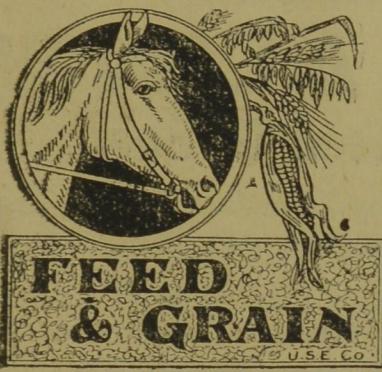

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ROBINSON'S SPEECH.

(Continued from Second Page.)

In taking up the question of permanent bridges, the honorable gentleman's estimates go a long way into the future and include bridges which may not be built for many years and he characterized monies which would have to be found in the distant future as liabilities. Under such circumstances by what process of reasoning did he not include the bridges which would be built as assets? He puts the sum for which the province is liable in the future at \$500,000. No one could deny that these bridges were necessary as a means of affording transportation facilities. The amount set down for bridges did not include the old wooden bridges, the Suspension Bridge at St. John, the Woodstock bridge, nor any of the Dominion Bridges. These should certainly be put on the other side of the account which would amount to \$2,400,000. They had a right also to include the claim for the additional subsidy amounted to \$48,000 which was a good asset and if the present government was alive to its duty it would collect. Then they have the public buildings in the province which were

late government had preserved the Crown lands, which they valued at \$21,000,000. That was the reverse side of the picture. The government had shown every kind of liability they could think of, either in the past or the present, or what would come into existence long after the present generation was forgotten, and he felt it to be his duty to show that this province was not in such a desperate state as the members of the government would like to make out. He had shown and fully shown the magnitude of the resources of the province, and had also shown that under careful management and statesman like oversight as had been the case in the last few years, they would be well preserved and kept for the people.

THE ECONOMY CRY.

A good deal has been said about economy. The provincial secretary had had a good deal to say about the saving he had effected in the cost of printing the Royal Gazette. He (the speaker) hoped that whilst he had been able to reduce the cost, he had not reduced it so fine as to leave no profit to the printer. It was not a proper policy to demand such a low price that some poor workman would have to work for nothing. He did not believe in a cheap saving policy just to save a few dollars. He also stated that he had been able to save 35 per cent on the cost of stationery. He hoped he had been able to effect this without getting poorer quality of materials. That sort of microscopic economy was a very poor kind, and didn't pay in the long run. In the matter of administration of justice, the appropriation was much larger than the previous year, at which he was not surprised. It was said that they had spent money on lawyers, but they had not spent more than they could avoid. The present government said they were going to do away with that system, but he failed to see any evidence of a change of policy up to the present.

THE BRANCH RAILWAYS.

He hoped that hon. gentlemen on the government side would do their best to bring about the taking over of the branch railways by the Intercolonial. This was a most important project, and he thought both parties were agreed that it was a much needed reform. The I. C. R. was able to manage roads at a much less cost than privately owned railways. The people would receive very much better accommodation.

But what was wanted more than anything else was greater industrial development. They wanted more manufacturing establishments, and it was the duty of the government to look after that branch of industry, and make a more determined effort in that direction than had been the case in the past. (Applause.)
