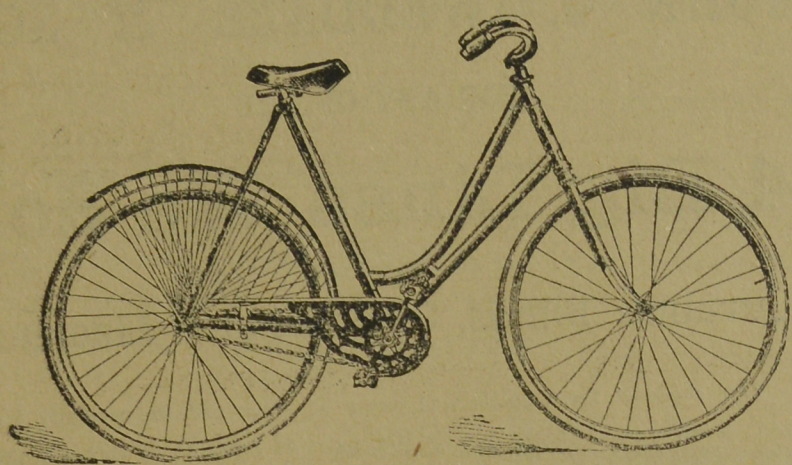

THREATS AT KIMBERLEY.

Rumors of Plots to Blow up de Beers Buildings.

LONDON, April 25.—A despatch from Kimberley declares that great excitement exists there as a result of rumored plots among the unemployed to blow up the DeBeers offices and other big buildings. The present situation is the outgrowth of recent wholesale dismissals of employees by the company, following the demoralization of the world's diamond trade; and the alarm is increased by the fact that, despite the company's rule giving railway tickets to any part of Africa to dismissed employees, a great many former workmen still remain. Both the offices and the diamond store are guarded by armed men day and night, and other special precautions are being taken. Several fires of incendiary origin in the neighborhood of the plant are attributed to the dismissed men.

SCHOOL BOOK QUESTION.

Liberal Leader in Ontario Lets in Some Light on Question Much Discussed During New Brunswick Elections.

An Explanation of Cheap Readers in the Premier Province

Steaking at Kingsville, Essex Co., books would be at all similar. Friday, Hon. A. G. McKay, the Liberal leader in the Ontario legislature, said:

The present government are taking great credit to themselves in connection with the reduction in the price of school readers. For the time being Ontario readers are being sold cheaper than formerly. The facts, however, in connection with the present short-term contract with the publishers should be clearly understood. When the department had declared that after the lapse of a year and a half the old Ontario readers would cease to be authorized, and their use in the public schools would no longer be allowed, they then advertised for tenders for the publication of these old readers for that short period. When the readers were received the contract was not let in accordance with the specifications and requirements, but a special bargain was made with the same firm of publishers, who at that time, of course, had a very large stock on hand of the Ontario readers in a complete and semi-complete state. The contract, therefore, for this short period with the same old publishing firm partook rather of the nature of a remnant sale than otherwise. The publishers well knew that if they did not get the contract they would have a tremendous amount of dead stock on their hands. Proceeding, Mr. McKay said: "An intelligent ten-year-old can readily see the difference between the price they would quote under the circumstances of this kind and the price they or other firms would quote if asked for tenders for the publication of an entirely new series which they had no stock on hand. It is simply ridiculous to say that the conditions are at all similar or that the prices quoted for the publication of the text

MR. COOPER'S OPINION.

"It will be recalled that the government appointed a commission to inquire into the cost and suitability of the present text books. John A. Cooper, a practical printer, a Conservative in politics, was a member of the commission. The government in appointing him and paying him for his services, and his competency. After having fully investigated the matter and knowing full well the peculiarities of the contract made for a year and a half he ought to have an opinion of some importance. He knows, as any sane man knows, that the temporary prices for which the old readers are now being sold under such exceptional circumstances cannot permanently govern. The Education Department has men now at work preparing an entirely new set of school readers. Mr. Cooper understands all the circumstances and knows perfectly well that these new readers cannot and will not be published at the bargain counter prices now being paid for the old readers. After arguing the matter out at some length he says: "This temporary reduction in price lasts only for one and a half years. What will happen then is a matter of conjecture. The probability is that if a new set of readers is prepared and the paper and binding brought up to date the price will be back to the old figure, if not higher. "Gentlemen, I give you this as a clearly expressed opinion of the commissioner, himself a Conservative, who is in a position to know the facts. Accepting his opinion as accurate, you will readily see that the people are being largely humbugged by Conservative politicians, who pretend that the present low prices will permanently continue." (Cheers.)

