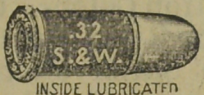

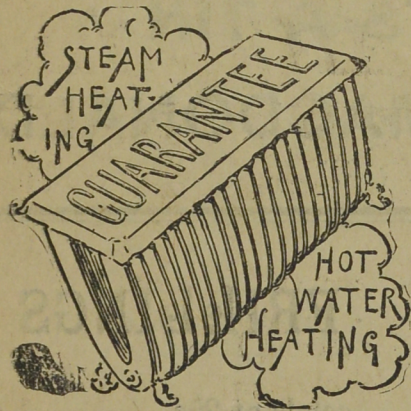

A MAN OF THE PEOPLE

Mr. Martin Butler Himself a Laboring Man as well as Editor urges the Candidature of Brown.

(From Butler's Journal.)

Coming to our own county there is quite a much difference between the Liberal and Tory candidates as there is between Laurier and his traducers. Crockett represents the aristocratic and exclusive set, who exploit and despise the honest laborer. He yearns for a title, but as even The Gleaner does not possess sufficient influence with King Edward to get it for him, he must possess his soul in patience, until a few more years have passed over his head, and he has really done something to earn the "honor."

Brown is one of the common people, in whose whole-souled frank expression there is no room for deceit or false pride, and who never cradled in the lap of luxury knows what it is to roll up his sleeves and do honest useful toil, and is not ashamed of it. Indeed he would be more ashamed to live in luxury off the earnings of others.

He has always been honest, candid and out spoken, and has nothing to conceal. Men like Crockett, if by any chance placed at the same table with a common laborer, would squirm and twist and make anything but a hearty meal—getting away from such vulgar contamination as, soon as possible; while if his election depended on it he would not ask a workman to sit at his own table; while Brown would go out in the field or on the river and labor with the common man, and sit down beside the road and take dinner with him in a shack or ask a traveller in off the road to share his meal and his hospitality for the night. This we know.

Brother workmen, members of the despised proletariat, who are your friends?—those who scorn and flout you only when they want to use you for their own advancement, or those who consider you men and their equals? If you have the sense and discernment that I think you have, you will bury Crockett under such an avalanche as he will not arise from politically for ten years, and put in Nelson W. Brown, whose heart and talents, backed up by a sympathetic government will always ant figure in the election, and if they will take our advice they can easily turn the scale—and it is this.

