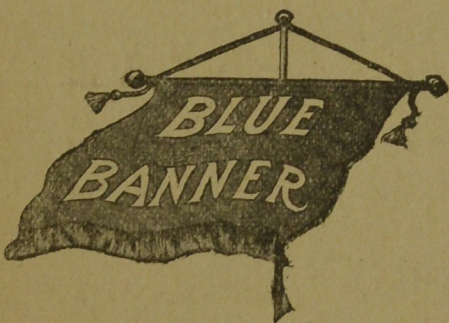

HONEST CAMPAIGNING VS. INTIMIDATION AND VIOLENCE

To the Editor of the Herald:

Sir—The attention of the intelligent thinking electors is called to some features of the present campaign. The Scott Act Committee, having in view the retention of the Act as the best available means for promoting the moral and industrial well-being of the community; for the preservation of our young men and boys from the dangers of the licensed bar running wide open sixteen hours per day; for the removal of temptation from the way of the weak and for the safety of the home, have conducted a clean campaign throughout.

The license advocates began their campaign by coercing some and attempting the coercion of other men to sign their petition. They secured many names by misstating the purpose of the petition.

They have resorted to intimidation intimating to men, either directly or by their agents, that "it would be just as well to keep quiet" in this campaign against the repeal, if they wished to gain preferment in certain directions or to hold certain official positions. Everybody knows what their method will be on election day.

Their newspaper correspondence has been a continuous policy of misrepresentation of the benefits of license in other places in the face of unimpeachable evidence to the contrary; of

insinuation against and personal attack upon the members of the Scott Act Committee, whose characters need no defence.

"VIOLENCE" is plainly intimated in their writings and acts. They even hinted at the destruction of churches. They remember that those who resort to these tactics never hesitate to deny their use. The two things always go together. The TRADE has never hesitated to use violent means where its existence was at stake. Men are living here today who have had the gun of the assassin pointed at them because they were engaged in putting down rum selling instances can be multiplied where the same methods have been employed to terrorize active temperance workers.

MEN OF FREDERICTON, assert your manhood at this time. We think the electors of this grand old city are too manly a set of men to submit to the rule of the grogshop. On which side are YOU lined up in this contest?

FALLING CHIMNEY

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 27.—(Special)—While a number of school children were playing in the yard of a public school, number 35, on Salem street this morning, a tall chimney on an adjoining building was blown over by a heavy wind, falling in the midst of the pupils, William Pinzel, fourteen years of age, was caught under the debris and crushed to death.

Hugh Doherty, aged sixteen years, received a fractured skull and Leroy Hodges, aged 14 years, received many lacerations, and is internally injured. A number of other children received minor bruises and cuts.
