THE CAMPAIGN IN YORK.

Electors Rallying to the Support of N. W. Brown, the People's Candidate.

If the enthusiastic reception accorded to Mr. N. W. Brown, the Liberal candidate in the Parish of Stanley is any indication of public opinion, the Tories will not have things their own way in that parish on October 26th. Mr. Brown reached Bloomfield on Monday morning and made a thorough canvass of that section. On the following day he worked his way down to Williamsburg and Cross Creek conducting a house to house canvass. The cordiality of the reception accorded him by both Liberals and Conservatives was remarkable and he will take a vote out of that district that will surprise the opponents. The Liberal candidate has proved himself a tireless worker and it is work that wins elections first, last and all the time.

At Parker's Ridge on Monday night Mr. Brown addressed an audience that filled the hall to overflowing, and came in for a magnificent welcome. Mr. Calhoun was chairman, and the audience showed marked enthusiasm at times. Mr. Brown spoke for two hours and twenty-five minutes, and dealt with the issues of the campaign in a masterly manner. He was listened to with the greatest interest and his speech undoubtedly won for him many votes.

At the close of the general meeting there was a rally of Liberals workers called together by organizer McKeown and a committee of fifteen was appointed. Marked enthusiasm prevailed, and every member of the committee promised to take hold and do his part towards carrying the poll by a substantial majority.

On Tuesday night the Liberal candidate was the principal speaker at an exceptionally fine meeting at Cross Creek. There is no denying the fact that this district has hitherto strongly supported the Tory party and an effort was made yesterday by Tory leaders to get the people to go to Stanley where the Tory candidate and Solicitor General McLeod were to hold forth. They even went so far as to tell the people that a joint meeting had been arranged by the candidates for the village. The little little scheme failed to work, however, and the Liberals held their meeting at Cross Creek. They had an audience of nearly one hundred persons, and everyone remained until the close. Mr. Sterling was chairman and opened the meeting with a short address, after which Dr. Moore was called upon and spoke briefly.

The Liberal candidate was called upon and delivered what any concede to have been the finest campaign speech heard in that neighborhood since the palm days of the late Hon. A. G. Blair. He exposed in scathing language the Tory campaign of slander and humbug and contrasted it with the able and statesmanlike policy of the Liberals. He closed with a powerful appeal for support on October 26th and was cheered to the echo.

On Saturday evening Mr. Brown will address a meeting in the agricultural hall at Stanley village and is sure to draw a big crowd. He has issued an invitation for the Tory candidate to attend, and is hopeful that it will be accepted.

OTHER MEETINGS.

Messrs. W. H. McGinn and Hedley Maxon, of this city held a very successful meeting in Mr. Brown's interests at Cork on Monday evening. Mr. C. E. Crowley made an excellent chairman and the hall was crowded. They discussed the issues of the campaign in a fair and intelligent manner and were listened to with marked attention.

On Tuesday evening Messrs. Maxon and McGinn addressed a good meeting at Newmarket which was presided over by Ex-Coun. David Essensa. They held the undivided attention of the audience for over two hours and their utterances were frequently applauded. At the two meetings upwards of fifty electors came forward and signed the candidate's nomination papers.

Messrs. C. H. Allen and N. S. Dow addressed a fine meeting in the interests of the Liberal candidate at Springfield on Tuesday evening. Mr. Dow dwelt upon the great advances that agriculture had made in Canada under Liberal rule, and clutched his arguments by quotations from the public records. Mr. Allen ably exposed the slander campaign being carried on by the Foster-Fowler-Lefurgey-Pope-Zandring-Zandray-Borden-Bayne-Booze Brigade.

GETTING TO WORK

C. P. R. Taking on Large Numbers of Men After the Strike

MONTREAL, Oct. 7.—(Special).—All over the C. P. R. system today, men are applying for work, but there is likely to be trouble as a large percentage of them can't get work yet an account of the large number of skilled men taken on during the strike.

At the Angus shops there were 250 taken on yesterday and today. About 150 yesterday and 300 today were refused work. They are taking only the best of the metal workers now. The rush began at 5.40 and the men are lined up to the number of two thousand.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 7.—(Special).—This morning hundreds of mechanics are applying for work at the C. P. R. shops, but only a comparatively small percentage are being given employment on account of the large number of skilled strike breakers at work.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 7.—(Special).—There is as yet no change in the C. P. R. strike situation. None of the men have returned to work.
