

NEW YORK SUICIDE.

Bank Teller Short in His Accounts Went to the Basement and Shot Himself.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Questioned by the bank's officers yesterday about an apparent discrepancy in his accounts, Chas. T. Muir, paying teller of the Forty-second street branch of the Corn Exchange Bank, asked to be excused until he could obtain a deposit ticket to explain the matter, went to the basement, and after writing a brief statement and confession that his accounts were short, shot himself in the head. He died within an hour at the hospital.

Vice-president Frew of the Corn Exchange Bank, stated last night that Muir's shortage was \$9,068.

Muir was one of the bank's most trusted employees, and it was while holding the position of receiving teller that he conducted his speculations. Muir in his confession stated that the embezzlements had been going on for five years, and that he had succeeded in covering his shortage by substituting new deposits for old.

Three days ago Muir was paying teller of the bank and an examination was commenced of his accounts, a suspicion having developed that all was not right. In the capacity of paying teller Muir was no longer in a position to cover his shortage and he faced momentary exposure. When asked yesterday about a discrepancy in his accounts Muir replied:

"Oh, that is all right; wait one moment until I go down stairs to get the ticket."

Muir went to the basement and wrote a note confessing his embezzlement, which read:

"My accounts are short the total amount of the tickets in this envelope. This has been going on for about five years, covering shortage by substituting new deposits for old. I wish to say that no one, either in or out of the bank, is to blame but myself."

After putting the confession in his pocket, Muir shot himself. Vice-President Frew said that the shortage was fully covered by a surety bond.

New York, June 2.—A despatch to The Herald from Utica says:—The Rev. Henry Macbray, formerly of Brooklyn, but who for several years has been the pastor of a Little Falls church, told his congregation last evening that he was going to curb the gossips who live in the town.

For fourteen months he had made a record of gossip as it had reached him, and his notes, written in fine script, equalled three and three-fourths yards of tattle when pasted in a strip. In order to put a curb on loose tongues he had decided to set apart one Sunday of the month for the reading of this record of scandal, omitting the names of the victims, but giving the names of the gossips, in order that the public might know who they were.

DIED OF SMALLPOX.

Carleton County Man Succumbed to Dread Disease.

Bristol, N. B., June 4.—Smallpox still exists in the parish of Kent, Carleton County. The first death occurred suddenly near Bath, when Alfred Holmes passed away. He contracted the disease a few weeks ago at Plaster Rock, and soon after returned to his home near Bath, where he has been residing with his daughter, Mrs. Ezekiah Banks. Dr. Commins has been attending and has taken every necessary precaution to prevent the disease from spreading, though two new cases have been reported in Holmsville, a few miles distant. The deceased was about 55 years of age, and leaves two sons and two daughters.

New York r Who Contributed \$10,000 to Battlefield Fund Writes Interesting Letter

Ottawa, June 3.—An interesting letter accompanied the check for \$10,000 contributed to the battlefields fund by an anonymous Britisher in New York. The contribution was received by Earl Grey. The letter, which is written on Hotel St. Regis paper, says, in part:

"As a British subject, I admire the pluck and patriotism of the Canadians in the work of consecrating the historic battlefields of their country in a way to emphasize the genuineness of the British cordial so happily established between the two powerful races resident in the Dominion. If the spirit of unity, typified as it will be in the course of celebration at Quebec, is perpetuated, Canadians must become a great and powerful people—a lusty nation.

"I believe it is a mistake to suppose that intelligent Americans are envious of Canada's prosperity and prospects. Americans look on at the preparations with deep interest and goodwill, and they will be with you in the thousands in July.

"It is not exaggeration to say that the eyes of a great part of the world are turned towards Canada at this time.
