CITY COUNCIL.

or expenses incurred in the enforcement of the Act.

Ald. Clark maintained that it would be only fair that one quarter of the policemen's salaries should be paid out of the Scott Act funds.

Ald. Mitchell seconded the motion, and supported it in a brief speech.

Ald. Winslow strongly opposed the resolution. If the city were to pay for legal expenses entailed in the enforcement of the Scott Act, the work should be done by the city clerk. He did not think much of the arrangement to pay one fourth of the policemen's salaries out of the Scott Act fund. It would be remembered that the city had to pay the police magistrate's salary, also one third of the cost of administration of justice for the county. He thought that the question was one that required the most careful consideration. If the resolution passed, and pledged the council to pay all legal expenses, there would be nothing to hinder any lawyer from laying Scott Act information, and employing himself as counsel. He closed by moving in amendment that the matter be considered three months hence.

Ald. Crowe and Kitchen agreed with Ald. Winslow, that the matter was one calling for careful consideration.

The city clerk, at the request of Ald. Walker, explained that the law required that the city should go to pay for the enforcement of the Act.

Ald. Walker said that he could not support the resolution as presented. The mayor suggested that to avoid future trouble, the resolution should be amended, so that the payments could only be made on the order of the council.

After some further discussion Ald. Clark withdrew his resolution, and substituted another, to the effect that the city treasurer be instructed to carry out the law in regard to Scott Act fines.

Ald. Winslow said that considerable difference of opinion existed as to the meaning of the law on that particular point. He thought as it was a large question, a committee should be appointed to look into the matter. He moved a resolution to that effect.

Ald. Kitchen seconded the amendment.

Ald. Crowe and Walker strongly favored referring the matter to a committee to investigate.

Ald. Weddall said, that although satisfied that the council had power to pass such a resolution, he was perfectly willing that it should go to a committee.

Ald. Winslow's amendment was put and carried without division.

Ald. Clark next moved that pending investigation, the city clerk be authorized to conduct prosecutions in Scott Act cases.

Ald. Winslow wanted to know of the city clerk was to be paid extra for the work.

Ald. Clark thought that he should receive extra.

Ald. Winslow said that while he had no objection to the city clerk making a dollar, he would oppose any such arrangement as that proposed by Ald. Clark.

The mayor appointed as a committee of investigation, Aids. Winslow, Kitchen, Clark, Crowe and Weddall.

ROAD COMMITTEE CHANGED.

Ald. Winslow moved a resolution to the effect that the road committee in future consist of three members instead of ten. He argued that the present large committee had not given satisfaction. The streets, especially Queen street, was in a disgraceful condition, and it seemed impossible to bring about any improvement under the present system. He knew of several water man hole covers which were away above the level of the street, and were a source of danger to vehicles. As the Dominion exhibition was likely to be held in Fredericton next year, it was important that the streets should be well looked after.

Ald. Walker supported Ald. Winslow's resolution. He found fault with the present system, and claimed that under it the roadmaster was between the devil and the deep sea. He said that the streets were torn up for water and sewerage connections, and it seemed difficult to get them repaired again.

Alderman Mitchell pointed out that two years ago a sewerage system had been installed, and since that the streets had been torn up to make connections. He did not think that the aldermen should be too ready to find fault with the roadmaster or chairman of the road committee, as they had a great deal of work to do.

Ald. Winslow claimed that a small committee would be in a position to do much better work. He had no fault to find with the present chairman of the committee, but thought he could do better work if he had a smaller committee. He believed that the city engineer should have charge of the streets.

Ald. Winslow's motion was carried on the following division:

Yeas—Winslow, Kitchen, Crowe, Walker, Jewett—5.

Nays—Clark, Weddall, Mitchell—3.

The council elected Aids. Mitchell, Winslow and Kitchen to be the new committee.

On motion of Ald. Kitchen it was decided that the committee meet once a week.

The mayor gave an account of the incident of last Saturday morning, when the fire department was called out to go to Burt's Corner to help extinguish a fire. He said that Chief Butler and his men turned out willingly, and were already to proceed to Burt's Corner, when word came that the fire was under control. He had since received a message from Burt's Corner thanking them.

On motion of Ald. Weddall the thanks of the council were extended to the mayor and chief engineer.

Ald. Walker complained that some unwarranted reflection had been cast on the bread makers of the city at a previous meeting, and had never been retracted. He had been interviewed on the subject by Baker O'Neill, who had been able to convince him that his bread was of good weight.

Ald. Kitchen, who was evidently the one referred to by Ald. Walker, denied that he had ever said that Mr. O'Neill's bread was short-weight.

Bread Inspector Roberts told about investigating complaints quite recently, but had found nothing to sustain them. There was no doubt that bread lost weight after drying out. He thought all the bakers tried to keep within the law.

On motion of Ald. Winslow the council adjourned sine die.

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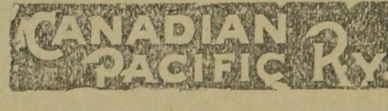
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