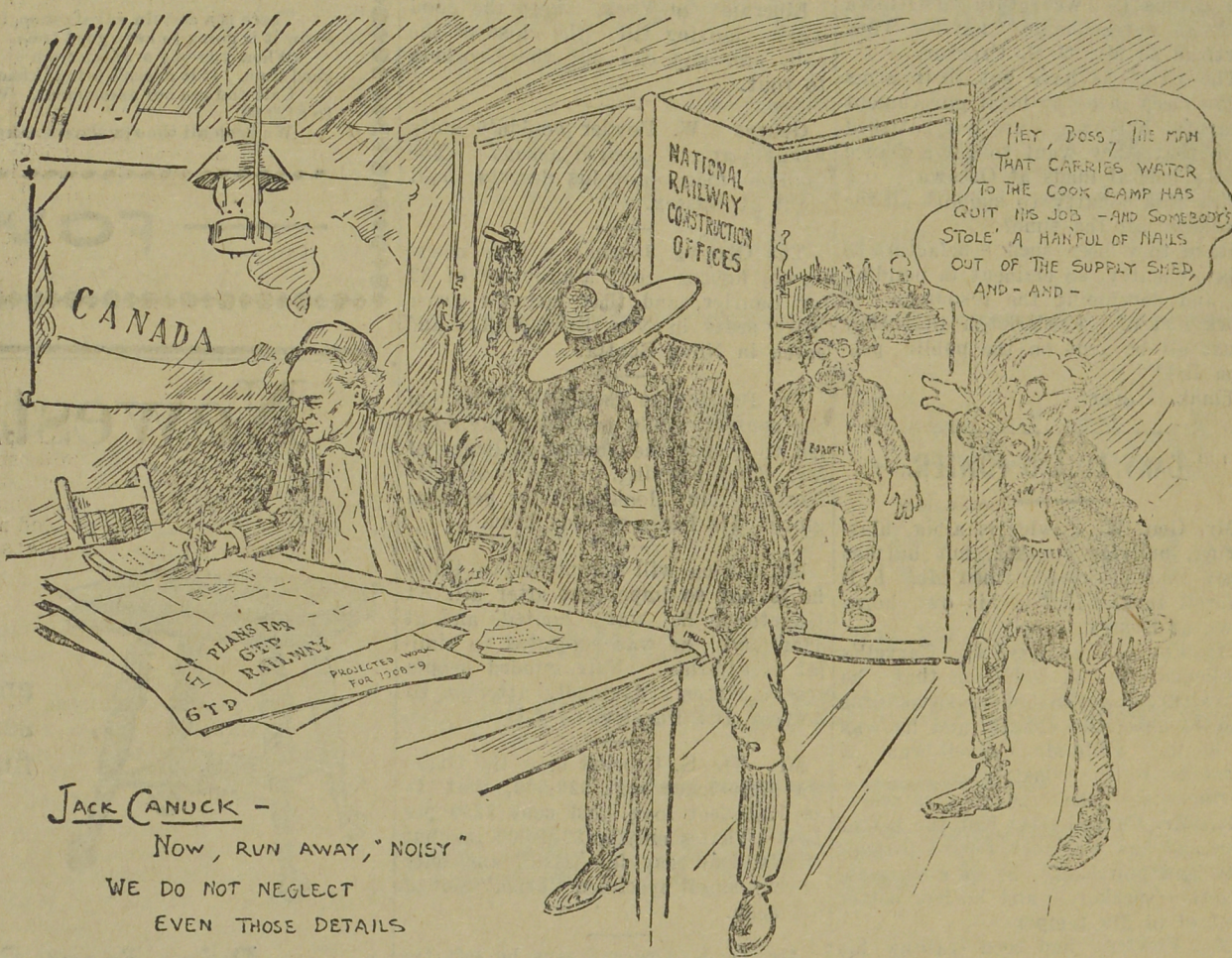

LIBERAL MEETINGS

Messrs. Maxon and Dow Held Highly Successful Rallies at Hayesville and Birdton.

BIRDTON MEETING.

A political meeting in the interests of the Liberal candidate, Mr. N. W. Brown, was held at this place Oct. 13, and was addressed by Mr. Hedley Maxon and N. S. Dow.

Mr. Samuel Bird took the chair at 8 o'clock, and introduced Mr. Maxon, who spoke for over an hour on the policy of the Liberal government. He discussed the tariff policy, the expenditure of public money, the immigration policy. He also exposed the hollowness of the Conservative claims for purity in politics. He was frequently interrupted by an opposition supporter, who claimed he was sorry that Liberals had ruled Canada because flour was now 7 dollars a barrel, when it used to be four dollars. He seemed to be thirsting for the good old times, but Mr. Maxon showed that farm products and wages had increased in much greater proportion than any of the other necessities of life.

Mr. Foster's position in handling the Trust funds of the widows and orphans of the Foresters' and accepting rake-offs in the form of commission, while paid as manager to roust their funds to the best advantage, was shown up to these people for the first time. It went down hard with some of the old Conservatives, but they had to swallow it with a gulp.

Mr. Dow ably discussed the Agricultural policy of the Liberal party, showing how the needs of the people had been considered, and the wisdom of Sir Wilfrid in choosing a farmer to administer this department. He made it clearly evident to the people that they had benefited under this agriculture administration by the great transportation facilities, cold storage, etc., thus removing the surplus farm products from our markets, and increasing the demand. The meeting closed with cheers for Brown.

HAYESVILLE MEETING.

A large Liberal rally was held at Hayesville Saturday evening. The speakers were G. Hedley Maxon and N. S. Dow.

The hall was packed to its utmost both as to seating and standing capacity, and people thronged the porch and windows, seeking to hear the truth.

Mr. Maxon dealt with the record of the Liberal administration in a very able manner, showing up very forcibly the increased revenue and decrease in taxation, and exposing the corrupt acts of Geo. E. Foster, etc., to the complete satisfaction of the enthusiastic audience.

The whole meeting impressed the audience, as the truth always does, and when it broke up the cheers for Brown and Laurier could be heard far and near, leaving no doubt of the result of the campaign in this constituency.
