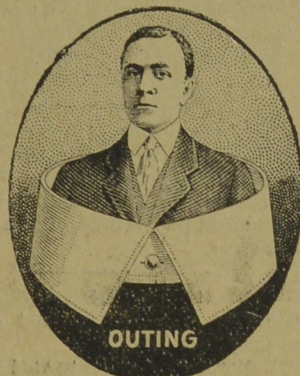
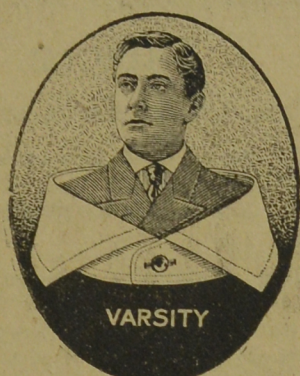

White Spots on the Table.

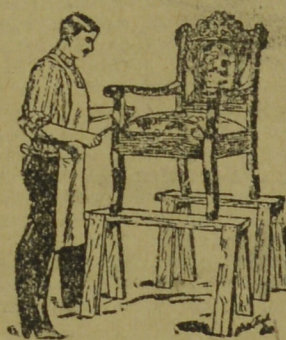

THEY'RE LETTING UP.

Tories in Parliament Afraid to Block the Militia Estimates—Maritime Province Representation Discussed

OTTAWA, Ont., June 5.—The House did not get into supply yesterday until there had been a long talk on the diminishing representation of the Maritime Provinces.

Dr. Daniel of St. John introduced the question and declared that the provinces of the east should have left to them the representation with which they came into confederation.

He used the arguments of Dr. Pugsley before the privy council that the terms on which the three eastern provinces entered confederation had been changed by the enlargement of Quebec, which would provide accommodation for more people in that province and consequently enlarge the unit of representation. The admission of other provinces also affected the situation by, in effect, destroying the saving clause of the B. N. A. Act. Representation of the east would not be affected if Canada were to be regarded for this purpose as comprised of the four original provinces of the confederation. He urged that Dr. Pugsley take steps to induce his colleagues to arrange for the protection of Maritime Province representation.

Mr. Turgeon of Gloucester urged that if the Maritime Provinces had lost ground it was not due to the constitution but to a lack of effort in developing the great resources. Instead of tinkering with the constitution they should direct their attention to the development of these provinces.

Messrs. McLean and Martin (Queens) supported Dr. Daniels' proposal. Luring the course of his remarks the latter said that Newfoundland had done better by remaining outside confederation than the Maritime Provinces had by coming in. Mr. Lefurgey and Mr. Crockett supported Dr. Daniels' plea.

MILITIA CAMPS.

Sir Frederick Borden, in answer to R. L. Borden, gave the following information as to the militia camp: Goderich camp to begin on the 15th instead of the 16th of June, owing to arrangements as to transportation; Niagara camp to begin June 15th instead of the 16th; Valleyfield changed from June 15th to August 31st; Rockcliffe, from June 22nd to date not yet fixed. At La Patrie the camp grounds are under water and no definite arrangements have been made. Camps in British Columbia and the West generally are now progressing, the department having money for them. Sussex camp to be held on the date first selected.

On May 27th a militia order was sent out to the other districts as a precautionary measure to the effect that if the necessary funds were not voted in time the camps might have to be postponed.

R. L. Borden said that no vote had been asked for these camps and there could be no question of it having been held up.

Sir Frederick Borden answered that as a matter of fact the militia votes were called early in the season, but not procured because Mr. Foster desired some reports respecting last year's items.

The militia vote was also, he pointed out, only part of the supply bill

which had been before the House for months, and even if the vote was passed parliament would not feel the money was available until a supply bill had received the assent of the governor general.

Mr. Borden replied that it necessary an emergency supply bill could be passed.

Hon. Mr. Fielding remarked that hon. gentlemen opposite had been asked to co-operate in order to make another vote to enable the public service to go on and had declined.

Mr. Borden replied that the application had received consideration, but difficulties had arisen on a certain bill (the Election Act) on which there could not be concurrence.

Mr. Fielding returned with a statement that this did not change the fact that the opposition had declined to co-operate in the manner mentioned.

IMMIGRATION ESTIMATES

On resumption after recess, Hon. Mr. Fielding delivered a few remarks in respect to the subject brought up by Dr. Daniel. While admitting the importance and interest of the question, he thought the time at which it was brought up was inappropriate. He thought the duty of the house at the present time was to vote supply for the public service and he invited the members to do so.

The motion to go into supply was carried and the estimates for immigration were taken up.

Mr. Monk objected to a vote of \$200,000 for salaries of agents and employees and criticised the immigration propaganda of the government in France.

Several hours of obstruction followed.

At midnight the vote was passed and a vote of \$2,000 for deputation expenses, was then taken up.

A LAW

A LAW in amendment of a Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House:

Be it Enacted by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton, as follows:

1. Section 18 of "A Law to regulate the City Hall Building, Offices and Opera House," passed the fourth day of January, A.D., 1898, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

18. Commencing the first day of September, 1908, the following shall be the charges for the use of the Opera House, and it shall be the duty of the Manager in all cases to adhere strictly to the terms of such scale:

For any performance or entertainment requiring a clear stage for a one night stand, \$	35 00
The same for each successive evening performance	30 00
The same for each Matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for light)	15 00
For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, motion pictures, entertainments, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind where any foreign talent is employed and, for all colored minstrel performances where any foreign talent is employed, each night with scenery	30 00
The same as above without scenery	25 00
The same for course of three to five consecutive nights with scenery, per night	27 00
The same without scenery per night	23 00
For one week stand with scenery	135 00
For the same without scenery	120 00
For each matinee (exclusive of any extra charge for	

light)

15 00

For dramatic, operatic, variety, pantomime, comedy, entertainment, and for all lectures, readings, concerts or performances of any kind, being local talent only, and having no paid foreign talent, and for all local minstrel performances and having no foreign talent, each night with scenery

For the same without scenery

For each matinee, local talent only

For each political meeting
