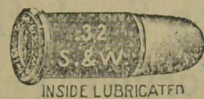

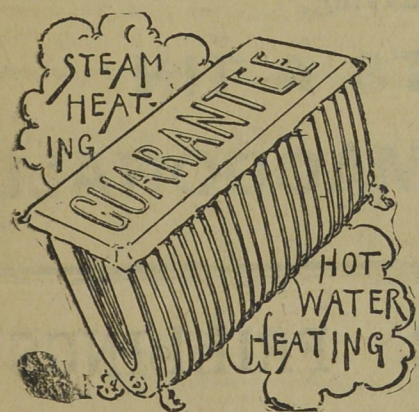

LABORING MEN READ

This Shows what the Laurier Government Has Done for the Cause of Labor.

(Mr. H. J. Logan, M. P., at the Opera House.)
Mr. Logan next, made reference to the legislation passed by the present government in the interests of labor. He said he was going to make a statement which he defied any man to contradict and that was this: "You can search the statutes of Canada and you will find there only three acts passed by the Tories for Labor. The Conservatives gave us Labor Day and we are thankful for that. They put a head tax of fifty dollars on Chinese, but it was no good, as any employer would pay it and get it back out of the man's wages in three months. Thirdly in 1887 the Conservatives appointed a commission of their old friends to find out what the laboring men wanted. On the strength of that the government went about the country appealing for the support of the laboring men. The commission went about the country during the next four years, and did not report until just prior to the next election. They then reported in favor of establishing a Labor Bureau. An act was passed, and the sum of \$10,000 was appropriated with which to put it in force. The government went to the people in 1891 and appealed to the votes of the laboring men, but would you believe it, they never spent one dollar of that \$10,000 in establishing a Labor Bureau. They were put out of power and it is not much wonder. They had asked the Conservatives for a tax on Chinese, but they asked for bread and received a stone. (Applause.) Since the Liberals had come into power they had established the Labor Gazette and the Labor Bureau, and they had the promise of Sir Wilfrid that there would be a Minister of Labor established. They abolished the 'sweating system,' they enacted an alien labor law which demands an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth. They increased the head-tax on Chinese to \$100; the labor men said it was not enough, then the government raised it to \$500 and there has hardly been a pig-tail come over the fence since that time. Under the old government when a man had a government contract he would bring in dagoes, pay them what he pleased and our own men with families to support could stand by with hands in their pockets. The laboring men had gone to the old government and asked for protection, but they might as well have asked for the moon. The present government has established a fair wage system for government contracts and had an officer to see that it was enforced. A man who now tenders for a government contract, must state in that contract what he must pay for labor. And more than that every railway, that receives a government subsidy, must abide by the fair wage schedule. Recently the government had enacted the Workmen's Conciliation Act being the first government in the wide world to adopt such a measure and it is working out satisfactory. The only country in the world that stood ahead of Canada in the matter

of Labor Legislation was New Zealand.

In regard to oriental labor he noticed that Mr. Bowser of British Columbia had been going about the country discussing it. When Japanese labor began pouring into Canada our loyal Conservative friends at once demanded the cancellation of the Japanese treaty, but Sir Wilfrid's reply was that he could not be a party to making trouble between Japan and England. Instead of that he sent the

Honourable Mr. Lemieux to Japan, and an amicable arrangement had been made by which Japanese immigration had been stopped. They had been annoyed in the west by a great influx of Hindu labor. Now you know the Hindu is a British subject and it is pretty hard to say that he must take a back seat, but Mr. McKenzie? King had gone to London and had discussed the matter with the envoy of India. The result was that a stop had been put to Hindu immigration. Our government has placed more labor legislation the statute book during the last twelve years than any government in the civilized world, and this accounts for the thousands of happy homes all over Canada. The labor legislation enacted by the Conservatives during their term of office could almost be put on a postal card. (Cheers.)
