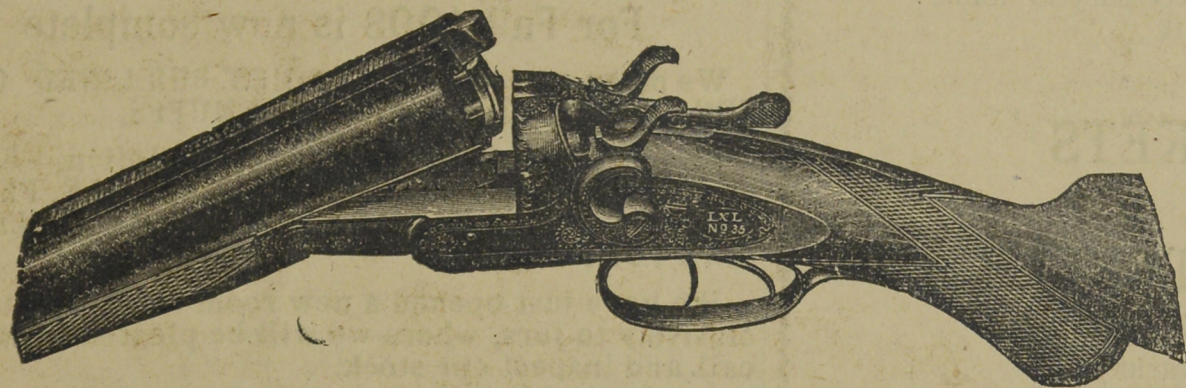
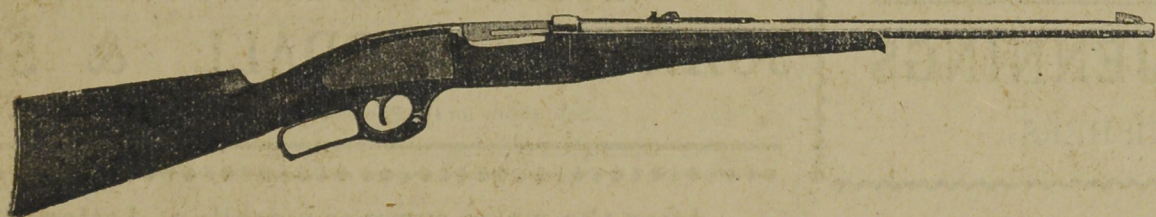

DEATH OF DR NATTRESS

Military Officer Stricken While Taking Part in Tercentenary Celebration at Quebec.

TORONTO, Sept. 15.—Lieut. Col. Dr. College. After taking a post graduate course in England and being enrolled as a member of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, circles in Toronto and throughout the province, passed away a little after 5 o'clock last evening at his home, 42 Carleton street. The late Dr. Nattress was taken ill with emphysema, an affection of the chest, while taking part in the Tercentenary celebration at Quebec, and was operated upon. From the effects of the operation Dr. Nattress rallied, and was able to return to Toronto and go out driving a good deal. A week ago, however, he suffered a relapse, and gradually sank until his death occurred last evening.

Drs. E. E. King and J. T. Clarke, who were in attendance upon Dr. Nattress, called in consultation yesterday Dr. W. H. B. Atkins, but the patient was beyond medical skill.

The late Dr. Nattress, who was in his 56th year, was born near Woodbridge and was a graduate of Trinity University and Trinity Medical College. After taking a post graduate course in England and being enrolled as a member of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, he returned to Toronto and began the practice of his profession. It is now nearly a quarter of a century since the late Dr. Nattress joined the Queen's Own Rifles, afterwards seeing active service in the Northwest rebellion. For fifteen years he was attached to the medical staff of this district, and for the past ten years he was the principal officer. While holding the latter office the late Dr. Nattress was called upon to pass those who volunteered for service in South Africa. Deceased was a member of the Northwest Field Force and the Military Institute. The late Dr. Nattress leaves a widow, who is the third daughter of Colonel G. T. Bondy, son, police magistrate. He was a member of the Holy Trinity Anglican Church, and was on the staff of Grace Hospital. The funeral, tomorrow at 1.30 p. m., will take place to St. John's Cemetery, Weston.

RURAL MAIL DELIVERY.

Postmaster General Made Announcement of Great Importance to the Country.

Niagara Falls, Sept. 16.—Hon. Rodolphe Lenioux, Postmaster-General, capped the climax of a particularly effective and eloquent speech at the Liberal gathering here yesterday, by announcing the intention of the government to inaugurate at once a system of free rural mail delivery throughout Canada, thus conferring a great boon to the whole farming community of the country. After briefly reviewing the history of the adoption of free rural mail delivery in Great Britain, France, Germany and the United States, he declared that hitherto the vital objection to the adoption of such a system in Canada had been the great cost involved and a comparatively sparsity of the rural population. But with a post office surplus of \$1,000,000 last year, and growing postal revenues, the government now felt justified in taking another great step in advance in the matter of postal reforms.

After carefully studying the question for the past two or three years, his department had now evolved a scheme of rural delivery and collection by utilizing the present system of stage routes whereby the rural population would be able to receive and post all ordinary mail matter at their doors, instead of having to drive from two to three miles to the nearest post office for that purpose.

"With the consent of my colleagues," he said, "I have determined to equip all existing routes in Canada with rural delivery boxes, under regulations to be published and enforced shortly at the junction of every concession line with the main road, farmers will also be given the privilege of having boxes located for the receipt and collection of mail if so desired."

"The department has made all arrangements for carrying out this scheme and will at once proceed to operate it. I think it can and will afford to pay costs."

WILLIE AND THE METEOR.

He Heard it Singing on its Downward Way.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 15.—Willie McKinnon, fourteen-year-old son of Angus McKinnon, while working in his father's garden at Duncan's Landing, Vancouver Island, about half-past 11 o'clock last Thursday forenoon, narrowly escaped death from a most peculiar cause. A meteor about ten inches in diameter buried itself in the ground about eight feet from where the boy was working. The coming of the meteor was heard by the boy for several seconds before it struck the earth, but it sounded like a train passing on the railroad nearby, and the youngster took no notice till the soil and broken earth fell about his ears. The boy ran into the house and called his parents, who rushed out in considerable alarm. They found the earth cut up, as the boy had said, and what had fallen from the sky looked like an ordinary boulder, except that it was almost completely round, and that the surface was strangely marked. The meteor was still intensely hot, and could not be handled till half an hour passed. In its descent it encountered the branches of a tree, snapping them like matches. It fell at an angle of about forty-five degrees, and was travelling in a northwesterly direction when it struck the earth.

A CRISIS IN DENMARK

No Party Strong Enough To Form Government

Copenhagen, Sept. 16.—The King has accepted the resignation of the Cabinet, which was handed to him Saturday by Premier Christensen, in accordance with his demand, on condition that the Ministers continue to perform their duties until Parliament reassembles on September 28.
