line in the country, but do not own a sleeper of any other branch line although the people's money has been put into it. In this instance the government actually owns the road and while the Opposition is saying the road is no good and the money spent upon it was wasted, yet when the government wanted to lease the road for 999 years at a rate equal to three per cent upon the money invested, members of the Opposition to a man voted against leasing the road because they said it was worth more. Hon. Mr. Sweeney dealt also with the International Railway, which he said would open up one of the richest lumber districts of the province and would be a great boon to the north shore towns and people. He pointed out that the northern portion of this province did not give the same railway facilities as were afforded in other sections, but said that the people of this section were entitled to equal rights. He said the International Railway was being built up to the standard of the I. C. R. and that the Government had guaranteed its bonds to the extent of eight thousand dollars a mile, and had taken a first mortgage upon the road, rolling stock and branches. He pointed out the narrowness of Mr. Hazen's policy when he opposed the guaranteeing of these bonds, but favored the guaranteeing of bonds for nearly twice that amount for a road which touched upon his own and other Conservative constituents. Hon. Mr. Sweeney also dealt with the eastern extension claim and refuted the charges made concerning Dr. Pugsley. He referred to the development of the iron deposits in Gloucester, and of the Government's efforts to develop the great national resources of our province, the increase from the royalties, and closed by predicting a glorious future for the province, and strongly appealed for continued support of the Liberal ticket.

PREMIER ROBINSON.

was received with loud applause, being heartily cheered as he arose to address the gathering. For an hour or more he spoke, scoring point after point against the Opposition, refuting their charges, and pointing out a few of the many good acts of the present administration, his speech being one of the best of the campaign.

The Premier dealt with financial matters and taking up the question of the public debt showed that Mr. Hazen and Mr. Flemming did not agree on their statement of the public debt. At Bathurst Mr. Hazen has made it in the vicinity of nine millions and recently at Moncton Mr. Flemming had made it a little over three millions. He referred to Mr. Flemming's challenge and to his proposition to submit the question of the public debt to expert accountants and which Mr. Flemming had not accepted. While the debate proposed by Mr. Flemming might be very interesting to those present it would not settle the question of the public debt, but the report of expert accountants would settle it, and the people certainly had a right to know. He referred to the campaign of lies, slander and innuendo, that the Opposition were making use of and which they had thus far failed to retract although challenged as to the truth of their statements. He took up the road act and gave a clear outline of the government's intention in that connection and in referring to the previous Road Act showed that it was not a political measure but both parties were asked to give their support in making the act as perfect as possible. The only question raised by the Opposition was that of giving the control over the municipalities. This in some cases might work to the advantage of the people, while in others it might not but the municipalities would still have to select the people of the municipalities as superintendents, and that was what the government had done. In many instances better men might perhaps have been selected than was done, but in other cases, worse men might have been chosen.

SCHOOL BOOK MATTERS.

Premier Robinson then took up the school book question, answering it thoroughly. He produced a letter from the Canada Publishing Co. written in November last to Chief Superintendent of Education, J. R. Inch, when the government was enquiring into the school book matter, saying that the books which are today marked so low in Ontario are being sold at less than cost in order to get rid of a lot of dead stock. He then referred to the future of the province, its development, its prospects, and made a stirring appeal to the others to again support himself and colleagues and the government that had done so much for the province of New Brunswick that had helped to raise the prices of the farm products, had given better wages to the people, opened up lands for settlement, and had in every way assisted the people of the province to live happier lives. He referred to the Mechanics Lien, the Woodsmen's Lien, and the Factory Act, and many statutory provisions that the government had provided to protect the common people and their rights. He claimed that the Liberal Government would be returned to power by even a greater majority than previously. All he asked for the government was fair and just treatment, and he was sure that if the people looked into the question, reason it out, they would find that the Liberal government was well worthy of their support and votes. He was satisfied that when the ballots were counted not only would the government be sustained, but he and his colleagues would be sustained by the people of this noble county of Westmorland.
