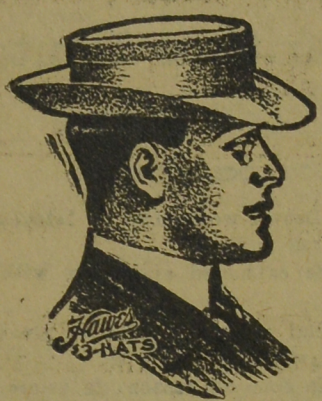

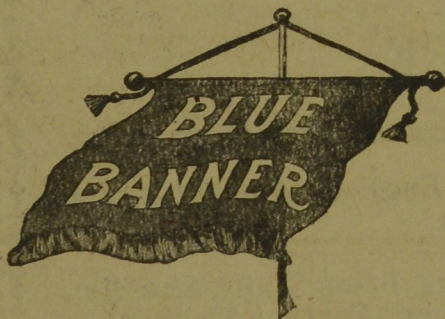

A PANIC IN A SCHOOL.

Silician Children Injured During Fire Drill.

KATTOWITZ, Prussian Silesia, March 19.—During a fire drill in a school in this city this afternoon, there was a stampede among the children, which resulted in ten of the little ones being trampled by their comrades until they were unconscious. No lives were lost. The signal for the fire drill was given, but one of the exit doors was inadvertently left locked. With the warning bell the children in the sixth class started for this door. They found it shut against them and their further progress barred. The children behind did not know what was the matter and pressed so fiercely upon those ahead of them that their comrades against the door were trampled under foot. The accident would have been more serious had not some passers by heard the cries of the children and came to the rescue. They managed to get the doors open and put an end to the panic. The unconscious children were restored by local doctors and taken to their homes.

HOWARD TRUEMAN DEAD.

Prominent Westmorland Man and Writer of Some Note.

AMHERST, N. S., March 23.—(Special)—The death occurred at Point De Bute last evening of Howard Trueman, aged 71. Death was due to heart failure. He was one of Westmorland's most prominent farmers, and a Conservative in politics. He was a man of literary talent, some of his works being "History of the Trueman, and other families," and the story of Agriculture in New Brunswick. The last work is well known throughout the Maritime Provinces.

SPOKE ABOUT "PRESS AND PRESBYTERIANS."

Editor of Toronto Globe Gave Address before Presbyterian Union in Buffalo.

BUFFALO, N. Y., March 20.—The address of Rev. J. A. Macdonald, of the Toronto Globe, last night before the Presbyterian Union was a clarion call to the men in the churches. "Shoulder together, men," cried the speaker in his peroration, "like the battle-cry of the Highlanders—Sons of the Gael—shoulders together. Never shot in the back, never turning aside, but facing the foe. So the Master tells us to stand like men. These are no enemy too strong, no fortress too impregnable—we can conquer in His name."
In a humorous opening Mr. Macdonald referred to the combination, "The Press and the Presbyterians." He said that as a plain newspaper man, he was supposed to tell the truth as he saw it. "And, by the way, I have had thirty-one libel suits in six years," he continued. "There is always something that needs doing. I wish some preachers would get so in earnest that somebody would serve them with a writ for libel." (Laughter.)
Referring to the immigration problem, Mr. Macdonald declared that today it was not a question as to how it was going to affect labor capital, but how it was going to affect citizenship.

Blind Pupils.
An artist in Paris had much difficulty in getting his pupils to make use of the extremely "impressionistic" ideas of art. One evening at a large dinner party he asked an elderly gentleman next to him, who was very shortsighted, how the gentleman at the foot of the table appeared to him. "Well," replied the nearsighted one, "I see a very white spot, which I take to be his shirt front, and a flesh colored spot, which I know to be his face."

Feeling Heat and Cold.
The principal reasons that we feel objects that are cold when brought in contact with the skin quicker than those that are warm is that the skin, being a very poor conductor of heat, absorbs heat slowly from an object of a higher temperature than itself, while other objects, which are cooler and which in nearly every instance are better conductors of heat than the skin absorb heat readily from the skin, and hence a sensation of cold is felt at once.

The Marsh Wren's Sagacity.
Birds often have more sagacity than is generally accredited to them. The long billed marsh wren, which builds a substantial nest of rush leaves, swinging in the tall rushes of a marsh, invariably makes several nests, but only uses one. This is undoubtedly for the purpose of misleading its enemies. The nest used is always the best hidden, while those not used—the decoy nests—may be easily found by those who seek them.

REPEAT IT OUTSIDE DARED

MR. CONMEE.
Heated Wrangle Between Two Members in Senate Railway Committee this Morning.

OTTAWA, March 19.—There was a row in the Railway committee of the Senate this morning over a bill of the Fort William Bridge and Terminal Railway company.

Mr. Conmee, opposed the bill on the ground that it would take the only remaining water front in Fort William.

Mr. Henderson of Halton intimated that Mr. Conmee had a financial interest in opposing the bill. He asked if the Great Lakes Dredging company would be present tomorrow to explain his interest in opposing the bill. Mr. Conmee resented the insinuation that he was interested and asked "What do you mean, sir? That is a cowardly lie and insult and lie."

After a heated wrangle between Mr. Henderson and Mr. Conmee, Mr. Pringle asked the chairman to restore order.

Mr. Henderson said that to show he was not a coward he could repeat his statement tomorrow.

Mr. Conmee—"I want to warn you if you cannot come here and act like a gentleman, I will make you. You are a bear right through and you would not repeat that statement outside."

Mr. Henderson—"I excuse you on the ground of your ignorance of decency."
The chairman closed the scene by adjourning the committee.

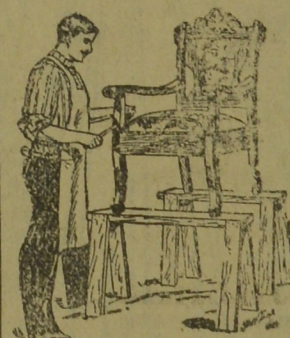
