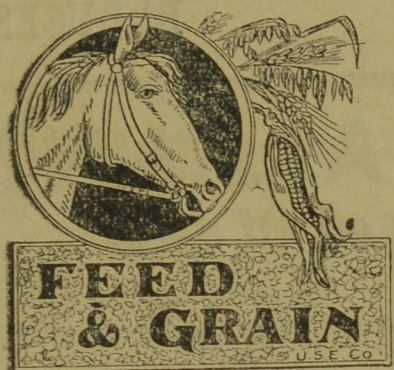

FLEMMING'S TIRADE.

Provincial Secretary Substituted for the Budget Speech a Three Hours' Harangue, Abusing the Late Government.

Quite Exhausted Himself and Had to Ask for More Time.

In the legislature Friday afternoon Mr. Fleming, the provincial secretary, arose to deliver the budget speech but entirely forgot his mission, launching off into nearly three tirades against the late government, exhausting himself in adjectives and wind without getting to the business for which he stood on his legs.

He made an incoherent attack on Hon. Mr. Robinson, and generally gave an exhibition, indicating his unfitness to fill the responsible position which he temporarily occupies, but will never adorn.

After Mr. Fleming had spoken all the afternoon his budget was still untouched, and he is to have a wrestle with it this afternoon.

Referring to the transactions of the past year he denied the existence of the alleged surplus of \$8,000.

Taking up the various items agriculture, amounting to \$35,544.84, he said the money was spent, but not upon ordinary means of assisting agriculture, for nine thousand dollars of it was to pay losses on the business management of the department of agriculture in importing horses, sheep and seeds. He said the amount charged for exhibitions that year was not incurred during the year, but was an aggregation of grants made previously and carried over. The amounts paid to exhibitions held in 1907 had been carried over to 1908.

Why, of course, and if Mr. Fleming knew as much as he pretends, he would be aware that the exhibition grants are never paid until after the shows are held, and a report of the financial end of them is in the hands of the government. This is not possible before Oct 31st, the close of the fiscal year, and the payment must go into the accounts of the following year.

Taking up the expenditure of \$11,677.23 for game protection, he directed the attention of the house to the amounts spent in the different counties. In Kestigouche some fifty wardens had been employed, receiving a sum of \$1,560.60, an amount entirely out of proportion for that county in comparison with other counties.

Victoria was another comparatively small county, where there was an expenditure for game protection, which no man of good sense or sound judgment would justify.

Mr. Fleming—I would not expect any other answer from the hon. gentleman, for I would never attribute sound judgment to him.

The expenditure of \$3,000 in one

year for game protection there as carried out, could not be justified on any sound business principles.

Taking up the interest item of \$178,569.70, a sum he said quite large enough to take from the revenues of the province for borrowed money, yet it did not begin to be the correct amount. Tens of thousands of dollars additional to this was paid in interest. It did not include one cent of interest paid on the London loan of \$300,000 stg., although the government had been compelled to pay the full interest for a year before they got the money.

Mr. Fleming then referred to the ex-provincial secretary's action in regard to the expert auditor's report. After criticising him (Fleming) for his statements in regard to the financial position of the province, and ignoring the challenge for a joint debate in the city of St. John, he had attempted to throw dust in the eyes of the people by employing an auditor from Toronto to make a statement in regard to provincial accounts, and when he got this statement he dared not give it to the public because it condemned the system of book-keeping from start to finish.

Taking up the item of public works, of \$230,121.61, he said this statement was misleading. Large sums of money, which were expended during the year were carried over in the suspense account.

The expenditures incurred prior to the 31st October, 1907 and not yet provided for by appropriation, added to the over-draft of the Provincial Hospital and the Public Works Dept. which made a total of over \$190,000. And this was not a complete statement for bills were yet coming in three and four years old. In fact this very afternoon a bill had come from the Intercolonial Railway for \$47,496.34 for rails said to have been supplied the N. B. Coal and Railway in the year 1902. Today it stands unpaid with interest on it to the amount of over \$8000.