LAND GRAFTER FOWLER.

Hero of Western Speculations Made Indecent Attack Upon Hon. Dr. Pugsley who Treated the Rake as if Min with the Contempt He Deserved.

OTTAWA, April 25.—The House of Commons was treated to a contrast of manners yesterday.

George W. Fowler turned loose his vitriolic tongue upon the Minister of Public Works, and Hon. Dr. Pugsley replied with dignity becoming a Canadian public man and a responsible member of the Canadian parliament.

Dr. Pugsley is a strong man and is hated by the opposition for that reason. Mr. Fowler is not strong, but is ingeniously and vindictively bitter. The manner in which he used his immunity as a member of parliament yesterday added a little to his reputation for reckless and unjust utterances, but did not at all enhance the Commons' appreciation of him as a man.

Dr. Pugsley on the other hand showed his usual strength and decency and added to the reputation he had been making as a minister of the crown and a worthy adviser to his excellency.

FOWLER BARKS.

When the House went into committee of supply on the public works estimate, Mr. Fowler constituted himself the chief critic of the Minister of Public Works, whom he plied with most irrelevant and useless questions. After condemning the expenditure of the department on architect's fees Mr. Fowler went out of his way to say that Mr. Pugsley would excel all his colleagues in the matter of extravagance.

Mr. Pugsley good-naturedly recalled the fact that there was once a time when Mr. Fowler said nice things about him, and that therefore he did not take too seriously his criticism. Mr. Fowler replied with a personal attack on the Minister of Public Works, whose political history he recalled at length.

The chairman (Mr. Johnston) suggested that Mr. Fowler was wandering away from his estimates.

Mr. Fowler (excitedly)—"The chair Mr. Fowler (excitedly)—"The chairman wants to stop me because his friend the Minister is getting the worst of it. (Cries of "order"). He refuses to allow me to answer the proposals now to exercise his right to say about the Minister of Public Works, and I would like to have an opportunity to say them." (Renewed cries of order.)

The chairman said he had no objection to Mr. Fowler replying to the Minister, but pointed out that a speech like that of the member of Kings and Albert was entirely out of order.

Mr. Fowler, ignoring the hint, proceeded with his harangue. He admitted that as an individual the Minister of Public Works was a very nice, courteous gentleman, but declared that when they came to speak of the hon. Minister's politics the terms used would depend upon the period of Mr. Pugsley's political career to which they referred. He described Mr. Pugsley as a man old in political sin, compared him to a caterpillar who had turned into a gaudy butterfly and informed Sir Wilfrid Laurier that there was a time when the Minister of Public Works called him a traitor.

Mr. Pugsley said he was not disposed to take Mr. Fowler seriously, but he was really indulging in heights of imagination and making statements that were absolutely without foundation.

Mr. Fowler suggested that the Prime Minister should see if he could not find a man in New Brunswick in whom the public would have more confidence than in Hon. Dr. Pugsley. This advice he gave, he declared, from purely disinterested and patriotic motives, whereas the Liberals laughed.

DR. PUGSLEY'S REBUKE.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley apologized to the House for taking up a moment of time in reply to remarks that were irrelevant to the matter under discussion. He wished to say, however, that Mr. Fowler had made the same speech that he had made some months ago in St. John before the by-election to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Stockton.

The hon. gentleman had strongly appealed to Conservatives to oppose Dr. Pugsley. The answer of the electorate of St. John Liberals and Conservatives alike had been the election of himself (Dr. Pugsley) by acclamation. (Liberal cheers.)

Mr. Fowler declared that Dr. Pugsley had held out a bribe to the constituency what he would be able as Minister of Public Works to do for them. If he had gone to St. John to seek election without his portfolio he would have been beaten by more than 500 votes. It was not the person, but the office of the honorable gentleman that was elected.

Mr. Pugsley—"That is rather insulting to the intelligence of the electorate of St. John."

Mr. Fowler, proceeding, said Dr. Pugsley had never won an election as a member of an opposition. When he ran as an independent in 1896 he was so disastrously beaten that he lost his deposit. This sentence Mr. Fowler rounded off with a "Ha, ha," similar in tone to that which is frequently heard during the enactment of thrilling dramas.