The late government were very fond of referring to the largeness of the assets of the Province, whilst they characterized the liabilities according to the account amounted to \$5,568,604.25, but Mr. Fleming professed himself able to figure the amount up to over \$10,000,000 in which he included over \$2,000,000 for the St. John Valley Railway.

At this point of his speech Mr. Fleming became quite exhausted and moved the adjournment of the debate and promised to make his budget speech this afternoon.

NOVA SCOTIA'S GOVERNOR.

Accorded A Rare Distinction in Boston—Hon. D. C. Fraser Addressed Massachusetts Legislature.

BOSTON, May 11.—Lieut. Governor D. C. Fraser, of Nova Scotia, who arrived in Boston on Sunday for the purpose of addressing a public meeting of the Intercolonial Club this evening, was this afternoon accorded the unusual honor of speaking before the Massachusetts House of Representatives.

He received from the members an ovation not less marked than that accorded to William Jennings Bryan when he addressed a joint session of the Legislature a year or so ago, and his appearance was an event in the history of the general court. In fact, it is believed to be the first time in its annals that a Canadian-born visitor has been accorded that distinction.

CHEERED LIEUT. GOVERNOR FRASER.

Governor Fraser was presented to Speaker Cole by ex-Senator Fred J. McLeod, President of the Intercolonial Club, and a native of Prince Edward Island, and after the business of the House had been deferred on motion of Representative William L. Waurin, of Somerville (a native of Cochester County, N. S.), the Speaker introduced him to the House.

Governor Fraser made a brief and ringing speech in the House, which he referred to the international peace movement and the Representatives Chamber rang with applause when he made the statement that the United States and Great Britain, acting together in this question, could organize a great "peace assurance society" that would effectually and forever settle the matter.

GREATEST HONOR OF HIS LIFE

Speaking of the courtesy accorded him, he said that he considered it the greatest honor of his life to be invited to address the representatives of the second oldest Parliament in the world. He referred to the

fact that the Probate Act of Nova Scotia was copied of a similar law in Massachusetts, and mentioned other respects in which the laws and the social life of the two peoples are identical.

INVITED TO NOVA SCOTIA.

Referring to the forthcoming celebration of the 150th anniversary of the constitution of Nova Scotia, he extended a cordial invitation to the members to come to Halifax and participate in the ceremonies. In closing, he said that he would like to devote the remainder of his life to the work of bringing about a better understanding between the American and British peoples than exists at present. This sentiment received enthusiastic applause.

On Sunday the Governor was given a dinner by Neil McNeill, ex-President John Campbell and other members of the Intercolonial Club, and at six o'clock this evening he was entertained at Young's Hotel by about thirty members of the Club.

GIVEN SPLENDID RECEPTION.

Immediately following this, he addressed a large meeting in Intercolonial Hall under the auspices of the Intercolonial Club. President Fred J. McLeod presided. Two hundred natives of Nova Scotia from Somerville and a large delegation of Blues from Lynn, headed by Mayor Thomas F. Porter, who was born in Paradise, attended.

Governor Fraser made a fine speech and there were addresses made by Walter Walsh, of Dundee, Scotland, who is here in the interests of the International Peace Movement, and other well known men.

The Governor met a splendid reception from the big audience and the affair was a great success. He leaves for New York tomorrow, and after visiting Ottawa, will return to Halifax about May 19.

SHE MURDERED CHILDREN.

Human Tigeress Narrowly Escapes Lynching in France.

NANCY, France, May 12.—Jeanne Weber, narrowly escaped, lynching age to-day at the hands of an infuriated mob after it had been learned that she had strangled a seven-year-old boy to death.

Several months ago the Weber woman was arrested in Paris, charged with the murder of over a score of children.

Doctors who examine her expressed the belief that she was a victim of imbecility, but no proof to secure a conviction could be found and she was allowed to go. The woman arrived here Wednesday, and under an assumed name secured lodgings in the home of a workman.

This morning she was found asleep with the dead body of a boy by her side. The child had been strangled. He was covered with blood and his tongue had been cut out. When the identity of the murderess had been ascertained an immense crowd gathered outside the house shouting "Let us get at the tigeress," and tried to lynch her. The police arrested the woman, but they were forced to fight their way to jail with their prisoners.
